







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### NIGERIA FACES STRATEGIC POLITICAL CONSOLIDATION AMID LEGAL CRACKDOWNS ON FORMER ELITES AND RISING REGIONAL TENSIONS

#### DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

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February 27, 2026, marked a pivotal moment in Nigeria's transition toward the 2027 general elections, characterized by an aggressive consolidation of power by the ruling All Progressives Congress (APC) and a simultaneous legal offensive against high-profile figures of the previous administration. The defection of Adamawa State Governor Ahmadu Fintiri from the People's Democratic Party (PDP) to the APC, accompanied by his entire cabinet and local government chairmen, signals a near-total collapse of opposition structures in the Northeast. This political shift occurs as the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) revises the election timetable, moving the presidential poll to January 2027 and introducing stringent digital registration requirements that opposition parties have denounced as a "booby trap" designed to

ensure a one-party state under President Bola Tinubu.

Parallel to this political realignment, the Nigerian state has intensified its use of the judiciary to target former power brokers. The remand of former Attorney General Abubakar Malami, along with members of his family, on charges of money laundering and terrorism, suggests a definitive break in elite cohesion and the potential use of "lawfare" to neutralize future political threats. Meanwhile, the security apparatus is undergoing a leadership transition with the appointment of an Acting Inspector General of Police, even as the nation grapples with a persistent "Christian genocide" narrative and escalating cross-border conflicts between Pakistan and Afghanistan, and the revelation that dozens of West Africans have been killed fighting as mercenaries in the Russia-Ukraine war.

#### MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

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##### Political Consolidation and Opposition Collapse

- Governor Ahmadu Fintiri of Adamawa State officially defected to the APC, claiming the move was for [national unity](#) and alignment with President Tinubu's "Renewed Hope" agenda. [Fintiri's defection](#) includes his deputy, cabinet members, and all 21 local government chairmen in the state.
- The African Democratic Congress (ADC) and the New Nigeria People's Party (NNPP) have formally rejected the revised 2026-2027 election timetable, specifically citing the [digital membership](#) register requirement as a tool for exclusion.

## Judicial Offensive Against Former Elites

- Former Attorney General and Minister of Justice Abubakar Malami, his son, and his wife were [remanded at Kuje](#) and Suleja correctional centers following a N8.7 billion money laundering re-arraignment by the EFCC.
- Prominent Senior Advocate of Nigeria (SAN) Mike Ozekhome was [granted bail](#) on a 12-count charge involving alleged forgery of international passports and property documents related to the late General Jeremiah Useni.
- A high court in Oyo State affirmed the validity of the 2025 PDP convention that produced Dr. Kabiru Turaki, amidst [ongoing factionalism](#) within the party.

## Security and Counter-Terrorism Transitions

- President Tinubu decorated the new Acting Inspector General of Police, [Sinnjisu](#) (as transcribed), charging him to restore professionalism and public trust after the resignation of the previous IGP.
- The DSS arrested Shafi Usman, the [alleged mastermind](#) behind the deadly 2025 attack on the Equa Church in Kogi State, revealing links to notorious bandit leader Ibrahim Dange.
- The Nigerian military defended ongoing assistance from the [United States](#), insisting it is limited to training and intelligence at no financial cost to the federation.

## Economic Stagnation and Sectoral Divergence

- Nigeria's GDP grew by 4.07% in Q4 2025, yet manufacturing [inflows dropped](#) by over 54% as investors pivoted toward short-term portfolio investments rather than long-term industrialization.
- MTN Nigeria reported a [revenue surge](#) to N5.2 trillion, reflecting a 54.9% growth, while Nestlé Nigeria returned to positive equity after a challenging fiscal period.

## KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

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### Corruption & Governance

- The re-arraignment of Abubakar Malami on charges of [money laundering](#) and terrorism marks a historic level of prosecution for a former Minister of Justice, highlighting a shift in state policy toward penalizing former top-tier cabinet members.
- The NDIC has initiated an [aggressive recovery](#) drive to recoup outstanding loans from 600 failed financial institutions to reimburse depositors.

### Terrorism & National Security

- The rise of the "Lakurawa" group and renewed IED attacks on major highways [threaten regional](#) stability in the Northwest, even as the President urges the Senate to fast-track constitutional amendments for [state police](#).
- Allegations of "Christian genocide" continue to surface in international reports, though domestic analysts warn of [ideological deception](#) used by terrorists to foster religious discord.

## Energy Security & Infrastructure

- The Nigerian Independent System Operator (NISO) blamed [gas supply](#) constraints for the current national grid shortfall, noting that thermal plants require 1.6 billion standard cubic feet of gas per day to reach optimal output.
- The launch of the [Cothan crude](#) grade is expected to boost Nigeria's export earnings and bolster foreign reserves, which currently stand near \$50 billion.

## International Relations & Foreign Policy

- Ghana's foreign ministry confirmed [55 deaths](#) of its nationals fighting for Russia in Ukraine, exposing vast recruitment networks targeting vulnerable African youth with false promises of employment.
- Pakistan and Afghanistan have entered an [open war](#) phase following Islamabad's airstrikes on Kabul in response to Taliban-led border offensives.

## Investment Climate & Technology Policy

- Lagos State is positioning itself as a "Green City," even as developers [encroach on](#) protected spaces, leading to conflicts between municipal planning and concrete sprawl.
- The FCCPC has uncovered [price manipulation](#) and collusion by domestic airlines during the 2025 festive season, leading to a probe into anti-competitive behavior in the aviation sector.

## LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

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Legislative activity focused on the controversial Electoral Act 2026, which has introduced new mandates for political parties that may fundamentally alter the competitive landscape. Additionally, the President has leaned on the National Assembly to initiate constitutional reforms regarding decentralized policing to address the deteriorating security situation.

### BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **Electoral Act 2026 (Sections 77 and 82):** Mandates political parties to submit [digital membership](#) registers by April 2026. Critics argue this is a "booby trap" because the ruling party began its registration a year early while the law was only recently signed.
- **State Police Constitutional Amendment:** Proposed by the President to the [10th Senate](#) to allow for decentralized law enforcement as a response to persistent kidnapping and banditry.
- **Petroleum Industry Act (PIA) Reforms:** Executive orders issued by President Tinubu aim to [systematize revenue](#) flows and reduce the 60% of oil revenue currently lost to "expenses" and administrative charges under the existing PIA framework.

### HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **Opposition Press Conference (ADC/ NNPP):** Leaders of opposition parties met in Abuja to [reject the revised](#) timetable, alleging the APC is working to eliminate all competition ahead of 2027.

- **Lagos Trade and Investment Summit (Invest in Lagos 3.0):** Governor Sanwo-Olu announced a summit to address the [N100 trillion](#) infrastructure shortfall in the state, targeting Commonwealth investors.
- **National Institute of Credit Administration (NICA) Investiture:** Economic experts argued that Nigeria needs a [systemic credit](#) culture to reach its goal of a \$1 trillion GDP.

## DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

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### The Weaponization of the Digital Divide

A critical theme emerging from the electoral debate is the use of technology as a barrier to political participation. The mandate for digital membership registers in a country where only [40% of the population](#) has internet access—a rate that "plunges in rural areas"—is viewed by opposition parties as a calculated effort to disenfranchise their largely rural bases. This "digital lawfare" is a sophisticated evolution of traditional rigging, allowing the state to disqualify opponents on technical rather than electoral grounds. While agritech startups in Jos use [artificial intelligence](#) to monitor soil moisture, the broader population remains excluded from the digital infrastructure required to engage in the new political framework.

### The Mercenary Economy and Global Conflict Spillage

The confirmation of dozens of African deaths in the Ukraine conflict highlights a disturbing trend of globalized poverty. Recruiters are leveraging the high unemployment across the Sahel and West Africa to [lure young men](#) into foreign wars with promises of "lucrative jobs"

that turn into frontline combat roles. This trend suggests that African states are struggling to provide economic alternatives to their "youth bulge," leading to the export of human capital as fodder for distant geopolitical struggles. The vulnerability of these youths is exacerbated by the [non-aligned](#) status of countries like Ghana, which complicates diplomatic negotiations for the release of prisoners of war.

### The Death of "Elite Immunity"

For decades, top-tier Nigerian officials enjoyed a measure of post-tenure immunity through political consensus. The remand of [Abubakar Malami](#)—a man who once held the keys to the nation's legal system—suggests that this era is over. The current administration appears willing to use the EFCC and DSS to pursue former allies and rivals alike to solidify its own legitimacy and demonstrate accountability to international lenders. However, skeptical analysts note that these prosecutions often coincide with political shifts, suggesting they may be more about [neutralizing challengers](#) than a genuine reform of the rule of law.

## STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

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**Short Term (1-4 Weeks):** Expect heightened legal challenges to the Electoral Act 2026 as opposition parties seek injunctions against the [April deadline](#) for digital registers. Political tension in Adamawa and the Northeast will likely increase as the PDP attempts to rebuild its decimated local structures. In the security sector, the new Acting IGP will likely announce a "sweeping reform" package to quell civil unrest over recent abductions.

**Medium Term (1-6 Months):** The debate over [state police](#) will likely reach a fever pitch in the National Assembly, serving as a litmus

test for regional autonomy vs. federal control. Economic indicators may show further divergence; while GDP and [telecom revenues](#) grow, the continued drop in manufacturing FDI will likely lead to increased unemployment in industrial hubs like Lagos and Ogun States.

**Long Term (1-5 Years):** The move toward a dominant one-party state appears well underway if the APC continues to absorb opposition governors. Structural changes to the economy, driven by [gas-to-power](#) initiatives and new crude grades, could stabilize the Naira, but the "human development" deficit (where Nigeria ranks [28th in Africa](#)) remains a long-term threat to regime stability and social order.

## RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

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### For International Policy:

- The international community should monitor the [mercenary recruitment](#) networks in West Africa, as the death toll in Ukraine indicates a destabilizing outflow of military-age males into foreign conflicts.
- Diplomatic engagement with the Tinubu administration should prioritize the preservation of the democratic space, as current [electoral laws](#) threaten to eliminate viable opposition by 2027.
- Security assistance should be balanced between counter-terrorism and the [protection of human rights](#), given the new IGP's challenge to professionalize a force historically prone to abuse.

### For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Regulatory Compliance:** Companies in the aviation and telecom sectors should expect increased scrutiny from the [FCCPC](#) regarding price fixing and consumer exploitation.
- **Energy Investment:** The persistent [gas supply](#) gap presents a massive opportunity for private infrastructure providers, as the state appears unable to meet the 1.6 billion scf/day requirement for the grid.
- **Market Risk:** While [foreign reserves](#) are rising, the 54% drop in manufacturing FDI suggests that long-term capital remains cautious due to structural bottlenecks and the volatile political climate ahead of the 2027 elections.
