


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### COALITION FRACTURES AND DEFENSE ACCELERATION AMIDST HIGH-STAKES SABOTAGE AND JUDICIAL RECKONING

#### DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

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February 18, 2026, marked a significant turning point in Polish domestic and security policy, characterized by the formal fracturing of a key coalition partner and a massive state-level push for multi-billion-euro defense investments. The "Polska 2050" party suffered a definitive split as 18 parliamentarians, led by Climate Minister Paulina Hennig-Kloska, exited to form the "Centrum" parliamentary club. While both the new club and the remains of Polska 2050 under Katarzyna Pełczyńska-Nałęcz pledged continued loyalty to the ruling 15th of October Coalition, the internal vitriol—with former leader Szymon Hołownia citing "hatred" and "betrayal"—suggests a destabilized middle ground in Polish politics. This domestic upheaval coincided with Prime Minister Donald Tusk's declaration of 2026 as the "Year of Turbo-Acceleration," leveraging favorable economic data and the newly approved EU "SAFE" defense program to project Poland as Europe's leading growth engine.

On the security front, Poland faced tangible evidence of hybrid threats. The arrest of a Moldovan national for attempting to derail a fuel transport train near the strategic Puławy chemical plant highlighted the ongoing risk of Russian-backed sabotage aimed at disrupting logistics to Ukraine. Simultaneously, the judiciary renewed its pursuit of former PiS officials, with a fresh European Arrest Warrant (ENA) issued for Marcin Romanowski, who remains sheltered under political asylum in Hungary. Internationally, the focus remained on the stalled Geneva peace talks and the inauguration of Donald Trump's "Peace Council," from which the Vatican has notably distanced itself, signaling deep skepticism toward the new American diplomatic architecture. The day reflected a Poland aggressively arming itself and growing its economy while struggling with the legacies of past corruption and the fragility of its current political alliances.

#### MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

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- **Schism in Polska 2050 and Formation of "Centrum" Club:** Approximately half of the parliamentary representation of Polska 2050, including 15 MPs and 3 Senators, officially broke away to form the "Centrum" club. Leaders of the splinter group cited a "lack of space for dialogue" and a "kicking away of democratic standards" under the new leadership of Katarzyna Pełczyńska-Nałęcz. Szymon Hołownia, the party's founder, delivered a blistering critique, accusing the defectors of "desertion" and "hatred," specifically blaming Hennig-Kloska for destabilizing the coalition ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Approval of Program "SAFE" and Defense Modernization:** The European Union formally approved Poland's investment plan under the SAFE program, granting access to 44 billion EUR (approx. 184 billion PLN) in low-interest loans. The government estimates these funds will save the budget 48 billion PLN in interest compared to sovereign bonds. Major beneficiaries include Huta Stalowa Wola (20 billion PLN) and Mesko. The program is currently being debated in the Senate amidst fierce opposition from PiS and Konfederacja, who fear loss of sovereignty and "EU conditionality" ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Suspected Russian-Backed Sabotage in Puławy:** A 25-year-old Moldovan national, Anton B., was charged with "causing direct danger of a catastrophe" after activating emergency brakes on a train carrying 37 fuel tankers near the strategic Azoty Puławy chemical works. Służby found documentation in Russian and multiple SIM cards/electronic devices on the suspect, who entered Poland from Belarus. Prosecutors suspect a test of Polish security responses by Russian intelligence ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Judicial Strike Against Justice Fund Suspects:** The Warsaw District Court issued a new European Arrest Warrant (ENA) for Marcin Romanowski, former Deputy Minister of Justice. This follows a previous warrant's cancellation and is aimed at overcoming his current political asylum in Hungary. A similar ENA process is underway for former Minister Zbigniew Ziobro ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Stalled Peace Negotiations in Geneva:** Trilateral talks between the US, Ukraine, and Russia in Geneva ended after only two hours on the second day. While "military progress" on ceasefire monitoring was noted, a "political deadlock" remains as Ukraine refuses to cede the Donbas and Russia continues to demand territorial concessions. The Vatican officially declined to join Donald Trump's "Peace Council," preferring the UN framework ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

## KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

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- **Domestic Stability & Elite Politics:** The fragmentation of Polska 2050 into two competing "Centrum" entities complicates the 15th of October Coalition's internal management. Prime Minister Tusk assured the public of majority stability, but the loss of party recommendations for ministers like Hennig-Kloska creates a looming reshuffle risk ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Economic Statecraft:** Tusk and Finance Minister Andrzej Domański projected a "turbo-acceleration" for 2026, targeting nearly 10% growth in investments and highlighting a drop in inflation to 2.2%. They framed Poland as an "oasis of stability" outperforming Germany and France, while promising to overtake the UK's GDP per capita within five years ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Critical Infrastructure & Terrorism:** The sabotage attempt on the Polish rail network near Puławy is being treated as a high-level national security threat. The use of "disposable agents" (nationals from third countries like Moldova) to conduct kinetic acts or gather intelligence on strategic sites like Azoty Puławy is a key concern for the Internal Security Agency (ABW) ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Geopolitics & International Relations:** The inauguration of Trump's "Peace Council" in Washington, attended by Poland's Marcin Przydacz as an observer, highlights the delicate balancing act between Warsaw's reliance on the US and its integration with EU defense initiatives. The Vatican's refusal to join signals a significant rift in the western "peace architecture" ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Legislation:**
  - **SAFE Program Act:** Enabling legislation for 184 billion PLN in EU-backed defense loans. Includes anti-corruption oversight ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
  - **Labor Inspection (PIP) Reform:** Granting inspectors the power to convert "civil contracts" (junk contracts) into employment contracts, affecting 1.5 million workers ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
  - **Silesian Language Veto:** President Nawrocki vetoed the recognition of Silesian as a regional language, citing linguistic and financial concerns ([Source](#)).
  - **Amnesty for Volunteers:** The Sejm passed legislation to prevent the prosecution of Poles who volunteered for the Ukrainian army without prior Mon approval ([Source](#)).
- **Corruption & Governance:** The Justice Fund investigation remains the primary vehicle for political accountability against the former PiS administration. The issuance of the ENA for Romanowski serves as a test of the "rule of law" restoration and international cooperation within the EU ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Biosurveillance:** A severe Avian Flu (H5N1) outbreak in Western Poland (Zachodniopomorskie and Wielkopolska) led to the culling of millions of birds. Officials warned of "Armageddon" among wild birds and increased risk to commercial poultry farms ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

## LEGISLATION/POLICY

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Legislative activity focused heavily on defense financing and labor market protections. The government is pushing the SAFE program as a cornerstone of national survival, while labor reforms aim to dismantle "junk contracts" to meet EU recovery plan milestones. The President continues to use his veto power as a tool of cultural and political resistance, specifically regarding regional identity laws.

## BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **Act on the Implementation of Program SAFE:** Establishes the financial framework for 184 billion PLN in EU defense loans. The Senate added an amendment ensuring loan repayments do not come directly from the Ministry of Defense (Mon) budget ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Państwowa Inspekcja Pracy (PIP) Reform:** Allows inspectors to reclassify civil-law contracts as employment contracts if the work conditions meet the legal definition of employment. Includes a judicial appeal process for employers ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Silesian Language Regional Recognition:** Vetoed by President Nawrocki on the grounds that Silesian is a dialect, not a separate language, and that recognition was a "political rather than scientific" decision ([Source](#)).
- **Military Volunteer Immunity Act:** Prevents criminal prosecution for Poles who joined the International Legion in Ukraine between 2022 and 2026 ([Source](#)).
- **Cryptocurrency Regulation Act:** Vetoed by the President; the government plans to release a "White Paper" on the President's alleged links to the crypto industry ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

## DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

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### 1. The Death of the "Middle Way" and Intra-Coalition Cannibalization

The split in Polska 2050 represents more than just a party dispute; it is the disintegration of the "Third Way" project. The defectors to the "Centrum" club are largely perceived as more aligned with Tusk's Civic Coalition, seeking to secure their future on Tusk's lists for 2027. Conversely, Pełczyńska-Nałęcz is attempting to carve out a "Distinctive Center" that is more critical of the government. This polarization within the coalition creates a "Schrödinger's Majority"—stable in votes but fractured in leadership and vision. Hołownia's fall from a leading presidential contender to a "betrayed" founder signals the end of the post-2023 "new quality" in politics ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

### 2. The Economic Weaponization of Defense

The Tusk administration is successfully re-framing defense spending as an industrial and economic stimulus. By focusing on the SAFE program's 3% interest rate versus market rates, they are portraying opposition from PiS as "economic sabotage." The localization of 80% of spending (e.g., the 20 billion PLN for Huta Stalowa Wola) is designed to create a "defense-industrial complex" that provides jobs in historically neglected regions like Podkarpacie and Świętokrzyskie. This "military Keynesianism" is intended to make defense spending politically unassailable ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

### 3. "Disposable Sabotage" and the Belarus-Russian Conduit

The arrest in Puławy reveals a pattern of Russian intelligence using non-Russian, "disposable" agents (Moldovans, etc.) to perform low-tech but high-impact sabotage. The fact that the suspect entered from Belarus and immediately moved toward critical infrastructure suggests a well-oiled logistics pipe for hybrid

warfare. This "test-and-probe" strategy aims to identify gaps in Polish rail security and the speed of inter-service information sharing. The government is using this to justify the "SAN" anti-drone and infrastructure protection systems ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

#### 4. Judicial Stalemate and Hungarian Obstruction

The renewal of the ENA for Romanowski highlights the growing legal wall between Poland and Hungary. Orbán's decision to grant asylum to Polish political figures is being framed by Warsaw as a breach of EU legal solidarity. The timing of the judicial moves—coinciding with upcoming Hungarian elections—suggests Poland is hoping for a regime change in Budapest to "unlock" these uciekinierzy (fugitives). This remains a major friction point in EU-Visegrad relations ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

#### STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

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**Short Term (1-4 Weeks):** Expect a formal request for the removal of ministers associated with the "Centrum" club by Pełczyńska-Nałęcz, which Tusk will likely ignore, deepening the rift within the 15th of October Coalition. The court in Lublin will likely grant the 3-month arrest for Anton B., leading to more revelations about the "SIM card" sabotage network. A Presidential veto of the SAFE program act is highly probable, forcing the government to trigger "Plan B" (likely using sovereign funds or specialized bank mechanisms) ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

**Medium Term (1-6 Months):** The first tranches of SAFE funds will hit Polish defense firms, triggering a hiring boom in regional hubs. The Hungarian elections in April will be the critical "make-or-break" moment for the Justice Fund investigations; a loss for Orbán would lead to the immediate extradition of Ro-

manowski and Ziobro. Labor inspectors will begin their first high-profile "junk contract" conversions, likely resulting in significant pushback from the private sector and numerous court challenges ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

**Long Term (1-5 Years):** Poland is on track to become the largest conventional military power in the EU, provided the SAFE program debt is managed. The "Year of Acceleration" claims will be tested by the high cost of debt servicing. The split in the center-right (Polska 2050 vs. Centrum) will likely lead to a consolidation where Tusk's Civic Coalition remains the only viable governing force, potentially leading to a more binary (CC vs. PiS/Konfederacja) political system ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

#### RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

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##### For International Policy:

- **Security Strategy:** Allied intelligence services should increase monitoring of third-country nationals entering the EU via Belarus, as the "Anton B." case demonstrates a shift toward utilizing non-obvious agents for infrastructure sabotage ([Source](#)).
- **Diplomatic Architecture:** The lack of success in Geneva and the rise of Trump's "Peace Council" suggests a fractured Western approach to Russia. EU members should prepare for a period where US and EU "peace paths" run in parallel but potentially contradictory directions ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Legal Harmonization:** The Romanowski/Ziobro asylum case in Hungary creates a dangerous precedent for the EAW system. The EU may need to address "political asylum" within the Schengen zone to prevent it from becoming a shield for corruption suspects ([Source](#)).

#### **For Private Sector/Investors:**

- **Investment Opportunity (Defense):** Sub-contractors in electronics, hydraulics, and automotive components should look toward Polish hubs (Stalowa Wola, Skarżysko, Radom), as 150 billion PLN is earmarked for local industry ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Regulatory Risk (Labor):** Multinational firms operating in Poland must audit their use of B2B and civil-law contracts. The PIP reform significantly increases the risk of forced reclassification into more expensive employment contracts ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Supply Chain Security:** The banning of Chinese vehicles from Polish military sites due to "cyber-espionage" concerns may signal a wider forthcoming restriction on Chinese tech in critical infrastructure. Logistics firms should diversify their fleets away from Chinese brands to avoid future access issues ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
