US SUPREME COURT OVERTURN OF EMERGENCY TARIFFS SPARKS IMMEDIATE GLOBAL RETALIATION BY TRUMP, WHILE MEXICO ADVANCES DOMESTIC REFORM AND INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS AMID RISING REGIONAL TENSIONS.

The news cycle of February 20-21, 2026, is dominated by a major structural shift in United States trade policy following a 6-3 Supreme Court ruling that invalidated President Donald Trump's broad tariffs imposed under emergency powers (IEEPA). This judicial rebuke represents a significant check on executive authority, leading the Trump administration to immediately pivot to the Trade Act of 1974 to enact a new 10% global tariff. This escalation is occurring just as Mexico consolidates its position as the primary U.S. trading partner, creating a complex landscape for Mexican Secre-

tary of Economy Marcelo Ebrard, who must now navigate these new protectionist hurdles while maintaining "blood-cold" diplomatic stability ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)). Domestically, the Claudia Sheinbaum administration is leveraging this period of international volatility to push a "Humanist" internal agenda. Key pillars include a constitutional reform to cap "Golden Pensions" for high-ranking ex-officials—targeting figures like José Ángel Gurría and Ernesto Zedillo—and reporting a historic 65% reduction in homicides in the traditionally violent state of Guanajuato. This security claim, characterized as a result of federal-state coordination and "addressing root causes," serves to validate the "hugs not bullets" philosophy even as the government maintains a hard line against organized crime, highlighted by the arrest of high-level cartel leaders in Salamanca ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)). Internationally, the geopolitical climate is tightening. The U.S. is signaling potential limited military strikes against Iran over its nuclear program, a move currently being blocked by U.S. allies like the United Kingdom regarding the use of military bases. Simultaneously, Argentina's Javier Milei has successfully moved controversial labor reforms through the lower house despite mass strikes and police repression, signaling a broader trend of right-wing institu-

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

US Supreme Court Overturns Emergency Tariffs and Trump's Immediate Retaliation

- The US Supreme Court ruled 6-3 that President Trump exceeded his authority by using the International Emergency Economic Powers Act (IEEPA) to impose broad tariffs. The ruling opens the door for import companies to claim up to \$240 billion in refunds ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- Within hours of the ruling, Trump signed an executive order via Truth Social for a new 10% global tariff under the Trade Act of 1974, specifically Sections 232 and 301, to bypass the court's restriction on "emergency" justifications ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- The Illinois government has already demanded a \$1,700 refund for every family affected by the previous tariff policy, citing increased costs for groceries and furniture ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

Mexico Reports Significant Security Gains in Guanajuato

- Federal authorities highlighted a "historic" 65% reduction in homicides in Guanajuato over the last 11 months, moving the state away from the top of the national violence rankings ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- Secretary of Security Omar García Harfuch announced the arrest of 4,400 individuals and the seizure of 5 tons of drugs and 6,000 firearms in the state since October 2024. Key arrests include leaders of the Santa Rosa de Lima Cartel linked to the Salamanca massacre ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- The strategy emphasizes four pillars: strengthening the National Guard, intelligence-led operations, inter-institutional coordination, and addressing root causes via social programs ([Source](#)).

Constitutional Reform Targeting "Golden Pensions"

- President Sheinbaum is sending an initiative to the Senate to reform Article 127 of the Constitution, capping pensions for ex-officials at 50% of the presidential salary (approximately 70,000 pesos/month) ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- The reform specifically targets "privileged" individuals such as José Ángel Gurría, who receives 120,000 pesos monthly for a 4-month stint at Nafin, and ex-President Ernesto Zedillo, who draws a massive pension from his time at the Bank of Mexico ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

Pasta de Conchos 20th Anniversary and Justice Commitment

- On the 20th anniversary of the 2006 mining tragedy, the government reaffirmed its commitment to recover all remains. To date, 25 bodies have been found, with 23 identified via DNA ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- Union leader Napoleón Gómez Urrutia stated that intact equipment found on recovered bodies proves there was no initial explosion, contradicting the official version provided by the Vicente Fox administration ([Source](#)).

Escalating US-Iran Tensions

- Trump is considering a "selective strike" against Iran to force compliance on its nuclear program, with a decision window of 10-15 days ([Source](#)).
- The UK government under Keir Starmer has reportedly blocked the U.S. from using British airbases for such an operation, citing potential violations of international law ([Source](#)).
- Iran has warned the UN it will respond decisively to any military aggression and has increased naval exercises in the Strait of Hormuz ([Source](#)).

Geopolitics and International Relations

Short Term (1-4 Weeks)
