

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

February 21, 2026, marked a period of significant volatility in international trade and regional governance. In the United States, a constitutional crisis over trade authority peaked after the Supreme Court ruled President Donald Trump's use of emergency powers (IEEPA) to impose tariffs was an unconstitutional overreach of executive power. Trump immediately retaliated by invoking Section 122 of the Trade Act of 1974 to impose a 10% global tariff, effective February 24, while exempting USMCA partners and CAFTA-DR nations. This development creates immediate instability in global supply chains, particularly for Asian and South American exporters, while the unresolved issue of billions in potentially refundable "illegal" tariffs threatens the US fiscal outlook. In Venezuela, the promulgation of a new Amnesty Law has created a fragile and controversial path toward national reconciliation. While high-profile releases like Juan Pablo

Guanipa suggest a thaw in political tensions, the law is heavily criticized by victims' groups and human rights organizations for being exclusionary, particularly toward military and police detainees, and for failing to address systemic issues of state repression. Simultaneously, Spain is leading a diplomatic effort within the European Union to lift sanctions on Venezuelan leaders, signaling a shift in the international community's approach to the regime. Domestic developments in Aruba highlight a push toward modernization in critical infrastructure and healthcare, contrasted by high-stakes accountability measures. The island is showcasing "HoloLens" mixed reality technology in complex neurosurgery, positioning itself as a regional hub for medical innovation. However, this progress is tempered by the ongoing criminal trial of police officers involved in a fatal shooting, which has sparked a national conversation on police conduct and judicial oversight. Additionally, the government continues to weigh the future of the San Nicolas refinery, seeking to balance economic diversification with long-standing energy interests. MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

- **U.S. Trade Authority Crisis and 10% Global Tariff:** Following a Supreme Court ruling that declared Trump's previous emergency-based tariffs illegal, the administration moved to implement a 150-day 10% global tariff under Section 122. The move targets a broad swathe of international trade but specifically excludes Mexico, Canada, and several Central American nations to preserve regional alliances while pressuring others for new trade concessions. - **Venezuela Promulgates Amnesty Law Amidst Internal Dissent:** The National Assembly approved and Delcy Rodriguez signed a law aimed at "democratic coexistence." While leading to some releases, the law excludes crimes against humanity and corruption, leading victims to label it a "propagandistic" tool used as a bargaining chip with the United States. - **Aruba Police Fatality Trial (Aiden Lanoy Case):** The trial of two police officers (MV and GRD) for the fatal shooting of a young man has entered critical stages. Testimony revealed one officer fired 17 rounds during a "blackout," leading to judicial skepticism regarding police training and mental stability under pressure. - **Medical Innovation in Aruba:** The Horacio Oduber Hospital has successfully integrated HoloLens 3D mixed reality into brain surgery, a partnership with UMC Utrecht intended to reduce patient transfers to Colombia and elevate Aruba's medical status. - **Peru Leadership Stability Concerns:** Interim President José María Balcázar has officially ruled out pardons for Pedro Castillo, attempting to stabilize his administration following a controversial election that relied on right-wing votes despite his left-wing party affiliation. KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

- **Geopolitics:** Spain is actively lobbying the EU to remove sanctions on Venezuela's leadership following the Amnesty Law. This suggests a fragmentation of Western policy toward Venezuela, where some nations prioritize engagement over continued isolation. ([Source](#), [Source](#))

- **Domestic Stability & Civil Unrest:** In Venezuela, relatives of political prisoners continue hunger strikes despite the Amnesty Law, claiming the legislation leaves over 400 prisoners behind bars, mostly military personnel. ([Source](#), [Source](#))

LEGISLATION/POLICY

Legislative activity today was dominated by emergency trade proclamations in the US and the culmination of a weeks-long negotiation over political amnesty in Venezuela. Both indicate a high reliance on executive-led legislative shifts to manage domestic crises and international pressure.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

- **Executive vs. Judicial Friction:** A clear trend is emerging where executive branches (US and Peru) are being curtailed by judicial bodies. The US Supreme Court's limitation on Trump's trade powers and the Peruvian President's clarification on indults show a reassertion of judicial and constitutional guardrails against populist executive actions. - **Technological Sovereignty and Healthcare:** Aruba's adoption of HoloLens technology is a move toward technological sovereignty in healthcare. By reducing reliance on foreign medical centers (Colombia), the island is attempting to build internal state capacity while marketing itself as an innovation hub. - **The Fragmentation of Social Identity:** The "Terian" movement and the indigenous AI movement in Colombia highlight a fragmentation of traditional social and political identities. STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

- **Short Term (1-4 Weeks):** Expect extreme volatility in global markets as the 10% US tariff takes effect on Feb 24. Diplomatic friction will increase between the US and major exporters like Brazil and Vietnam. In Venezuela, the first wave of prisoner releases will likely be met with mixed public reactions and further hunger strikes from those excluded. ([Source](#), [Source](#))
- **Medium Term (1-6 Months):** US courts will be flooded with lawsuits from companies seeking refunds for the "illegal" IEEPA tariffs. In Peru, the Balcázar administration will face pressure from left-wing supporters to revisit the Castillo pardon, potentially destabilizing the interim government. ([Source](#), [Source](#))

- **Long Term (1-5 Years):** Aruba's investment in medical tech and energy diversification will likely determine its economic viability post-refinery. If the Venezuelan Amnesty leads to a sustained removal of EU sanctions, expect a gradual reintegration of the country into the global financial system, though internal stability remains precarious due to unresolved human rights grievances. RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy:

- **Monitor Section 122 Extensions:** The 150-day tariff window is a critical period for negotiations. Foreign governments should prepare for aggressive trade demands from the US as a condition for avoiding "permanent" Section 301 tariffs. ([Source](#))
- **Assess Amnesty Credibility:** Human rights monitors should scrutinize the Venezuelan "Amnesty" to ensure it is not used to shield perpetrators of state-sponsored violence from future prosecution. ([Source](#))
- **Leverage Aruba's Med-Tech Hub:** Regional partners should consider collaborative medical research and service agreements with Aruba as its surgical innovation matures. ([Source](#))

For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Supply Chain Diversification:** Companies reliant on Brazil or Vietnam should immediately evaluate USMCA-based alternatives (Mexico/Canada) to circumvent the 10% global tariff. ([Source](#), [Source](#))
