



THE ISLAMIC EMIRATE OF AFGHANISTAN LEVERAGES THE RAMADAN PERIOD TO CONSOLIDATE DOMESTIC LEGITIMACY THROUGH AGGRESSIVE MARKET REGULATION, INFRASTRUCTURE EXPANSION, AND A GEOPOLITICAL PIVOT TOWARD CENTRAL ASIAN ECONOMIC INTEGRATION.

## DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

---

The broadcast day of February 21, 2026, reveals a sophisticated governance strategy by the Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan (IEA), blending religious observance with modern administrative control. During the first week of Ramadan, the IEA is prioritizing "market justice" to stabilize the domestic front, deploying the Kabul Municipality to enforce strict price controls on 56 essential items. This effort is aimed at mitigating the chronic inflation typically seen during the holy month and serves as a primary tool for the administration to demonstrate its "service-oriented" legitimacy to the populace. Simultaneously, the IEA is moving beyond emergency management into long-term economic planning, announcing a

10.2 billion AFN infrastructure package and touting self-sufficiency in the poultry sector in Qandahar. These developments suggest a regime attempting to transition from a revolutionary movement to a functioning state apparatus capable of large-scale capital investment.

On the international stage, the IEA is intensifying its focus on the "C5+1" (Central Asian) regional framework. By hosting and participating in meetings with Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan, and Kyrgyzstan, the IEA is positioning Afghanistan as the indispensable transit corridor between Central and South Asia. This regionalism is contrasted by a sharp rhetorical shift regarding narcotics; IEA media is now citing international reports to claim that drug production has migrated to Pakistan following the Taliban's internal ban. This narrative serves a dual purpose: it pressures the international community to recognize IEA security successes while simultaneously undermining the regional standing of its neighbor, Pakistan. However, despite claims of stability, the reports of a significant earthquake in Panjshir and ongoing needs for international mine-clearing assistance highlight persistent vulnerabilities in state capacity and disaster resilience.

## MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

---

- **Capital Infrastructure and Development Surge:** The IEA Procurement Commission approved a series of projects totaling 10.2 billion AFN. Key projects include the expansion of the Ahmad Shah Baba International Airport terminal in Qandahar, the construction of a 60km road in Smanagn, and various electricity distribution networks across several provinces ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Ramadan Market Regulation and Anti-Hyperinflation Measures:** The Kabul Municipality has established a "Price Control and Anti-Hoarding Commission." A 56-item price list for essential goods (flour, oil, sugar) was distributed to all shopkeepers, with the 155-hotline activated for citizens to report price gouging. Officials emphasized that most goods are imported, making "artificial" price hikes a focus of enforcement ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Geopolitical Narrative Shift on Narcotics:** IEA state media, citing "France 24" and other sources, reported that heroin and methamphetamine production has surged in Pakistan following the IEA's ban on poppy cultivation. This narrative seeks to frame Pakistan as the new regional drug hub while demanding international "alternative livelihood" aid for Afghan farmers ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Central Asian Regional Integration:** High-level meetings between IEA officials and representatives from Kazakhstan and Uzbekistan focused on the "Trans-Afghan" transit projects and increasing trade volume. The IEA is offering 1-to-5-year residency permits for foreign investors to encourage permanent capital flow ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Social Order and Judicial Mediation:** The Ministry of Vice and Virtue reported resolving over 180 tribal and family disputes (including cases of "forced marriage" and inheritance) through Sharia-based mediation in the last month. Additionally, the ministry reported the arrest of 30 "sorcerers" or "magicians," framing these actions as purification of the social fabric ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Disaster and Environmental Risk:** A 5.0+ magnitude earthquake struck Panjshir and was felt in Kabul, highlighting the region's seismic vulnerability. Concurrently, Kabul residents expressed high anxiety over seasonal air pollution, blaming low-quality fuel and coal use in high-rise buildings ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

## KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

---

- **Economic Statecraft:** Qandahar province reported reaching 70% self-sufficiency in poultry production, with nine local factories producing 550 tons of feed daily. This is touted as a model for reducing import dependency. Furthermore, the IEA is promoting a five-day "Afghanistan Economic Progress Exhibition" at Chaman-e-Hozori to showcase domestic manufacturing ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **International Relations:** The departure of UNAMA's Deputy Special Representative, Indrika Ratwatte, was marked by high-level meetings with Foreign Minister Muttaqi. The IEA used the opportunity to urge UNAMA to reflect "ground realities" rather than "systemic pressure" ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **State Capacity and Resource Extraction:** German and Indian investors reportedly expressed interest in the extraction of petroleum and gemstones. The IEA Ministry of Commerce is leveraging these interests to push for technical knowledge transfers and local processing ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Biosurveillance and Public Health:** Environmental officials are monitoring "smoke-producing locations" in Kabul to curb respiratory diseases, though capacity for enforcement remains unclear beyond rhetoric. Mine-clearing remains a critical biosafety concern, with over 10 square kilometers of land cleared of 690 explosive devices in the past month ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Terrorism and Security:** State media emphasized the 37th anniversary of the Soviet withdrawal (\*Dalwa 26\*), using historical parallels to frame current security forces as the "guardians of values" against any potential foreign aggression ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

## LEGISLATION/POLICY

---

The IEA's current legislative focus is primarily regulatory and administrative, centered on market stabilization and provincial infrastructure management. Much of the policy is being driven through the Procurement Commission and the Ministry of Vice and Virtue's social mediation mandates.

### BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **Trans-regional Transit Agreement:** Proposals for the "Trans-Afghan" railway and road corridor were discussed with Uzbekistan and Kazakhstan to facilitate Central Asian trade to South Asian ports ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Investor Residency Policy:** A new policy granting 1-to-5-year residency status for foreign investors was highlighted as a major tool for capital attraction ([Source](#)).

- **Kabul Price Control Mandate:** A formalized mandate from the Kabul Municipality setting the ceiling for prices on 56 essential commodities during Ramadan ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Import Quality Standards:** The National Standards Authority (ANSA) enforced quality regulations by rejecting and returning 46 tons of low-quality iron/girders to the country of origin through the Abu Nasr Farahi port ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

## HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **UNAMA Farewell Meeting:** Foreign Minister Amir Khan Muttaqi met with outgoing UNAMA Deputy Indrika Ratwatte to discuss the future of UN-IEA coordination and humanitarian aid ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Economic Progress Exhibition Briefing:** The Ministry of Economy announced a 5-day exhibition starting in April 2026 to showcase domestic industrial achievements ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Procurement Commission Session:** A formal session approving 10.2 billion AFN in provincial development projects, chaired by IEA leadership ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

## DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

---

- **The "Service-Provider" Pivot:** The IEA is leaning heavily into the role of a service-oriented state. By focusing on mundane but critical issues like the price of bread (flour) and electricity distribution, they are attempting to build a social contract based on stability and affordability rather than just ideology. The frequent mention of the "155 hotline" for citizen complaints is a hallmark of this effort to appear responsive ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Weaponizing Narcotics Policy:** The narrative that drug production has "fled" to Pakistan is a sophisticated geopolitical move. It allows the IEA to claim success for its internal ban while framing the regional drug threat as an external issue emanating from a rival. This trend suggests the IEA will use its drug ban as a primary bargaining chip for international recognition ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Technocratic Sharia:** The Ministry of Vice and Virtue is being framed not just as a moral police, but as a judicial body for "alternative dispute resolution." By resolving over 180 tribal disputes, the IEA is attempting to supplant traditional local power structures with a centralized, state-controlled Sharia system that claims to protect the rights of women and the poor in inheritance and marriage ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Resource-Driven Diplomacy:** The continued emphasis on Central Asian trade (Uzbekistan/Kazakhstan) and Indian/German interest in mining suggests the IEA is successfully navigating around Western sanctions by building a "Regional Economic Bloc." This "East/Central Focus" is becoming the cornerstone of their survival strategy ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Medium Term (1-6 Months):** The 10.2 billion AFN in infrastructure projects will begin implementation, likely leading to a temporary boost in local employment. Diplomatic efforts will culminate in the April Economic Progress Exhibition, where the IEA will likely announce further trade deals with Central Asian partners ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Long Term (1-5 Years):** If the IEA successfully maintains its poultry self-sufficiency and expands it to other sectors (like the "Dalwa 26" spirit of independence suggests), the regime may significantly reduce its reliance on international humanitarian aid. The permanent shift of narcotics production to neighboring Pakistan could fundamentally alter regional security cooperation and border management strategies ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

## RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

---

- **For International Policy:** Diplomats should monitor the "Pakistan drug surge" narrative closely. If verified, it suggests the Taliban's ban is effective but merely displace the problem, requiring a regional rather than country-specific counter-narcotics strategy. Furthermore, the IEA's focus on Central Asian transit routes indicates that sanctions-based isolation is being undermined by regional neighbors ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

## STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

---

- **Short Term (1-4 Weeks):** Expect heightened market monitoring and potential "showcase" arrests of shopkeepers for price-gouging as Ramadan continues. Any failure to control food prices could lead to localized social friction. We may also see follow-up reports on earthquake damage in Panjshir, though IEA media is currently downplaying the impact ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **For Private Sector/Investors:** The new 1-to-5-year residency permits for foreign investors signal an opening for capital in the mining and construction sectors. However, the use of "price control commissions" indicates a high risk of state intervention in private markets, which could lead to arbitrary enforcement or "price ceilings" that undermine profitability ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **For Security/Risk Managers:** The seismic activity in Panjshir and the IEA's request for international mine-clearing assistance (claiming 10 square kilometers were cleared but much remains) indicate that the physical operating environment in Afghanistan remains high-risk for foreign staff and infrastructure projects ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
