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THE ISLAMIC REPUBLIC FACES AN EXISTENTIAL CRISIS AS THE UNITED STATES ISSUES A TEN-DAY DIPLOMATIC ULTIMATUM BACKED BY IMMINENT MILITARY READINESS FOR LEADERSHIP-TARGETING STRIKES.

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

February 19, 2026, marks a critical inflection point for the Iranian regime, characterized by "diplomacy under the shadow of American aircraft carriers." The Trump administration has transitioned from open-ended negotiations to a high-pressure dual-track strategy. While indirect talks continue in Geneva via mediators, the U.S. has established a ten-day deadline for a "meaningful agreement," failing which "bad things will happen." Strategic signaling has reached an apex, with U.S. military commanders reportedly informing the President of full readiness for a strike as early as the coming Saturday. - **Ten-Day Diplomatic Deadline and Military Readiness:** President Trump has issued a formal ten-day window for Iran to accept U.S. "red lines" regarding its nuclear program and regional activities.
