



### SERBIA: CONVERGENCE OF CRISES & INSTITUTIONAL PARALYSIS (REPORT: FEBRUARY 23, 2026)



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SERBIA FACES SYSTEMIC INSTITUTIONAL PARALYSIS AS AGRARIAN UNREST, JUDICIAL STRIKES, AND ACADEMIC PURGES COINCIDE WITH ESCALATING REGIONAL AND GLOBAL SECURITY THREATS.

## DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

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February 23, 2026, marks a critical convergence of domestic crises in Serbia, characterized by a deepening chasm between the executive branch and various professional and social sectors. The state is currently grappling with a multi-front challenge: a 12-day-long farmer protest movement that has announced [imminent radicalization](#), a total work stoppage by the legal profession in response to controversial judicial reforms, and a visible "purge" of the educational system. These domestic tensions are being exacerbated by a government strategy of legislative "fast-tracking" that critics argue is designed to dismantle judicial independence and consolidate authoritarian control. The paralysis of the High Council of Prosecutors (VST) highlights the [institutional deadlock](#), as

internal factions struggle over the implementation of the so-called "Mrdic Laws."

Simultaneously, the administration is attempting to project a sense of normalcy by scheduling local elections in nine municipalities, even as it conducts arrests of veterans accused of plotting to [overthrow the constitutional order](#). This "securitization" of domestic dissent—labeling protesters and critics as state enemies—mirrors broader regional instability. Internationally, the fourth anniversary of the invasion of Ukraine looms, with Slovakian leadership threatening to [cut energy supplies](#) to Kyiv, and Mexican security forces precipitating a wave of cartel violence in World Cup host cities following the assassination of a major drug kingpin. The day reflects a global trend where domestic governance is increasingly reliant on "lawfare" and emergency measures to maintain stability against fragmenting social contracts.

## MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

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### Agrarian Revolt and Infrastructure Blockades

- Farmers entered their 12th day of protests against low subsidies and unvetted imports, announcing a transition to [24-hour radicalized blockades](#) starting February 24.
- Protesters have rejected government offers of dialogue, citing previous "manipulations" and a lack of concrete action on [milk price protections](#).
- Strategic road arteries, including those leading to border crossings and major hubs like Sabac and Kragujevac, are targeted for total closure, threatening [national supply chains](#).

## Judicial Strike and Institutional Paralysis

- The Bar Association of Serbia initiated a three-day total strike to protest the "Mrdic Laws," which they claim [subordinate the judiciary](#) to executive whims.
- The High Council of Prosecutors failed to approve its agenda, leaving the status of over 20 prosecutors in the [organized crime division](#) in legal limbo as a 30-day deadline for their reassignment approaches.
- Judges and prosecutors are being urged by the legal community to join the rebellion against laws that allegedly protect corrupt [officials from prosecution](#).

## Academic Purge at the 5th Belgrade Gymnasium

- The Ministry of Education has effectively overseen the suspension of 10 professors, including key faculty members who attended an [Academy of Sciences \(SANU\)](#) meeting.
- The outgoing acting director issued suspensions even after her legal mandate had expired, prompting accusations of [illegal administrative retaliation](#).
- The Minister of Education, Dejan Vuk Stankovic, defended the move, suggesting that those who disagree with state education policy are [free to leave](#).

## Global Security Flaring: Mexico and Ukraine

- The killing of "El Mencho," leader of the Jalisco New Generation Cartel, has turned Guadalajara into a [war zone](#) just months before it is set to host the 2026 World Cup.

- Slovakia's Robert Fico has threatened to halt electricity exports to Ukraine in response to a [transit dispute over Russian oil](#), signaling a breakdown in EU-Ukraine energy solidarity.
- Volodymyr Zelensky warned in a BBC interview that [World War III](#) has effectively begun, emphasizing that a ceasefire would only serve to rebuild Russian forces.

## KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

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### Rule of Law and Legal Warfare (Lawfare)

The Serbian government is accused of using legislative "sets" of judicial laws to effectively "abduct" the state from its citizens. The strike by lawyers is a response to the [Mrdic Laws](#), which critics argue are designed to prevent the arrest of high-ranking officials for corruption. The inability of the High Council of Prosecutors to function suggests that the [Security-Administrative complex](#) is actively sabotaging institutional checks and balances.

### Civil Unrest and Domestic Stability

Internal stability is deteriorating as disparate groups—farmers, students, and legal professionals—begin to [coordinate dissent](#). The arrest of individuals for "preparing an attack on the constitutional order" in the context of [upcoming March protests](#) suggests the state is shifting toward a pre-emptive security posture to stifle the "Freedom Week" initiatives planned by student and opposition groups.

**Corruption and Governance** Allegations of high-level corruption are surfacing in the regional hubs, specifically Bor, where city leaders are accused of [misusing funds](#) for international rallies. The failure of the police to act on prosecutorial orders in these cases highlights a [breakdown in state capacity](#) to enforce the law against its own members.

## Media Freedom and Information Warfare

Research indicates a systematic, pro-regime media campaign to [discredit independent outlets](#) like N1 and Nova. Experts describe a "boiled frog" strategy, where the state seeks to [smother independent journalism](#) through ownership changes and relentless character assassination of journalists, labeling them "anti-state" actors.

**AI and Technology Policy** Technology is increasingly intersecting with traditional institutions. From [AI-generated religious services](#) to the use of big data by religious groups to target vulnerable individuals, the digital sovereignty of the individual is under threat. Furthermore, the use of [AI in the literary industry](#) is raising significant concerns regarding intellectual property and the replacement of human labor.

## LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

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The day was dominated by the fallout from the "Mrdic Laws" and the tactical scheduling of local elections to consolidate power in contested regions. The executive branch's "emergency procedure" for systemic laws has drawn sharp rebukes from the international community and domestic legal experts.

### BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **The "Mrdic Laws" (Judicial Set):** A series of legislative amendments that critics claim limit the independence of judges and prosecutors. The Bar Association is striking to have these [immediately rescinded](#).
- **Local Election Law Amendments:** Used to facilitate the [March 29 elections](#) in nine municipalities, ensuring they occur before the opposition can fully mobilize.

- **Judicial Reform Implementation Acts:** Regulations governing the return of specialized prosecutors to [parent offices](#), currently causing a backlog in organized crime cases.

## HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **High Council of Prosecutors (VST) Session:** Failed to adopt a [working agenda](#) due to the strategic absence of pro-regime members and the abstention of key independent prosecutors.
- **Ana Brnabic Press Conference:** Formally called local elections and offered a [belated dialogue](#) on judicial laws, which was dismissed by striking lawyers as "post-festum" and insincere.
- **Novosadska Novinarska Skola Research Briefing:** Detailed 3,000 documented [attacks on independent media](#) by pro-regime tabloids over the past year.

## DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

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**The "Boiled Frog" Strategy of Autocratization** The Serbian administration appears to be moving away from overt repression toward a more subtle, administrative strangulation of dissent. Whether through the [reorganization of media ownership](#) or the use of "Mrdic's Laws" to quietly reassign troublesome prosecutors, the trend is one of institutional hollowing. By maintaining the facade of democratic processes—such as [local elections](#) and "dialogue"—while simultaneously suspending professors and arresting veterans, the state creates a confusing environment for international observers and domestic opposition alike.

## Fragmentation of the "European Path"

Slovakia's threat to Ukraine and Serbia's increasingly defiant judicial stance suggest a fracturing of the "Green Light" from Brussels. Serbia's leadership is signaling that it no longer feels compelled to follow [Venice Commission](#) recommendations if they conflict with domestic power consolidation. This trend toward "nationalized" rule of law is a significant threat to regional EU integration efforts.

## The Securitization of Economic Grievance

The farmer protests have shifted from purely economic demands to a broader political movement. The government's response—labeling these "[pajama millionaires](#)" and dismissing their concerns as "market realities"—has backfired, leading to a [radicalization](#) that now encompasses students and other labor sectors. The use of "state of emergency" rhetoric against veterans and protesters suggests the government is preparing for a period of heightened civil unrest.

## STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

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### Short Term (1-4 Weeks)

- Expect significant economic disruption as [24-hour blockades](#) by farmers paralyze transit between major Serbian cities and border crossings.
- A surge in "lawfare" as the 30-day window for [prosecutorial reassignments](#) expires on March 11, likely leading to the dismissal of key anti-corruption investigators.
- Increased security presence in Guadalajara and other [World Cup host cities](#) as cartels retaliate for the Mencho assassination.

### Medium Term (1-6 Months)

- The March 29 local elections will serve as a bellwether for the [unified opposition/student lists](#); a regime sweep would likely trigger a new wave of mass protests similar to the 1996 movements.
- If the Slovakia-Ukraine [energy dispute](#) is not resolved, Central Europe may face a summer energy crisis that undermines the unified front against Russia.
- The "boiled frog" takeover of [United Media](#) will likely be finalized, removing one of the last remaining platforms for independent political discourse in the Balkans.

### Long Term (1-5 Years)

- Structural capture of the judiciary via the [Mrdic Laws](#) will create a "legalized" system of impunity for political elites, making future democratic transitions significantly more difficult.
- The demographic collapse of the Serbian [agricultural sector](#), as younger generations flee to the cities or abroad, will lead to a permanent dependence on food imports and a loss of national food sovereignty.

## RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

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### For International Policy:

- **Sanction Monitoring:** Evaluate the use of EU funds in municipalities like Bor where [political corruption](#) is being shielded by the police and the "Mrdic Laws."
- **Diplomatic Pressure:** Ensure the Venice Commission remains firm on the [unconstitutionality](#) of recent judicial reforms to prevent a total collapse of Rule of Law standards in a candidate country.

- **Security Coordination:** Immediate reassessment of World Cup 2026 [security protocols](#) in Mexico given the high probability of sustained cartel warfare.

#### **For Private Sector/Investors:**

- **Supply Chain Risk:** Diversify transit routes through the Balkans to avoid the [radicalized road blockades](#) which are expected to intensify through March.
- **Regulatory Compliance:** Investors in Serbian infrastructure should prepare for a [legal vacuum](#) as organized crime prosecutors are forcibly reassigned and the High Council of Prosecutors remains paralyzed.
- **Reputational Risk:** Media investors should be wary of entering the Serbian market as the state systematically targets [independent shareholders](#) and facilitates hostile takeovers of non-regime outlets.
