### DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

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February 19, 2026, was characterized by a profound sense of institutional instability across Latin America, contrasted by efforts in Aruba to strengthen diplomatic and administrative ties within the Dutch Kingdom. The primary international narrative centered on the Republic of Peru, which experienced a 24-hour power vacuum following the congressional censure of Interim President **José Jerí**. Jerí's removal, triggered by allegations of clandestine meetings with Chinese interests, marks the seventh presidential change in Peru in a single decade, underscoring a chronic crisis of governance. By the end of the day, **José María Balcázar** of the Peru Libre party was elected as the new interim leader, though analysts remain skeptical of long-term stability given the upcoming April elections.

Domestic coverage in Aruba focused heavily on the arrival of parliamentary delegations from the Netherlands, Curaçao, and St. Maarten for the **Inter-Parliamentary Kingdom Consultations (IPCO)**. These meetings are aimed at navigating the "new reality" of a recently formed Dutch government and addressing mutual interests in economic diversification and regional security, particularly concerning Venezuela. However, this high-level diplomacy is met with localized friction; Aruban authorities are grappling with a significant administrative backlog at the Census and Civil Registry, where wait times for essential documents have reached two months. Furthermore, a strike by the **K9 Customs Unit** over unresolved security grievances highlights internal fissures in the state's enforcement capacity.

The regional outlook is increasingly grim, particularly in Cuba, where a fuel shortage exacerbated by U.S. policy is creating what observers describe as a "paralyzed country." With transportation and food distribution failing, the threat of a humanitarian disaster looms, even as Russia and Mexico attempt to intervene with aid. Simultaneously, the "Trial of the Century" in California involving Meta CEO **Mark Zuckerberg** is setting a global precedent for platform liability regarding the mental health of minors, a development that intersects with Aruban concerns over digital safety and the emergence of fringe online subcultures like "Therians."

## MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

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- **Peru Presidential Succession:** The Peruvian Congress censured Interim President José Jerí with 75 votes in favor after 130 days in office, citing "clandestine meetings" with a Chinese businessman. Following a 24-hour vacancy, José María Balcázar was elected as the new interim president, defeating María del Carmen Alba. This marks the eighth leader in a decade ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Inter-Parliamentary Kingdom Consultations (IPCO):** Delegations from the Netherlands, Curaçao, and St. Maarten arrived in Aruba for high-level meetings. Discussions focus on economic diversification, the refinery's future, and maintaining the balance between tourism and nature conservation under the new Dutch cabinet ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Aruban Administrative Backlog Crisis:** The Census and Civil Registry (Censo) is overwhelmed by a surge in registration requests, leading to two-month wait times for ID and driver's license renewals. Minister Arthur Dowers announced the hiring of temporary staff and a suspension of online appointments to prevent system abuse ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **K9 Customs Strike:** Members of the Customs K9 unit initiated a strike citing long-standing security concerns within the department that have allegedly been ignored by the Ministry of Finance across multiple administrations ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Zuckerberg Liability Trial:** Meta CEO Mark Zuckerberg testified in a historic California trial regarding Instagram's role in child social media addiction and mental health deterioration. The outcome could open the door to over 1,500 similar lawsuits globally ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Cuba Energy and Humanitarian Collapse:** Cuba is reportedly weeks away from total fuel depletion. Public transport has largely ceased, and food prices are tripling, leading to a "paralyzed" economy. Russia and Mexico are providing limited aid, including 814 tons of food and medicine from Mexico ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

## KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

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**Geopolitics and Regional Security:** Aruba's strategic position remains a focal point for the Dutch Kingdom, particularly following the January 3 "situation" involving the U.S. and Venezuela. Dutch parliamentarians emphasized the need for "Kingdom partners" to support each other during regional tensions to ensure safety as the "basis of everything" ([Source](#), [Source](#)). Meanwhile, Russia and Mexico are positioning themselves as counterweights to U.S. pressure on Cuba, with Moscow warning against a naval blockade ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

**State Capacity and Administrative Efficiency:** The Aruban government is facing a crisis of confidence regarding its ability to deliver basic services. The inability to provide timely Census appointments is impacting citizens' ability to work and drive legally. The tax department (Departamento di Impuesto) reported the arrival of backordered license plates, but the registration process remains bogged down ([Source](#), [Source](#)). State capacity is further strained by industrial actions in the security sector ([Source](#)).

**Corruption and Governance:** In Peru, the removal of José Jerí highlights the fragile boundary between executive diplomacy and corrupt influence. The Peruvian legislature's use of "censure" rather than "vacancy" for an interim leader remains a point of constitution-

al debate ([Source](#)). In Venezuela, families of political prisoners are on a hunger strike, accusing the Maduro regime's proposed amnesty law of being a "selective reconciliation" that excludes the majority of detainees ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

**Economic Statecraft and Investment:** Aruba is actively seeking to diversify its economy beyond tourism, a point of agreement with Dutch overseers. The potential dismantling of the refinery and the pursuit of new industrial/agricultural sectors are key agenda items for the IPCO ([Source](#), [Source](#)). Netflix's announcement of a new regional headquarters in Mexico City signals a continued shift of tech investment toward major Latin American hubs ([Source](#)).

#### **Legislation and Policy: BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:**

- **Venezuela Amnesty Law:** A proposed law currently in its second discussion in the National Assembly. It is criticized by human rights defenders for being too narrow and excluding military and police political prisoners ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Aruba Window Tint Regulations:** The DTI is enforcing specific legal limits on vehicle window tinting to ensure safety and compliance with existing traffic laws ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

## **DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES**

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**The Institutionalization of Presidential Instability:** Peru has effectively normalized the removal of heads of state. The fact that the stock market and exchange rates do not "blink" during a presidential vacancy suggests a total decoupling of the macroeconomy from the political executive. However, this trend creates a vacuum where long-term policy is impossible, leaving the country in a state of perpetual transition ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

**The Crisis of Administrative "Bottle-necks":** A recurring theme in Aruba is the frustration over "appointments" (citas). Whether for the Census or cancer screenings (Fundason ABO), the reliance on digital booking systems that are either full or broken is creating a tier of "administrative exclusion." This is leading to a resurgence of manual intervention and temporary hiring as stop-gap measures ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

**Ecological Warfare and Invasive Species Management:** The lionfish invasion in the Caribbean is being framed not just as a biological threat but as a community-building "silver lining." By turning an invasive predator into a delicacy and a source for jewelry, regional actors are practicing a form of "market-based conservation." This trend reflects a broader move toward community-led environmental resilience ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

**The Digital Identity Frontier:** The Zuckerberg trial and the reporting on the "Therian" subculture (individuals identifying as animals) indicate a growing societal and legal anxiety over the psychological impact of digital platforms. Governments are increasingly moving beyond simple "parental controls" toward considering platforms as "architects of harm" ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

## STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

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**Short Term (1-4 Weeks):** Expect heightened security presence in Peru as President Balcázar takes office. In Aruba, the IPCO meetings will likely result in a joint communiqué reaffirming the "Status Aparte" while signaling tighter financial or security oversight from the Netherlands given the regional volatility. The Census Bureau will likely face continued public outcry until temporary staff are fully integrated.

**Medium Term (1-6 Months):** The April 12 elections in Peru will be the critical hurdle; if they are postponed or contested, civil unrest is highly probable. Cuba will reach a "breaking point" regarding fuel, likely necessitating a larger-scale international humanitarian intervention led by Mexico and the UN to prevent total state collapse.

**Long Term (1-5 Years):** Structural changes to social media regulation will likely follow the California trial, with the Caribbean and EU adopting stricter age-verification and algorithm-liability laws. Aruba's move toward economic diversification will either succeed in creating a "Green Corridor" or fail, leaving the island dangerously dependent on a tourism sector sensitive to global fuel prices and pandemics.

## RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

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### For International Policy:

- **Diplomatic Continuity:** Maintain engagement with Peru's technical-level ministries (Central Bank, Trade) rather than the executive office, as the presidency remains a "rotating door."
- **Regional Resilience:** International donors should focus aid on Aruba's state capacity—specifically administrative and judicial infrastructure—to prevent domestic unrest from mirroring regional neighbors.
- **Crisis Mitigation:** Prepare for a potential migration surge from Cuba if the fuel and food crisis is not mitigated by the end of Q1 2026.

### For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Regulatory Compliance:** Tech companies and digital marketers must prepare for a significant tightening of age-verification and content liability standards in the wake of the Zuckerberg trial ([Source](#)).
- **Infrastructure Opportunities:** The Aruban government's interest in refinery dismantling and "food forests" (voedselbos) suggests emerging opportunities for environmental remediation and sustainable agriculture firms ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Supply Chain Risk:** High fuel prices and logistical paralysis in Cuba and parts of Venezuela remain significant risks for Caribbean maritime trade and transshipment ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
