


THE DISINTEGRATION OF GLOBAL ARMS CONTROL AND THE INTENSIFICATION OF THE RUSSIAN MOBILIZATION STATE

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

February 21, 2026, marks a pivotal moment in global security as the expiration of the START-III (SNV-3) treaty on February 5 has left the world's two largest nuclear arsenals without formal limits for the first time in over half a century ([Source](#), [Source](#)). This regulatory vacuum coincides with an "Early Phase New Cold War," characterized by a three-way arms race between the US, Russia, and an accelerating China ([Source](#), [Source](#)). Within Russia, the state is transitioning into a total mobilization economy, aggressively targeting students and "reservists" to sustain its nearly four-year-old war in Ukraine, while simultaneously facing increased domestic sabotage, evidenced by a major strike on the Votkinsk missile plant ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

The Russian administration appears to be navigating a fragile geopolitical isolation. To avoid direct confrontation with the Trump administration, Moscow has notably failed to intervene in crises affecting its strategic part-

ners in Venezuela, Cuba, and Iran, leading to perceptions of Russia as a "paper tiger" ([Source](#), [Source](#)). Domestically, the Russian populace is retreating into deep cynicism and cultural escapism, favoring high-budget fairy-tale cinema over war propaganda, even as the government implements draconian new laws granting the FSB unilateral authority to sever all communications ([Source](#), [Source](#)). In Ukraine, the war has entered a grueling phase of "Holodomor" (Cold-mor), with millions facing sub-zero temperatures without heat following systematic strikes on energy infrastructure ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

- **Expiration of START-III and Nuclear Escalation:** The final brake on nuclear expansion was removed on February 5, 2026. Experts warn that the US can rapidly increase its warhead count by adding them to existing Minuteman III missiles, while Russia tests "unconventional" delivery systems like the Burevestnik and Poseidon. China is projected to reach 1,500 warheads by 2035 ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Russian Domestic Mobilization and Student Recruitment:** The Russian Ministry of Defense is leveraging "academic leave" to lure students into one-year contracts as drone operators, often under false pretenses that they will not be sent to the front lines. Concurrently, new legislation allows for "preventative conversations" with 2 million reservists, interpreted as a precursor to a new wave of mobilization ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Geopolitical Abandonment of Allies:** Russia has failed to send military support to its "strategic partners" in Venezuela and Cuba in the face of US pressure. - **The Ukrainian "Holodomor" and Energy Crisis:** Massive Russian strikes on the energy grid have left 600+ high-rises in Kyiv without heat in -20°C weather. Residents are surviving via "radio of the end of the world" and camping in their own apartments, while military medics struggle with a surge in severe frostbite cases among soldiers ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Navalny Poisoning Investigation:** Laboratories in five European nations have concluded that Alexey Navalny was killed in prison using epibatidine, a toxin derived from South American poison dart frogs. Russian officials have dismissed the findings as "frog-based nonsense" and "necro-propaganda" ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Critical Infrastructure:** In Ukraine, the battle for the energy grid has become a central front. In Russia, the Votkinsk plant (producing Iskander and Topol missiles) suffered a major fire after a drone strike, highlighting vulnerabilities in the Russian military-industrial heartland ([Source](#)).
- **Economic Statecraft:** President Trump's announcement of a universal 10% import tariff is causing global shockwaves. Russia's economy has adapted via a "mobilization model," where military spending (8% of VPP) keeps the economy afloat, but development potential is entirely lost ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Corruption & Governance:** In Kyrgyzstan, the reappearance of Alexey Shirshov (a figure linked to the Bakiyev era) in official delegations to Moscow has sparked a major scandal, suggesting a regression in the country's anti-corruption efforts ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **International Relations:** Kazakhstan is signaling a shift toward international peacekeeping, with President Tokayev suggesting the deployment of military doctors or "units" to Gaza, a move that faced domestic backlash and a quick rhetorical "correction" to focus only on medical aid ([Source](#)).

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

- **Domestic Stability & Social Order:** Russia is witnessing a profound rise in social cynicism. While elite and middle-class citizens have "everything to lose" (mortgages, cars), they remain passive, choosing to "sit quiet" and wait for the regime to collapse naturally ([Source](#), [Source](#)). The state is responding with increased "preventative" policing ([Source](#)).

LEGISLATION/POLICY

The Russian legislative agenda is currently focused on consolidating control over information and manpower. The State Duma is prioritizing laws that minimize the ability of citizens to avoid military service or access non-sanctioned information during "special operations."

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **FSB Communications Blocking Law:** A new federal law grants the FSB power to demand operators block phone and internet (mobile and stationary) without public explanation, upon the president's decree. It also exempts operators from liability for service disruptions caused by such requests ([Source](#)).
- **Prevention of Military Evasion Bill:** Passed in its first reading, this bill targets "distortions of historical truth" and allows law enforcement to conduct "preventative conversations" with potential draft evaders among the 2 million reservists ([Source](#)).
- **Migrant Mandatory Registry (Russia):** Set for 2027, this policy will require foreign workers to be tied to a specific region and employer, with no right to change professions, and a 1,200 ruble monthly tax ([Source](#)).
- **Universal 10% Tariff (USA):** Trump's implementation of a broad 10% tariff on all imports, following a Supreme Court ruling that he exceeded his powers, which he is now ignoring ([Source](#)).

HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **Munich Security Conference:** Concluded with a consensus that dialogue with the Kremlin is currently "useless." US Secretary of State Marco Rubio's tone was noted as more diplomatic than VP Vance's previous year, though the message of European subordination to US policy remained ([Source](#)).
- **UN Recovery Estimate for Gaza:** UN estimates suggest \$70 billion and many years will be required to rebuild the Gaza Strip ([Source](#)).

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

- **The "Eastern Express" Model of Regime Change:** Analysts are increasingly looking at the 1970s transitions in Spain (Franco) and Portugal (Salazar) as templates for modern autocracies. The trend suggests that "bloodless" collapses happen when the elite "caste of the unbloody" (younger officials not involved in initial crimes) decides to abandon the aging dictator to save their own future ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Drone Dominance and Tactical Humiliation:** Reports from NATO exercises in Estonia reveal that small groups of Ukrainian drone operators "destroyed" 17 units of NATO armor in half a day, causing a "shock" to traditional military doctrine. This highlights a widening gap between front-line technological reality and NATO's "old-school" training methods ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **The Weaponization of History:** Negotiations in Geneva between Ukraine and Russia (represented by Medinsky) continue to stall as the Russian side insists on long historical lectures rather than concrete peace terms. This "historical babble" is being used as a stalling tactic while the war of attrition continues ([Source](#)).

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks): Expect a surge in Russian "preventative" detentions of reservists as the new bill enters its second reading. The aftermath of the Votkinsk plant fire will likely lead to intensified Russian missile strikes on Ukrainian "decision centers" in retaliation. Tensions between Hungary and Ukraine will peak as Orban threatens to cut electricity in response to oil transit disputes ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

Medium Term (1-6 Months): Without the START-III framework, both the US and Russia will likely announce "modernization" programs that include the deployment of additional warheads. The "Holodomor" crisis in Ukraine will likely trigger a new wave of energy-based migration to the EU. In Russia, the recruitment of students will become a primary source of military manpower to avoid a politically risky "general" mobilization ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

Long Term (1-5 Years): Global climate models regarding the collapse of the AMOC (Atlantic Meridional Overturning Circulation) suggest a radical cooling of Northern Europe could begin as early as 2025-2026, potentially upending the agricultural and energy security of the Baltic and Nordic states. Structurally, Russia faces a "lonely power" status, with its influence in the Caribbean and Middle East permanently diminished in favor of US and Chinese interests ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy:

- **Security:** NATO must urgently accelerate the integration of FPV drone defense into standard training, as current exercises suggest a critical vulnerability to modern attrition tactics ([Source](#)).
- **Diplomacy:** Western powers should prepare for a "post-START" world by engaging China in bilateral or trilateral nuclear talks, as the traditional US-Russia binary is dead ([Source](#)).
- **Humanitarian:** A coordinated EU response is required for the "energy refugees" from Ukraine, as local infrastructure is no longer capable of supporting urban populations in winter ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Supply Chain Risk:** The 10% US universal tariff and the escalating energy war between Hungary/Slovakia and Ukraine will create extreme volatility in European manufacturing and global trade costs ([Source](#)).
- **Regulatory Compliance:** Companies operating in Russia or with Russian data must prepare for "dark periods" where the FSB may cut all communication infrastructure without notice under the new blocking law ([Source](#)).
- **Investment Climate:** The Russian "mobilization economy" offers short-term stability for domestic defense contractors but represents a total "technological retreat" for any civilian R&D or long-term capital investment ([Source](#)).
