



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### DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

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February 25, 2026, is defined by a stark contrast between the rhetorical projection of a "Golden Age" in the United States and the unfolding institutional and economic crises in the Western Balkans. In Washington, President Donald Trump delivered the longest State of the Union address in history, claiming total victory over inflation, illegal immigration, and global conflict. However, this triumphalism faces a boycott from congressional Democrats and a sharp rebuttal from the opposition, which highlights deep domestic polarization and skepticism regarding the administration's "prosperity" data. The convergence of an aggressive "America First" trade policy with rising tensions in the Middle East—specifically the looming threat of military action against Iran—suggests a shift toward unilateral power projection that could further strain traditional alliances.

Simultaneously, Bosnia and Herzegovina (BiH) is teetering on the edge of financial isolation and social collapse. The failure of the Council of Ministers to adopt critical anti-money laundering laws and reforms for the EU Plan for Growth has placed 800 million euros in funding at risk and invited an [impending financial isolation](#) by Moneyval. This legislative paralysis is mirrored by a surge in civil unrest, as farmers, transport workers, and veterans prepare for nationwide blockades. In Sarajevo, the "Gras" transport scandal has evolved from a tragic accident into a broader investigation of systemic corruption, while the national broadcaster BHRT faces imminent closure due to unmanaged debts. Across the border in Serbia, massive farmer protests across 42 locations signal a regional trend of agrarian discontent that threatens internal stability.

### MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

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- **Trump's State of the Union: Rhetoric vs. Reality**
  - President Trump delivered a [record-setting speech](#) lasting 107 minutes, focusing on domestic "miracles" and unilateral foreign policy wins.
  - Claims include zero illegal immigration in nine months, core inflation dropping to 1.7%, and the "ending" of eight international conflicts through the threat of tariffs.
  - The official Democratic response, delivered by Virginia Governor Abigail Spanberger, accused the president of [enriching himself and his family](#) while deepening economic inequality.

- **Bosnia and Herzegovina's Financial Cliff**

- Political obstruction, largely attributed to SNSD's absence from key sessions, has stalled the [ratification of EU grant agreements](#) worth nearly one billion euros.
- Moneyval's "grey list" looms as the state fails to pass laws on property seizure and anti-terrorism financing, threatening the country's international credit standing and investment climate.
- The national broadcaster BHRT is under threat of [forced debt collection](#) by the European Broadcasting Union (EBU), which could result in a total blackout of public programming.

- **Escalating Civil Unrest in Serbia and BiH**

- In Serbia, 32 agricultural associations have initiated [radicalized blockades](#) at 42 locations due to a collapse in dialogue with the Ministry of Agriculture over dairy and grain subsidies.
- Bosnian veterans and transport workers have announced nationwide "social rebellions" for March, citing the government's failure to address low wages and the looming financial crisis.

- **The Ukraine War's Fourth Anniversary and "Frozen" Conflicts**

- Marking the [fourth year of the invasion](#), EU leaders converged in Kyiv to pledge continued support, though specific dates for EU accession were notably withheld.
- President Zelensky, in a series of high-level interviews, signaled a [readiness to freeze frontlines](#) at current contact points, provided robust security guarantees—specifically from the U.S.—are signed and implemented.

- **Systemic Corruption Investigation in Sarajevo**

- The investigation into a fatal tramway accident in Sarajevo has expanded into a [major economic crimes case](#) involving the public transport operator Gras.
- Prosecutors revealed that CCTV systems in public transport had not functioned for months, and investigations now target suspicious procurement of "magnetic brakes" from Czech manufacturers.

## **KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS**

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### **Economic Security & Financial Resilience**

The Western Balkans are facing a crisis of state capacity. In BiH, the [delay of anti-money laundering legislation](#) is not merely a technical failure but a strategic bottleneck that risks de-linking the country from European financial markets. The inability of the state to manage the 22 million KM debt of BHRT to the EBU reflects a broader collapse in [public financial management](#). Conversely, the U.S. administration is leveraging its market size to enforce "America First" trade terms, with Trump touting the "modern day gold mine" of tariffs [replacing traditional income taxes](#), a move that analysts view as highly disruptive to global supply chains.

**Corruption & Rule of Law** The Sarajevo "Gras" case illustrates the lethal consequences of [institutionalized corruption](#), where safety protocols were bypassed for years. Prosecutors have noted a lack of qualified forensic experts in the Federation, indicating a [weakened judicial infrastructure](#) unable to handle complex technical investigations. Meanwhile, in the U.K., the arrest and subsequent bail of Lord Peter Mandelson on [charges of leaking sensitive information](#) to the late Jeffrey Epstein

underscores a persistent crisis in elite governance and the "revolving door" between political power and private interests.

**Energy Security** The signing of a memorandum between the MT Abraham Group and U.S. partners for [long-term LNG supply](#) highlights the geopolitical weight of the Southern Gas Interconnection. However, Bosnian officials have labeled the deal a "deception," as the private entity lacks the [legal basis to import gas](#) under current state regulations. This highlights the friction between private investment interests and state-led energy sovereignty.

**Domestic Stability & Social Order** The threat of [massive protests in BiH](#) by veterans, police, and transport workers suggests that the "patience of the street" has been exhausted. In Serbia, the [aggressive policing of farmers](#)—with reports of intimidation and coup-plot allegations against veterans—indicates a tightening of state control in response to legitimate economic grievances.

## LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

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Legislative activity today was marked by high-stakes obstruction in the Balkans and controversial unilateral decrees in the U.S. While Washington focused on the implementation of "Trumpian" economic protections, Sarajevo struggled with the most basic requirements for international financial participation.

### BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **BiH Anti-Money Laundering & Terrorism Financing Acts:** Essential for avoiding the Moneyval grey list; [currently stalled](#) due to lack of political consensus on entity-level property rights.

- **BiH Law on Communications (Amendments):** Successfully adopted by the Council of Ministers to require [mandatory registration of prepaid SIM cards](#) to combat anonymous threats and organized crime.
- **FBiH Price Comparison App:** A new regulatory tool to be launched in March allowing citizens to [compare prices across 70 product groups](#) to mitigate the impact of inflation.
- **The "Delilah Law" (U.S. Proposal):** A proposed federal ban on granting [commercial driver's licenses to illegal aliens](#), framed as a national security priority in the State of the Union.

### HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **Sarajevo Cantonal Prosecutor's Press Conference:** A detailed briefing on the [expansion of the Gras investigation](#) into systemic economic crimes and technical negligence.
- **Commission for the Fight Against Corruption (BiH):** Announced public hearings for March 10th and 17th regarding [corruption in the Indirect Taxation Authority](#).
- **State of the Union Address:** President Trump's [marathon address](#) to a joint session of Congress, defining his administration's second-year priorities.

### DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

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**The Weaponization of Tariffs as Diplomacy** A significant theme emerges from Trump's SOTU: the use of economic coercion as a substitute for traditional military or diplomatic engagement. By claiming that [tariffs settled eight wars](#), the administration is

signaling to allies and adversaries alike that market access is the primary lever of American power. This trend toward "mercantilist diplomacy" suggests a future where international alliances are transactional rather than values-based.

### **The Collapse of Public Utilities and Trust**

In Bosnia, the simultaneous crises at Gras and BHRT point to a **failure of the state-owned enterprise model**. Decades of using public companies as "political spoils" for employment and patronage have hollowed out their operational capacity. The revelation that [CCTV systems were non-functional](#) during a fatal accident is a visceral symbol of this decay, where the state fails in its most basic duty: the safety and information of its citizens.

### **Security Guarantees as the New Currency of Peace**

The discourse surrounding the Ukraine war has shifted from "victory" to "guarantees." Zelensky's willingness to accept a [frozen contact line](#) is entirely contingent on a written, binding U.S. commitment to intervene if Russia attacks again. This indicates a growing skepticism toward multilateral frameworks like the UN or even the EU, and a return to bilateral, Great Power security architectures.

## **STRATEGIC FORESIGHT**

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**Short Term (1-4 Weeks):** Expect a **significant spike in civil unrest** across Bosnia and Serbia. The planned March blockades [by veterans and transporters](#) are likely to paralyze regional trade routes. In the U.S., the fallout from the SOTU will likely lead to intensified "lawfare" as the Supreme Court continues to challenge the [administration's tariff authority](#).

**Medium Term (1-6 Months):** If BiH fails to pass the Moneyval requirements by the

summer deadline, the **grey-listing will trigger a sharp increase** in transaction costs for Bosnian businesses and a potential freeze on [foreign investment projects](#). In Ukraine, the "prosperity package" negotiations with the U.S. [in March](#) will determine whether a ceasefire is feasible by the spring.

**Long Term (1-5 Years):** The structural shift in the U.S. toward a **tariff-based revenue model** could permanently alter global trade, potentially leading to a fragmentation of the global economy into rival blocs. In the Balkans, the persistent failure to reform public utilities will likely lead to a **wholesale privatization of infrastructure** under duress, possibly favoring non-Western capital if EU integration remains stalled.

## **RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS**

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### **For International Policy:**

- The EU should prepare for a **contingency funding model** for BiH that bypasses paralyzed state institutions to prevent total social collapse.
- Diplomats must address the [security guarantee gap](#) in Ukraine, as Zelensky's "frozen line" offer is a wasting asset that Russia may soon ignore.
- The US-Iran "Midnight Hammer" warning suggests a **short window for diplomacy** before kinetic action becomes the primary administration tool [against nuclear proliferation](#).

## For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Supply Chain Risk:** Exporters to the U.S. should hedge against a [15% global tariff](#) becoming a permanent fixture of U.S. trade policy regardless of court rulings.
- **Compliance Burden:** Financial institutions operating in the Balkans must prepare for **heightened due diligence** as BiH approaches the Moneyval grey list [by mid-2026](#).
- **Energy Investment:** The Južna Interkonekcija project remains a **high-risk, high-reward** opportunity; investors should verify state-level regulatory permits rather than relying on [private MOUs](#) that lack legal standing.
