





## DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

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February 26, 2026, reveals a Lithuania caught between the accelerating unilateralism of the United States under President Donald Trump and a perceived domestic "lack of urgency" regarding national defense and infrastructure resilience. Strategic analysts and military figures, most notably retired US General Ben Hodges, have issued a stark warning to the Lithuanian public and leadership: the current pace of defense preparations and societal mobilization is insufficient to meet the hybrid and conventional threats posed by Russia. While the government focuses on bureaucratic milestones, the operational reality of hybrid warfare—manifesting in balloon incursions and potential infrastructure sabotage—requires a more aggressive, "war-footing" posture that has yet to materialize in the civilian sector.

Simultaneously, the US transition is fundamentally altering the geopolitical landscape. President Trump's State of the

Union address, characterized by a defiance of the US Supreme Court over tariff authority and a pivot toward "diplomacy backed by naval armada" in Geneva talks with Iran, signals an era of unpredictable international relations. This shift has direct implications for Lithuania, as US attention oscillates between Iran, Cuba, and the war in Ukraine, where Trump claims to be working toward a "ninth war" resolution. Domestically, Lithuania is grappling with institutional friction, including a constitutional challenge to the cabinet's formation, controversial reforms to the national broadcaster (LRT), and a persistent failure to resolve the "renovation trap" that leaves citizens vulnerable to record-high heating costs in inefficient housing.

## MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

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- **US Presidential Defiance and Global Reorientation:** President Trump's annual address signaled a constitutional pivot, declaring his intent to bypass the [Supreme Court's ruling on tariffs](#) and asserting executive control over trade policy. This "America First" posture is paired with a high-stakes [diplomatic push in Geneva](#), where Steve Witkoff and Jared Kushner lead derybos (negotiations) with Iran under the shadow of a massive US naval deployment.
- **Critical Defense Gaps in Lithuania:** Retired General Ben Hodges criticized the Lithuanian [defense policy for lacking skubos \(urgency\)](#), specifically noting that the public remains largely uninvolved in military exercises. He urged the state to respond more forcefully to "grey zone" provocations, such as [balloons from Belarus](#) and shadow fleet activities in the Baltic Sea.

- **Financial Resilience and Anti-Fraud Legislation:** The Bank of Lithuania has proposed over 20 [legislative amendments to combat financial fraud](#). These would mandate that banks compensate clients for unauthorized transactions and allow for the [recovery of stolen funds](#) directly from recipient accounts, shifting the burden of security onto financial institutions.
- **Stalled Housing Infrastructure Reform:** Despite record heating costs, only [15 percent of multi-apartment buildings](#) have been renovated in 20 years. The process remains hindered by [contractor bankruptcies](#), resident disagreements, and rising inflation, creating a significant "energy security" gap for the middle class.
- **Institutional Conflict over Media Governance:** The ruling coalition is pushing for a [new management board for LRT](#), a move criticized by the opposition and the current LRT Council as a [political takeover](#) intended to reduce the broadcaster's independence.

## KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

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### Security Architecture & Hybrid Warfare:

The consensus among security experts is that NATO's Eastern Flank is stronger but psychologically unprepared for sustained hybrid conflict. The [failure to provide a firm response](#) to sabotage and electronic warfare in the "grey zone" is viewed as an invitation for further Russian aggression. Lithuania is urged to move beyond [bureaucratic planning](#) toward practical societal readiness.

**Economic Security & Trade:** Global trade volatility is expected to increase following Trump's vow to [replace the income tax system with tariffs](#). In Lithuania, economic anxiety is focused on [housing affordability](#) and the

"energy poverty" of those living in [unrenovated Soviet-era housing](#), which remains a primary driver of social dissatisfaction.

**Diplomatic Engagement:** Lithuania is balancing its reliance on US security guarantees with a European push for "strategic autonomy." Premier (Prime Minister) Inga Ruginienė's [visit to Brussels](#) focused on securing EU support for [border infrastructure](#) as the US focus shifts toward Iran and the [US-Cuba-Venezuela energy trilemma](#).

**Rule of Law & Corruption:** Internal governance is under stress as the [Constitutional Court reviews](#) the legality of President Nausėda's cabinet formation. Additionally, ethics complaints against [Journalists' Ethics Inspector Dainius Radzevičius](#) highlight tensions within the media oversight bodies regarding transparency and personal financial conduct.

**Biosurveillance:** Healthcare providers are reporting an uptick in [Respiratory Syncytial Virus \(RSV\)](#) cases. While not a national emergency, it is placing [strain on pediatric wards](#) and prompting calls for better diagnostic testing for the elderly, who are seeing higher complication rates.

## LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

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The Lithuanian parliament (Seimas) is preparing for a heavy spring session focused on financial security, national broadcaster governance, and educational reform. Significant debate is expected over the role of the state in mitigating private financial loss and the degree of political influence over public media.

## BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **Financial Fraud Protection Package:** A suite of 20+ amendments proposed by the [Bank of Lithuania](#) to tighten mokėjimo operacijų (payment operation) security and mandate bank refunds for [victims of "impersonation" fraud](#).
- **LRT Law Amendments:** A controversial proposal to [establish a new Management Board](#) and expand the LRT Council to 15 members, which critics argue [maintains or increases political leverage](#) over the broadcaster.
- **Seimas Statute Amendments:** Aimed at preventing "filibustering" by restricting the ability of MPs to [register excessive or groundless proposals](#) to slow down urgent legislation.
- **Education Integration Policy:** A move in Vilnius to direct [non-EU elementary students exclusively](#) to Lithuanian-language schools to improve integration and language proficiency.

## HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **Constitutional Court Case:** Opening of the case regarding whether [President Nausėda violated the Constitution](#) by confirming a reduced 12-member cabinet.
- **State Construction Inspection:** A [site visit to the President's residence](#) regarding a temporary fence in a regional park; no violations were officially found, though the [fence was partially dismantled](#) just prior to the visit.
- **Alytus Gymnasium Strike:** Teachers and union representatives met with the Mayor to [protest the firing of an ethics teacher](#), highlighting broader labor tensions in the education sector.

## DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

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**The Psychopolitical Gap in National Defense:** There is a widening chasm between the military's assessment of threat and the civilian administration's "business-as-usual" approach. General Hodges' critique that Lithuania lacks [skubos \(urgency\)](#) suggests that while the military is modernizing, the [societal "immune system"](#)—civil defense, infrastructure protection, and public resilience—is lagging. This makes the country vulnerable to Russian "grey zone" tactics that target public psychology rather than just borders. The ongoing [strike in Alytus](#) and local opposition to [school construction in Vilnius](#) (due to tree removal) indicate that local grievances often supersede national security priorities in the public consciousness.

**Institutional Consolidation vs. Independent Oversight:** The ruling coalition's attempts to restructure the [LRT Management](#) and the ongoing scrutiny of the [Journalists' Ethics Inspector](#) suggest a broader trend toward centralizing control over information and regulatory bodies. Proponents argue this increases efficiency; however, the [opposition sees it as a "filibuster" response](#) meant to insulate the government from criticism. This institutional friction is occurring just as the US enters a period of extreme [executive-judicial conflict](#), potentially providing a "roadmap" for populist maneuvers in Europe.

**The Renovation Stagnation as a Security Risk:** The failure to scale [residential energy renovation](#) is transitioning from an economic issue to a national security one. With heating bills rising, the state's inability to manage [contractor reliability](#) and resident consensus leaves the populace susceptible to economic

shocks. The "renovation trap" is a symptom of [state capacity failure](#), where the government provides the funds but cannot manage the complex social and engineering execution required for a [mass overhaul](#).

## STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

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**Short Term (1-4 Weeks):** Expect heightened [flood risks in the Šilutė and Kaunas regions](#) as ice on the Nemunas and Atmata rivers begins to move. Politically, the [Constitutional Court's](#) initial findings on the cabinet could trigger a minor government reshuffle. The US-Iran derybos in Geneva will likely reach a "make-or-break" point, with Trump's [threat of military strikes](#) remaining a credible escalatory path.

**Medium Term (1-6 Months):** The passage of the [LRT and Anti-Fraud laws](#) in the spring session will redefine the regulatory landscape for banks and media. If the [Hodges critique](#) is taken seriously, we may see the first [large-scale civil-military exercises](#) involving the general public. Inflationary pressures on [construction costs](#) will continue to stall apartment renovations unless the government provides a new guarantee mechanism.

**Long Term (1-5 Years):** Lithuania may face a structural "housing crisis" as [Soviet-era buildings](#) reach the end of their lifecycle without adequate replacements or renovations. Geopolitically, the [strategic failure of Russia](#) to win in Ukraine could lead to more desperate and frequent hybrid attacks on the Baltics, necessitating a permanent [reduction in bureaucratic barriers](#) for defense infrastructure.

## RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

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### For International Policy:

- Lithuania must intensify "Mini-Lateral" cooperation (Baltics-Nordics-Poland) to create a [unified hybrid response](#) that does not wait for a potentially paralyzed US or NATO consensus.
- Diplomats should prepare for "Tariff Warfare" by diversifying [trade routes and partners](#) outside the traditional US-China-EU axis, given Trump's intent to [ignore constitutional norms](#) in trade.
- Monitor the [Zelenskyy-Trump dynamic](#) closely; any "ninth war" resolution could leave Lithuania in a precarious "buffer zone" if security guarantees are not explicitly and physically reinforced.

### For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Regulatory Risk:** Banks must prepare for significantly [higher compliance costs](#) and liability for fraud under the proposed Bank of Lithuania amendments.
- **Opportunity in Housing:** There is a massive, untapped market for ["turnkey" renovation solutions](#) that can bypass the currently fragmented contractor market, provided they include insurance against [warranty failures](#).
- **Infrastructure Vulnerability:** Companies in the Baltic Sea region (energy, telecoms) should increase [private security for subsea assets](#) given the lack of a "firm response" from state actors to recent hybrid threats.
