



DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

February 21, 2026, was defined by a convergence of high-stakes defense debates in Poland and escalating geopolitical instability centered on US-Iran relations and trade wars. Domestically, the Polish political landscape is fractured by a "war over SAFE" (the EU's defense funding program). The ruling coalition frames the 44-billion-euro loan as a historic opportunity for modernization at a low 3% interest rate, while the Law and Justice (PiS) opposition and Confederation attack it as a trap of "conditionality" that would subject Polish sovereignty to EU ideological dictates and favor German industry. This domestic friction is compounded by a deep judicial impasse, as President Karol Nawrocki's recent veto of the National Council of the Judiciary (KRS) reform has prompted the government to initiate a "Plan B"—bypassing the President via bottom-up judicial elections—while the President re-

taliates with a project described by critics as a "Muzzle Law on steroids."

Simultaneously, global risks have spiked due to the actions of US President Donald Trump. Following a Supreme Court ruling that unsealed his unilateral tariff powers as unconstitutional, Trump immediately bypassed the court using alternative legal bases to impose a 15% global tariff, signaling a "customs civil war" that threatens global supply chains. More critically, the threat of an "American surgical strike" on Iran looms large. While Trump offers a 10-to-15-day window for a new nuclear deal, the US has amassed a massive naval presence in the region. Iran has signaled that it may view limited strikes as more tolerable than "total capitulation," while the UK has notably refused to allow US strikes to be launched from British bases, illustrating a rare rift in the "special relationship" and a broader hesitance among Western allies to join Trump's "Peace Council" format.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

- **The Battle for Program SAFE:** The Polish government and opposition are locked in a struggle over 190 billion PLN (44 billion EUR) in EU defense loans. The ruling coalition highlights that 89% of these funds are earmarked for the Polish defense industry, while PiS claims the program forces purchases from EU (specifically German) firms and introduces "political blackmail" via rule-of-law conditionality ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Judicial Plan B and Presidential Retaliation:** Following President Nawrocki's veto of the KRS reform, the government is moving to hold "bottom-up" elections for the Council. In response, the President proposed a bill that would punish judges with up to 10 years in prison for questioning the status of "neo-judges" or following EU court rulings over Polish ones ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **US-Iran Military Escalation:** President Trump is considering a surgical strike against Iranian nuclear and government targets to force a deal. The US has deployed the carrier groups USS Abraham Lincoln and USS Gerald Ford to the region. The UK has refused the use of its bases (Diego Garcia and Fairford) for such strikes, citing international law concerns ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Trump's Global Tariff War:** After the US Supreme Court struck down his previous tariffs as unconstitutional, Trump imposed a new 15% global tariff. US importers are now preparing mass lawsuits to recover over 130 billion dollars in previously paid duties ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Human Trafficking Ring Dismantled:** Polish Border Guards (Straż Graniczna) dismantled a massive international criminal group that trafficked approximately 2,000 South Americans (mostly Colombians) into "modern slavery" in Poland. The group, led by Polish and Ukrainian nationals, laundered millions through shell companies ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Geopolitics & International Relations

- The US "Peace Council" inaugural meeting in Washington was snubbed by major EU allies (Germany, France) and "Global South" leaders (India, Brazil), appearing more as a "real estate development project" for Gaza than a diplomatic forum ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- Poland is urged by the US to invest more in its own security rather than relying solely on American guarantees, a sentiment that underpins the European SAFE initiative ([Source](#)).
- Ukraine reported the liberation of 300 sq km in its southern theater, while oil transit disputes with Hungary and Slovakia persist ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

Domestic Stability & Social Order

- The "Poland 2050" party has formally split into two parliamentary clubs: "Polska 2050" and "Centrum," leaving the coalition majority stable but creating a "telenovela" of internal leadership struggles ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- A surge in hate crimes against Ukrainians was highlighted by an incident in Warsaw where a taxi driver used pepper spray on a pregnant Ukrainian woman ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- The "Waste Mafia" (Mafia Śmieciowa) investigation continues, with 140 arrests related to illegal hazardous waste dumping at 56 sites across Poland, costing the state roughly 1 billion PLN ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

Critical Infrastructure & Energy Security

- A major heating pipe failure in Krakow sent a 10-meter geyser of hot water into the air, briefly disrupting traffic but not yet cutting off residents ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- Transit of Russian oil through Ukraine remains a point of friction; Ukraine claims infrastructure damage from Russian strikes prevents flow to Hungary and Slovakia ([Source](#)).

AI & Technology

- Interpol warned that AI is "changing the game" for cybercrime, allowing massive-scale phishing and deepfake audio/video that makes detection nearly impossible for traditional law enforcement ([Source](#)).
- The US Ambassador to Poland, Thomas Rose, was criticized for using AI-generated images to promote false historical narratives about the US-Poland alliance ([Source](#)).

Legislation

- **SAFE Program Act:** Legislation to create a financial mechanism in the BGK bank to handle EU defense loans. Passed by Senate with amendments to increase oversight by ABW/SKW ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **KRS Reform Bill (Government):** Vetoed by the President. Aimed to restore judge-led appointments to the Council ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **President's Judicial Project:** A counter-proposal that criminalizes questioning judicial appointments and expands Presidential power over court regulations. Sent to the Venice Commission by the Sejm Speaker ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- **Divorce Reform (Proposal):** A government plan to allow administrative divorces (via Registry Offices) for childless couples married for at least one year who agree on terms, aimed at de-clogging courts ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

LEGISLATION/POLICY

Policy discussion was dominated by the SAFE defense funding mechanism and the fallout from President Nawrocki's judicial veto. The government is attempting to streamline administrative processes (divorce reform) while fighting PiS for control over the narrative of military modernization and European integration.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **SAFE Program Financial Mechanism:** Sets up the National Development Bank (BGK) to manage 190 billion PLN in EU loans for defense. Senate amendments ensure the debt does not burden the Ministry of Defense (MON) budget directly and places spending under intelligence agency scrutiny. ([Source](#), [Source](#))
- **Government KRS Reform:** Proposed a shift to direct, secret elections of judges to the KRS by other judges. Vetoed by the President on Feb 19. ([Source](#), [Source](#))

HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **PiS "Time for a Safe Poland" Convention:** Held in Stalowa Wola (a SAFE beneficiary). Jarosław Kaczyński and Mariusz Błaszczak argued the SAFE program puts Poland under "German boots" and uses "conditionality" to force LGBT and migration policies on Poland. DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The Weaponization of Defense Funding

A significant shift is occurring where defense spending—historically a point of consensus in Poland—is becoming a primary partisan weapon. The SAFE program is being used by the ruling coalition to show economic competence (3% interest rates vs. 6% under PiS) and by the opposition to stoke anti-EU sentiment. PiS's rhetoric has moved from supporting SAFE in late 2025 to labeling it "treason" today, likely a tactical move to reclaim voters lost to the more radical Confederation and

Grzegorz Braun. This suggests that military modernization will remain stalled or highly litigious until the next election ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

Strategic Loneliness of the US Executive

President Trump's "Peace Council" and strike threats against Iran demonstrate a growing isolation of the US Presidency. Major allies (UK, Germany, France) are openly questioning the legality of his planned military operations and his bypass of the Supreme Court on trade. The UK's refusal to grant base access is a watershed moment, suggesting that the "Special Relationship" is under unprecedented strain. This creates a vacuum that China and Russia are actively exploiting, as evidenced by their joint naval maneuvers with Iran in the Gulf of Oman ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

Legal and Institutional Anarchy in Poland

Poland is entering a phase of dual legal realities. The government's "Plan B" for the KRS and the President's "Muzzle Law" indicate that neither side recognizes the other's legitimacy. This "legal civil war" is moving from the abstract to the punitive, with the President now proposing actual prison sentences for judges who adhere to European legal standards. This institutional breakdown is likely to paralyze civil courts, extending wait times for citizens and increasing the risk of "neo-judge" rulings being invalidated years later ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks): The US-Iran situation will likely reach a climax; if no deal is reached in 10-15 days, surgical strikes are probable, leading to a spike in Brent crude prices and potential mine-laying in the Strait of Hormuz. In Poland, President Nawrocki is

expected to veto the SAFE financing bill, forcing the government to use "temporary" budget measures to sustain defense contracts ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

Medium Term (1-6 Months): US importers will flood the courts with lawsuits regarding the "unconstitutional" 130 billion in tariffs, potentially creating a fiscal crisis for the US Treasury. In Poland, the "bottom-up" KRS elections will create a Council that the President will refuse to recognize, leading to a total halt in new judicial appointments ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

Long Term (1-5 Years): A structural shift in the EU defense industry is likely as SAFE (if implemented) favors European over American suppliers, potentially causing a long-term decline in US defense exports to the Continent. Poland may face a "regime of two laws" where judicial validity depends entirely on which party holds the Ministry of Justice and the Presidency ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy:

- Diplomats should prepare for a "customs civil war" in the US where executive orders on trade are ignored by ports or stayed by lower courts following the Supreme Court precedent ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
- Security planners must account for the loss of British base access for US operations in the Middle East, requiring a heavier reliance on sea-based carrier groups or less-stable regional partners ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

- The EU should brace for a Polish "veto-fest" on all legislation linked to rule-of-law conditionality as President Nawrocki aligns with the PiS "German boot" narrative ([Source](#), [Source](#)).

For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Supply Chain Risk:** The 15% global US tariff and potential Strait of Hormuz closure present a "double squeeze" on manufacturing costs and shipping reliability ([Source](#), [Source](#), [Source](#)).
- **Regulatory Uncertainty:** Investors in Poland's defense sector must navigate conflicting funding streams (SAFE vs. MON budget) and the risk of contract nullification if the presidency changes hands or judicial reforms are overturned ([Source](#), [Source](#)).
