



THE US SUPREME COURT
OVERTURNS TRUMP TARIFFS AS
MEXICO ASSERTS SECURITY GAINS
IN GUANAJUATO

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

February 20, 2026, marked a significant shift in the North American geopolitical landscape as the United States Supreme Court issued a 6-3 ruling annulling the majority of the broad tariffs imposed by President Donald Trump. The Court determined that the executive branch exceeded its authority under the 1977 International Emergency Economic Powers Act, effectively dismantling the "trade war" framework that had defined US foreign policy since Trump's return to power. While Trump characterized the ruling as a "disgrace" and a threat to national security, the decision provides immediate breathing room for Mexican exporters, even as the US administration vowed to pursue alternative routes through Section 232 and Section 301 investigations to maintain protectionist barriers. Domestically, the Mexican administration leveraged a high-profile security cabinet meeting in Irapuato to project a narrative of

stabilizing governance. President Claudia Sheinbaum and Governor Libia García reported a 65% reduction in homicide rates in Guanajuato—historically Mexico's most violent state—over the last 11 months. This achievement is being framed as a victory for the "hugs, not bullets" (attention to causes) strategy combined with surgical intelligence operations that decapitated the leadership of the Santa Rosa de Lima Cartel. However, the government faces persistent challenges from "atomized" criminal groups and a significant "black figure" of unreported extortions, which remain a primary focus for 2026 operations. Simultaneously, the administration is pushing a "sovereign recovery" agenda, focusing on the state-led expansion of passenger rail and a constitutional reform to eliminate "Golden Pensions" for high-level officials. By highlighting the 20th anniversary of the Pasta de Conchos mining tragedy, the Sheinbaum government is intentionally contrasting its "humanist" approach to rescue and reparations with the "negligent" neoliberal policies of the Fox and Calderón eras. This multi-pronged effort—trade relief, internal security gains, and anti-corruption measures—serves to consolidate the "Second Story of the Transformation" amidst regional instability in Peru and Argentina. MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

- **US Supreme Court Overturns Executive Tariffs:** In a landmark 6-3 decision, the SCOTUS ruled that President Trump could not unilaterally impose tariffs using the 1977 International Emergency Economic Powers Act. Trump responded by announcing an executive order for a "global 10% tariff" under Section 232 (National Security) and initiated Section 301 investigations to circumvent the court's restrictions. - **Guanajuato Security Stabilization:** Federal and state authorities reported that Guanajuato homicides dropped from 12.7 to 4.4 daily averages. Key successes include the arrests of "Alfa 1" and "Moy" (Santa Rosa de Lima Cartel). Despite these gains, the state remains the highest in total homicide volume in Mexico for 2025. - **Proposed "Golden Pension" Reform:** President Sheinbaum announced a constitutional initiative to cap high-level public official pensions at 50% of the President's salary (approx. 60,000 pesos/month). High-profile targets include José Ángel Gurría and Ernesto Zedillo, whose current pensions are described by the government as "offensive" to the public interest. ([Source](#), [Source](#))
- **UK Royal Crisis - Prince Andrew Detained:** Former Prince Andrew was detained for 11 hours and his residences searched in connection with "misconduct in public office." Allegations suggest he leaked confidential government trade documents to Jeffrey Epstein between 2001 and 2011. ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#))

- **Railway Expansion Milestones:** The Mexico City-AIFA train is set to begin operations before Holy Week 2026. Further construction on routes to Querétaro, León, and Guadalajara is underway, with 2027 set as the target for the "Northern Trains" network completion. ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#))
- **Gaza Reconstruction & "Peace Council":** Donald Trump hosted the inaugural meeting of his 40-country "Junta de la Paz" in Washington. Plans include \$10B in US funding to build 100,000 homes in Gaza (Rafa region) and the deployment of a 500-strong international stabilization police force. Mexico declined participation, citing the exclusion of Palestinian victims from the council. ([Source](#), [Source](#))

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Geopolitics and International Relations

- **Mexico-Peru Relations:** Mexico is open to re-establishing diplomatic ties following the Congressional appointment of interim President José María Balcázar in Peru. However, Sheinbaum insists that Peru must initiate the rapprochement, as they were the ones who broke relations. Balcázar has already denied a pardon for ousted leader Pedro Castillo. - **US-Iran Tension:** Trump hinted at the possibility of a "limited attack" on Iran while Terán claimed a nuclear deal draft could be ready within 10 days. US military movement in Bulgaria suggests mobilization for potential escalation. ([Source](#))

Domestic Stability & Social Order

- **Civil Unrest in Argentina:** A 24-hour general strike by the CGT paralyzed Argentina in protest of Javier Milei's labor reforms, which increase the workday to 12 hours. Reports of police repression, injuries, and arrests of retirees surfaced during demonstrations in Buenos Aires. ([Source](#))
- **Fentanyl False Alarm in Puebla:** Investigations into the poisoning of six minors after eating tamales in Puebla concluded that fentanyl was not the cause. One child tested positive for the substance only because it was administered as medication for seizures during hospital treatment. ([Source](#), [Source](#))
- **Measles Outbreak:** The health cabinet is prioritizing vaccination for children (6 months to 12 years) following an increase in cases, particularly in Chihuahua. Mexico has 27 million doses available and is acquiring 15 million more. ([Source](#), [Source](#))

Corruption & Governance

- **Anti-Corruption Tenders:** The Ministry of Anti-Corruption and Good Government canceled eight contracts and sanctioned companies like Avakor SA de CV for providing false information and tripling costs in military equipment tenders. ([Source](#), [Source](#))
- **Elba Esther Gordillo SAT Ruling:** The Supreme Court ruled that former union leader Elba Esther Gordillo must pay 19.2 million pesos in back taxes from 2008-2009, dismissing her final appeals. ([Source](#), [Source](#))

Legislation

- **Pension Reform (Proposed):** Limits "trust" official pensions to 50% of the presidential salary to end the "neoliberal" practice of brief tenure leading to lifelong million-peso payouts. ([Source](#), [Source](#))
- **Electoral Reform (Upcoming):** President Sheinbaum announced that details regarding a major electoral reform proposal (specifically targeting plurinominal seats) will be presented on Tuesday, February 24. ([Source](#), [Source](#))

LEGISLATION/POLICY

The Mexican government is currently moving toward a significant legislative week, with the focus on reducing bureaucratic excess and reforming the electoral system. Internationally, the focus is on the fallout of Milei's labor deregulation in Argentina and the rejection of Trump's tariff authority by the US judiciary.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED

- **Constitutional Pension Reform (Mexico):** A proposal to cap pensions for high-ranking public officials. It aims to save 5 million pesos monthly by preventing "Golden Pensions" that exceed the President's salary. ([Source](#), [Source](#))

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The End of Tariff Hegemony?

The SCOTUS ruling against Trump's tariff regime suggests a domestic judicial check on the "America First" economic strategy. How-

ever, the immediate pivot to Section 232 and 301 investigations indicates that the US administration views trade barriers as a permanent tool of statecraft rather than a temporary emergency measure. This "rule-by-investigation" creates a volatile regulatory environment for Mexican manufacturers, who must now anticipate targeted tariffs on specific sectors (steel, aluminum, vehicles) rather than broad national security levies. The "Guanajuato Model" of Security Coordination

The dramatic drop in homicides in Guanajuato represents a rare moment of effective coordination between a PAN-led state government and a MORENA-led federal government. The data suggests that the resignation of long-term Fiscal Carlos Zamarripa in early 2025 was a turning point, allowing for new intelligence-sharing protocols. By framing this as "two women putting order in Guanajuato," the Sheinbaum administration is humanizing the security narrative while doubling down on the "zero impunity" for cartel leaders like "Alfa 1." Humanist Sovereignty vs. Neoliberal Legacy

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks):

- **Trade Volatility:** Expect targeted retaliatory investigations from the US into Mexican steel and automotive parts following the SCOTUS ruling. The market may see a temporary surge in Mexican exports before new Section 301 tariffs are formalized.
- **Electoral Reform Tension:** The presentation of the electoral reform on Tuesday will likely trigger a new wave of domestic political polarization and protests from opposition parties concerned about MORENA's control over plurinominal seats. ([Source](#))

Medium Term (1-6 Months):

- **Rail Milestones:** The launch of the Mexico City-AIFA passenger route will serve as a proof-of-concept for the Northern expansion. Success here will determine the feasibility of the 2027 Guadalajara/Pachuca timelines. ([Source](#), [Source](#))
- **Argentine Destabilization:** The continued repression of strikes in Buenos Aires could lead to a deeper political crisis for the Milei government, potentially impacting regional trade agreements and South American diplomatic stability.

Long Term (1-5 Years):

- **Industrial Reshoring:** If Mexico maintains the security gains in Guanajuato and the Bajío region, it will solidify its position as the primary alternative to Chinese manufacturing. The long-term success of the "Poles of Well-being" depends on extirpating extortion at the municipal level. ([Source](#))
- **UK Monarchy Restructuring:** The judicial fallout from the Prince Andrew arrest could lead to a permanent reduction in the size and public funding of the British Royal Family, as the "Epstein stain" forces King Charles III to distance the institution from its members' past conduct. RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy:

- **Implication 1 (Security):** The "Guanajuato model" shows that replacing entrenched local prosecutors is a prerequisite for federal security interventions to succeed. International security partners should monitor personnel changes in other high-violence states (e.g., Zacatecas, Michoacán) as lead indicators of future stability.
- **Implication 2 (Trade):** The US judiciary remains a critical check on radical protectionism. Diplomatic missions should prioritize legal advocacy within the US court system to challenge upcoming Section 232/301 executive orders.
- **Implication 3 (Diplomacy):** Mexico's decline to join the Gaza Peace Council signals a shift toward a more "Third World Nationalist" stance, prioritizing Palestinian sovereignty over the US-led reconstruction agenda. ([Source](#), [Source](#))

For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Risk 1 (Regulatory):** Rent controls in Mexico City and upcoming electoral reforms indicate a trend toward increased state intervention in the economy and political institutions. - **Risk 2 (Supply Chain):** While highway "Megabachetón" repairs and new rail routes are positive for logistics, the "atomization" of cartels in Guanajuato means that while homicides are down, the risk of road-level extortion and cargo theft by smaller cells remains elevated. - **Opportunity (Energy/Infrastructure):** The "sovereign recovery" of the rail sector creates significant opportunities for firms specialized in tracción (diesel/electric), track maintenance, and signaling (e.g., Alstom, Siemens), as Mexico commits to 2,000 km of new passenger and cargo lines.
