



DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

The Algerian state media narrative for February 21, 2026, is dominated by the logistics of the month of Ramadan, blending religious piety with a robust defense of state capacity and economic resilience. A central theme is the government's proactive management of the supply chain for essential goods—specifically cooking oil and sugar—to prevent shortages and price gouging during the high-demand fasting period. The inauguration of a new regional administrative annex in Oran serves as a flagship example of the administration's "decentralization" strategy, aiming to reduce the bureaucratic

burden on citizens and the diaspora. By showcasing increased production at the Almahrosa and Tafadis industrial units, the state is signaling to the public that despite global economic pressures, domestic food security remains stable. Simultaneously, the Algerian state is intensifying its information warfare against neighboring Morocco. Extensive coverage is dedicated to the social "neglect" and "marginalization" within Morocco, using stark imagery of rural poverty and lack of infrastructure to contrast the Moroccan "Makhzen" (the ruling establishment) with Algeria's own state-led development and humanitarian efforts. This regional posturing is further bolstered by Algeria's leadership in organizing collective Iftars for displaced families in Gaza, positioning the nation as a regional moral authority. Domestically, the day features a sophisticated integration of tradition and technology, exemplified by AI-assisted historical recreations of Algerian female scholars and high-level medical discussions on the biological benefits of fasting, effectively modernizing the Ramadan experience for a contemporary audience.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

• **Industrial Scaling for Food Security**

- The Almahrosa cooking oil production unit has reached a daily output of 220 tons, with plans to scale to 250 tons to meet Ramadan demand. The unit operates on a 24/7 basis with rigorous quality control systems ([Source](#)).
- The Tafadis sugar refinery in Boumerdes has increased production to 600 tons per day, with a theoretical maximum capacity of 2,000 tons. The facility is being promoted as an ecological model using circular economy principles ([Source](#)).
- Tebessa has recorded a record production of extra-virgin olive oil, though producers face significant challenges in local commercialization and are calling for the creation of agricultural cooperatives and export marks ([Source](#)).

• **Administrative Decentralization and Digital Reform**

- The Ministry of Foreign Affairs inaugurated a regional annex in Oran for the legalization of administrative documents intended for use abroad. This move is specifically targeted at simplifying procedures for the Algerian diaspora and western residents ([Source](#)).
- The project is part of a broader presidential directive to "bring the administration closer to the citizen" and accelerate the digitalization of consular services ([Source](#)).

• **Geopolitical Posturing and Information Operations**

- Media reports highlighted severe social unrest and "systemic marginalization" in rural Morocco, citing a lack of roads and healthcare as evidence of the Makhzen's failure to meet basic citizen needs ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- Algerian initiatives provided a collective Iftar for displaced Palestinians in northern Gaza, reinforcing Algeria's diplomatic and humanitarian commitment to the Palestinian cause ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

• **Expansion of Saharan Agriculture**

- In Timimoun, greenhouse farming (culture sous-serre) has expanded to 89 hectares, utilizing 2,225 plastic greenhouses to produce cucumbers, eggplants, and peppers for the northern markets ([Source](#)).
- The state is providing technical guidance to farmers in the Groud region to leverage high solar exposure and water resources, viewing Saharan agriculture as a strategic lever for national supply ([Source](#)).

- **Cultural and Historical Preservation Initiatives**

- The Casbah of Alger is undergoing major restoration, including Dar Ahmed Pacha and Palais Hassen Pacha, with an emphasis on preserving 16th and 18th-century architectural integrity using original materials ([Source](#)).
- Algerian youth creators are using Artificial Intelligence (AI) to produce educational content on historical figures like Lalla Ruqayya al-Bijaiya, a 15th-century scholar from Bejaia who taught in Mecca ([Source](#)).

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

- **Geopolitics:** Algeria continues to leverage its humanitarian aid to Gaza and its support for Western Saharan participants in the "Taj al-Quran" competition to project regional influence. The sharp focus on Moroccan instability suggests a continued high-friction relationship with Rabat ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Economic Statecraft:** The government is using state-owned enterprises (Agrodiva, Madar) to manage the price and availability of sugar and oil, effectively using economic production as a tool for domestic social stability during Ramadan ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Domestic Stability & Social Order:** Health and sociological experts on state television are actively discouraging "consumption frenzies" and "food waste" during Ramadan, framing moderation as both a religious duty and a medical necessity (autophagy and metabolic health) ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **State Capacity:** The successful opening of document legalization centers in Constantine, Ouargla, and now Oran demonstrates an incremental but consistent improvement in the state's ability to provide services outside the capital ([Source](#)).
- **AI and Technology:** The mention of ChatGPT in popular comedy sketches and the use of AI tools for historical research indicates a state-sanctioned push toward digital literacy, balanced with a humorous critique of the generational gap in technology use ([Source](#)).
- **Legislation and Policy:**
 - **Agricultural Cooperatives Policy:** Proposals were discussed to mandate or encourage the registration of domestic marks and the formation of cooperatives in the olive oil sector to facilitate export ([Source](#)).

LEGISLATION/POLICY

Governance reports focused on refining existing judicial and administrative frameworks. The state is actively working to operationalize the constitutional status of the Amazigh language

in courts and decentralize document verification for the diaspora.

- **Judicial Linguistic Reform:** A policy initiative to integrate the Amazigh language into the Algerian justice system. The Ministry of Justice and the High Commission for Amazighity are establishing frameworks for judicial translation to ensure "fair trial" conditions for Tamazight speakers ([Source](#)).
- **Consular Decentralization Policy:** Official launch of regional annexes for the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. This policy authorizes regional centers (Oran, Ouargla, Constantine) to legalize documents for international use, a task previously centralized in Algiers ([Source](#)).
- **Agricultural Marketing Support:** State-proposed measures in Tebessa to register commercial brands for local olive oil and form producer cooperatives to resolve marketing bottlenecks ([Source](#)).

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

- **Ramadan as a Performance of Governance** The state uses Ramadan not just as a religious event, but as a critical test of governance. The repeated segments on the exact tonnages of oil and sugar produced are designed to neutralize the "anxiety of the market" that often leads to social unrest. By framing food availability as a "priority," the government links industrial output directly to its legitimacy. ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **The "Makhzen" vs. The "People"** A clear narrative trend is the dehumanization of the Moroccan government ("the Makhzen") while expressing sympathy for the Moroccan "people." By focusing on the physical suffering of Moroccan villagers (e.g., people being carried on stretchers through snow), Algerian state media reinforces a message of "Algerian exceptionalism"—implying that while Algeria provides for its citizens and Gaza, Morocco fails its own. - **Scientific Validation of Religious Ritual** A sophisticated theme observed is the "medicalization" of the fast. Instead of purely spiritual arguments, the state provides platforms for "nutri-therapists" and general practitioners to explain fasting through the lens of "autophagy" (cellular recycling) and "metabolic reset." This trend suggests an effort to appeal to an educated, urban middle class by providing scientific justification for traditional practices. ([Source](#)).
- **Cultural Continuity through Modern Tools** The use of AI to recreate the story of Lalla Ruqayya al-Bijaiya represents a strategic move to reclaim historical narratives. By using modern digital tools to celebrate a female scholar from the "Zianid" or "Hafsid" eras, the state promotes a national identity that is both deeply rooted in Islamic history and technologically forward-looking. STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

- **Short Term (1-4 Weeks):** Market prices for cooking oil and sugar are likely to remain stable due to the high-visibility production quotas and state permanence systems. We may see an uptick in "associative" volunteerism as the state encourages youth to join charities, a move that serves as a social safety valve. Expect continued diplomatic friction with Morocco as media narratives remain aggressive.
- **Medium Term (1-6 Months):** The success of the Oran administrative annex will likely trigger the opening of similar centers in other major cities (e.g., Setif, Annaba). The "record" olive oil production in Tebessa may lead to a surplus crisis if the proposed export mark and cooperative policies are not enacted quickly, potentially leading to local farmer protests.
- **Long Term (1-5 Years):** The expansion of greenhouse farming in Timimoun points to a major structural shift in Algerian agriculture. The south is increasingly viewed as the "breadbasket" that will compensate for climate-related yield drops in the north. If successful, this will lead to new logistics and cold-chain infrastructure investments in the Sahara.

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

- **For International Policy:**
 - **Security:** Monitor the border regions near Morocco; Algerian media's focus on "Moroccan marginalization" often precedes heightened border security or diplomatic escalations.
 - **Diplomatic:** Engage with the Ministry of Justice regarding the Amazigh judicial reforms, as this offers opportunities for human rights and linguistic cooperation programs.
 - **Humanitarian:** Algeria's direct role in Gaza Iftars indicates a desire to bypass traditional international intermediaries; diplomatic missions should note this shift toward Algerian bilateral aid delivery.
- **For Private Sector/Investors:**
 - **Supply Chain:** Significant opportunities exist in the "cold chain" and logistics sector for Saharan agriculture (Timimoun) as production scales beyond local capacity.
 - **Industrial Investment:** The expansion of refineries like Tafadis suggests a state appetite for "circular economy" and "green industry" partnerships in the food processing sector.
 - **Risk:** Investors in the olive oil sector should be wary of Tebessa's current marketing bottlenecks; there is a high-quality product available, but a lack of branded infrastructure for international export.
