DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

February 24, 2026, marks the fourth anniversary of the Russian invasion of Ukraine, characterized by a strategic stalemate on the front lines and a deepening diplomatic schism within the Western coalition. While EU leaders converged in Kyiv to signal continued solidarity, the atmosphere was marred by the [veto of Hungary and Slovakia](#) on the 20th sanctions package and a €90 billion aid deal. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy remains firm against territorial concessions, despite reportedly mounting pressure from the Donald Trump administration in Washington to accept a "peace for land" swap and move toward elections. The conflict has evolved into a war of attrition where Russia, despite massive

casualties, has gained less than 1% additional territory in the past year, while Ukraine struggles with a [humanitarian crisis](#) involving over 80,000 missing persons and systematic energy infrastructure destruction.

In Croatia, the government is embroiled in a constitutional crisis regarding defense policy and coalition stability. Defense Minister Ivan Anušić's visit to Israel to discuss military-technical cooperation has drawn a sharp rebuke from President Zoran Milanović, who has declared any [potential agreements unenforceable](#). Simultaneously, the ruling HDZ-led majority is threatened by ideological rift between the HSLS and the Homeland Movement (DP) following a scandal involving DP's Josip Dabro and nationalist iconography. Regionally, Serbia faces domestic instability with radicalized farmers' roadblocks and the [arrest of military veterans](#) accused of plotting a coup. Globally, the elimination of CJNG cartel leader "El Mencho" has plunged Mexico into a "war zone" state, threatening the security of 2026 World Cup host cities.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

- **The Ukraine-Russia War Fourth Anniversary**
 - Ukraine reports nearly 500,000 total casualties since 2022, with 80,000 individuals [officially listed as missing](#).
 - The EU's 20th sanctions package remains stalled due to Hungarian and Slovakian objections over energy transit and aid funding.
 - Zelenskyy rejects a ceasefire, arguing it would merely allow [Putin to rebuild forces](#) for a future offensive.

• **Croatian Defense and Constitutional Conflict**

- Defense Minister Anušić visited Israel to discuss "active protection systems" for German-made tanks, despite presidential opposition.
- President Milanović has called for a [suspension of all arms deals](#) with Israel, citing international law and constitutional prerogatives.
- The "Batak Coalition" of liberal and center parties is forming to challenge HDZ in upcoming elections [against the current government](#).

• **Mexican Security Crisis**

- The killing of Nemesio "El Mencho" Oseguera Cervantes triggered widespread cartel retaliation across Jalisco and neighboring states.
- Guadalajara, a 2026 World Cup host city, experienced [burned vehicles and roadblocks](#), prompting a "red code" security alert.

• **UK Political and Legal Upheaval**

- Lord Peter Mandelson was arrested in London on suspicion of [misconduct in public office](#) related to the Jeffrey Epstein investigation.
- The British government faces calls for an inquiry into the timing of the arrest and Mandelson's recent diplomatic appointments.

• **Serbian Civil and Political Unrest**

- Farmers have announced radicalized roadblocks across Serbia starting February 25, rejecting government proposals for dairy and crop subsidies.
- Authorities in Kraljevo arrested two veterans of the 63rd Parachute Brigade for an [alleged plot to assassinate](#) high-ranking state officials.

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Geopolitical Power Dynamics & International Relations

- The shift in U.S. foreign policy toward a mediatory role, rather than a direct ally of Ukraine, has forced the EU to consider becoming a ["rule maker" on its own continent](#).
- Internal EU friction is increasing as Hungary uses its veto on Ukraine aid as leverage for its own domestic energy and financial needs.
- The U.S. Supreme Court's decision to [overturn Trump's previous tariff decisions](#) has injected legal uncertainty into global trade relations.

Coalition Cohesion & Domestic Stability

- The Croatian ruling majority is managing an ["ultimatum" from HSLS leader Dario Hrebak](#) regarding the conduct of DP's Josip Dabro, though the government recently secured 77 votes for a new minister.
- Serbian governance is under pressure from "pijanih milionera" (drunk millionaires), a derogatory term used by the Agriculture Minister for protesting farmers, which has [inflamed agrarian unrest](#).

Energy Security & Critical Infrastructure

- Ukraine has reportedly [suspended oil flow](#) through the Družba pipeline, impacting Hungary and Slovakia, while Croatia offers 100% supply capacity via Janaf.
- A warehouse fire at a key Russian oil hub in Tatarstan indicates ongoing [vulnerabilities in Russian energy infrastructure](#) amid Ukrainian drone strikes.

Rule of Law & Corruption

- The Serbian High Council of Prosecutors failed to appoint permanent prosecutors for organized crime due to [disputes over the "Mrđić laws"](#), leading to a three-day lawyer strike.
- In Croatia, the Administrative Court ruled against the Ministry regarding the [inclusivity allowance for the disabled](#), highlighting systemic failures in social care governance.

LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

Legislative activity centered on judicial reforms in Serbia and a burgeoning debate over ideological symbols in Croatia. Significant tension exists between executive action and judicial oversight in both the U.S. and Southeast Europe, particularly regarding trade and social welfare.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **Mrđić Laws (Serbia):** Contentious judicial legislation requiring prosecutors to return to their home offices by March 11, potentially [paralyzing organized crime investigations](#).

- **Communist Symbol Ban (Croatia - Proposed):** A proposed law by the Homeland Movement to [ban all communist and anti-fascist symbols](#), which Prime Minister Plenković has stated his government will not support.
- **Inclusivity Allowance Regulation (Croatia):** Ongoing legal and legislative dispute regarding the [calculation of social benefits](#) for persons with disabilities following a court defeat for the Ministry.

HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **Zelenskyy Interview/Video Address:** Discussed the "unacceptable" nature of [land-for-peace trades](#) and the need for security guarantees that transcend presidential terms.
- **Anušić-Katz Meeting (Tel Aviv):** High-level defense meeting focusing on the [Trophy active protection system](#) for Leopard 2A8 tanks.
- **Serbian Agriculture Ministry Presser:** Minister Glamočić claimed solutions for the milk and crop crisis are [already resolved](#), a claim rejected by protest leaders.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The Evolution of Strategic Fatigue

Four years into the conflict, "fatigue" is no longer just a rhetorical device but a structural reality. In Ukraine, the population is grappling with the [coldest winter of the war](#) and a relentless energy crisis. Public sentiment is shifting from the hope of a swift victory to the grim reality of preserving statehood. The U.S. shift from "ally" to "mediator" signals a trend toward [strategic realignment](#), where the European Union must decide if it has the

military and financial autonomy to sustain a war effort without American leadership.

Constitutional Lawfare as Political Weaponry

The Croatian case study of Minister Anušić's Israeli visit versus President Milanović's veto illustrates a broader trend of "lawfare" within governance. By utilizing constitutional prerogatives to [block defense procurement](#), political actors are increasingly paralyzing state capacity to achieve domestic leverage. This trend suggests that national security is becoming secondary to elite political positioning ahead of the 2026-2027 election cycles.

Transnational Crime and State Fragility

The events in Mexico and Serbia highlight a disturbing trend where non-state actors (cartels) or anti-establishment groups (veteran plotters/farmers) can [effectively challenge state sovereignty](#). The use of "red codes" and mass roadblocks suggests that even states with significant security apparatuses are struggling to maintain social order against decentralized or highly motivated internal opposition.

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks): Expect a significant escalation in Serbian civil unrest as farmers move to [radicalize roadblocks](#). In Croatia, the coalition will likely survive the immediate "Dabro crisis" as HDZ seeks to secure 76+ votes through independent "hands" like Boška Ban. The Mexican government will maintain a heavy military presence in Gvadalajara to suppress CJNG remnants before the World Cup countdown intensifies.

Medium Term (1-6 Months): The EU will likely attempt to [bypass Hungarian vetoes](#) through bilateral aid agreements for Ukraine. Pressure on Zelenskyy to hold a referendum or agree to a ceasefire will peak in late spring as U.S. "peace initiatives" become more formalized. Defense procurement in Croatia will remain stagnant as the constitutional dispute between the President and Prime Minister heads toward an [impasse in the Constitutional Court](#).

Long Term (1-5 Years): The Ukraine conflict is trending toward a "frozen" status similar to the Cyprus model, with [international security guarantors](#) and free economic zones. Europe will undergo a major structural shift toward "One Health" and self-sufficient energy grids to mitigate the risks of future zoonotic pandemics and Russian energy blackmail. The 2026 World Cup will serve as a [stress test](#) for Mexican state capacity to host global events amidst cartel warfare.

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy:

- EU members must accelerate the [reform of the unanimity voting system](#) for sanctions to prevent individual states from compromising continental security policy.
- Diplomatic efforts should prioritize the [stabilization of the Balkans](#), as Serbian veteran arrests and agrarian unrest suggest a region vulnerable to hybrid warfare and internal collapse.
- Security guarantors for any Ukraine peace deal must include [non-U.S. powers](#) to ensure durability beyond the 2028 U.S. election cycle.

For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Supply Chain Risk:** Investors in energy intensive industries should shift reliance from the Družba pipeline toward [alternative routes like Janaf](#) as Ukraine-Russia infrastructure attacks escalate.
- **Regulatory Compliance:** European businesses must prepare for a [fragmented legal landscape](#) in Serbia as the prosecutor's office faces a potential exodus of staff and systemic delays.
- **Emerging Tech Opportunity:** The move toward [straw-based construction](#) and sustainable materials in Germany represents a significant opportunity for green-tech investors as traditional steel and concrete production faces carbon-pricing pressure.
