





DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

March 2, 2026, marks a potential watershed moment in global geopolitics as reports emerge detailing a massive joint U.S.-Israeli military operation in Iran, allegedly resulting in the death of Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei and dozens of high-ranking officials. The operation, characterized by intensive airstrikes on Tehran's command centers and the deployment of B-2 stealth bombers against underground facilities, has triggered immediate and violent Iranian retaliation across the Persian Gulf. Missiles and drones have reportedly struck targets in Dubai, Bahrain, Qatar, and Oman, while Iranian proxies have targeted Israeli territory. The resulting regional instability has caused global aviation disruptions and a credible threat to the Strait of Hormuz, the world's most critical energy transit chokepoint.

Domestic Taiwan politics are concurrently grappling with the fallout of this conflict alongside a major legislative showdown over a NT\$1.25 trillion arms procurement package. The Taiwan Stock Exchange experienced a severe "Black Monday," with the Taiex plunging over 800 points in early trading as investors fled to safety amidst rising oil prices and fears of a prolonged global energy crisis. Amidst this volatility, the opposition Kuomintang (KMT) is leveraging the crisis to challenge the administration's energy policy—arguing that Taiwan's reliance on Middle Eastern natural gas is a strategic liability—while simultaneously proposing popular social welfare expansions, such as state-funded health insurance for children, to contrast with the government's massive defense expenditures.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

Regional War in the Middle East and the Fall of Tehran

- U.S. and Israeli forces launched a massive daytime strike on Iranian leadership, reportedly [killing 48 leaders](#) including Supreme Leader Khamenei.
- The military operation, dubbed "Epic Fury" or "Eternal Fire" in some reports, involved [B-2 stealth bombers](#) dropping 900kg bunker-buster bombs on underground missile facilities.
- Iran retaliated with its [sixth wave of missile and drone strikes](#) targeting U.S. bases and cities in the UAE, Qatar, and Bahrain.
- The UAE government has pledged to [cover all costs](#) for over 20,000 travelers stranded by the sudden closure of regional airspace.

Financial Market Contagion and Energy Panic

- The Taiwan Stock Exchange opened with an [800-point drop](#), while TSMC shares fell significantly following the escalation.
- Fears of an Iranian [blockade of the Strait of Hormuz](#) have led to immediate spikes in projected oil and gas prices.
- Taiwan's Ministry of Economic Affairs is [convening emergency meetings](#) to address energy security and potential electricity price hikes.

The NT\$1.25 Trillion Defense Budget Battle

- Legislators are debating a massive arms deal, with the KMT proposing a ["compensation version"](#) of the bill to penalize U.S. vendors for delivery delays.
- Opposition figures expressed concern that the [U.S. has delayed](#) US\$133 billion in previously approved sales, suggesting Taiwan's defense is being used as a bargaining chip in U.S.-China trade.
- Controversy persists over the ratio of "commercial sales" versus "foreign military sales," with critics citing [weak risk management](#) in the current package.

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Energy Security The Middle East conflict has exposed Taiwan's extreme vulnerability to energy supply disruptions. While official figures suggest a 35% reliance on certain sources, opposition analysts claim that up to [70% of energy imports](#) originate from or transit through the volatile Middle East. This has led to renewed calls for a total overhaul of the national energy policy to include more

resilient alternatives as natural gas becomes a "strategic trap."

National Security & Defense Procurement

The debate over the NT\$1.25 trillion budget reflects a growing skepticism regarding U.S. reliability as a security partner. Legislators are demanding [new specifications](#) for delayed equipment and strict "late delivery" penalties. There is a burgeoning narrative that Taiwan must avoid becoming a "porcupine" that is easily [crushed by an elephant](#) if it relies solely on expensive, delayed hardware.

Domestic Stability & Social Order

Taiwan is facing a surge in violent incidents and public safety lapses. Reports include [assaults in department stores](#) over perceived slights, [hit-and-run bus accidents](#) involving elderly pedestrians, and [threats of mass killings](#) on the Taipei MRT. Furthermore, the "Kai Kai" child abuse case continues to inflame public anger as caregivers [deny all charges](#) despite evidence of torture.

Geopolitical Power Dynamics

The reported death of Khamenei has created a power vacuum that the U.S. and China are both seeking to influence. In Taiwan, this is reflected in "evacuation politics," where the Ministry of Foreign Affairs is criticized for [not initiating a formal evacuation](#) of Taiwanese citizens, while reports suggest China may be using the crisis to offer assistance to Taiwanese nationals as part of a "United Front" strategy.

Economic Security & Tech Policy

TSMC and other high-tech firms are facing increased pressure as power demands for AI and semiconductors are projected to [increase by 1 million kilowatts](#) annually. The government is struggling to balance these industrial needs against a destabilized global energy market

and a domestic grid prone to [localized blackouts](#) during major festivals.

LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

Legislative activity on March 2 focused heavily on balancing massive national security expenditures with domestic social crises, specifically the plummeting birth rate and energy inflation.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED

- **NT\$1.25 Trillion Arms Procurement Package:** A massive defense spending bill focused on acquiring anti-drone systems, Patriot missile upgrades, and NASAMS. The KMT has introduced a counter-proposal requiring [penalties for delays](#) exceeding six months and mandatory spec upgrades for two-year delays.
- **NHI Premium Subsidy for Children (0-6):** A KMT-led proposal to have the state cover National Health Insurance premiums for all children aged 0-6. Proponents estimate an annual cost of [NT\\$12 billion](#) and argue it is a vital response to the national security threat of "depopulation."
- **Cross-Strait Spouse Rights:** Debate continues regarding the rights of mainland spouses to hold office, with Minister Liu Shyh-fang facing criticism for her [hardline stance](#) while her own family members allegedly conduct business in China.

HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS

- **Energy Security Emergency Briefing:** The Ministry of Economic Affairs discussed the [restoration of an emergency price-adjustment](#) group to manage fuel costs in light of the Middle East war.

- **KMT Social Welfare Presser:** Party leaders emphasized that "policy buying" via [childhood subsidies](#) is necessary to prevent national collapse due to the world's lowest birth rate.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

Energy Vulnerability as a Strategic Flank

The immediate economic shock following the strikes on Iran has highlighted the fragility of Taiwan's "Green Energy" transition. Critics argue the government's push for natural gas has left the island [completely beholden](#) to Middle Eastern stability. The narrative is shifting from environmental benefits to the "Black Hole" of energy costs that could bankrupt the industrial sector if the Strait of Hormuz is closed.

Historical Revisionism and Elite Polarization A bizarre but significant trend is the weaponization of history in contemporary politics. The 101 Chairwoman's criticism of Chiang Kai-shek was met with "ancestral shaming" as opponents pointed out her [descendance from Beiyang warlords](#) responsible for student massacres. This reflects a deeper social trend where political legitimacy is increasingly tied to historical purity and family lineage rather than policy performance.

The Rise of High-Stakes Retail Trading

Amidst the market crash, the "God-like trader" narrative has captured the public imagination. A former engineer reportedly turned [NT\\$7.4 million into NT\\$385 million](#) in eight months through aggressive futures trading. This highlights a dangerous trend of "all-in" gambling among the middle class, driven by a belief that traditional labor cannot keep pace with inflation or housing costs—a

sentiment that could lead to widespread financial ruin if the market [continues to collapse](#).

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks) Expect extreme volatility in Taiwan's energy prices and stock markets. The Ministry of Economic Affairs will likely be forced to [raise electricity rates](#) or announce subsidies to prevent industrial flight. Public pressure will mount for a formal evacuation plan for the [3,000 Taiwanese nationals](#) still in the Middle East. If the Strait of Hormuz remains contested, global shipping surcharges will begin to hit Taiwanese exports.

Medium Term (1-6 Months) The defense budget battle will reach a climax. The KMT's "compensation" clauses could [derail the deal](#) if U.S. contractors refuse the terms. Domestic politics will be dominated by "low birth rate" initiatives as parties compete to offer the most generous [childcare subsidies](#). Diplomatic tensions between Taiwan and the U.S. may rise if the arms procurement is further delayed or leveraged for trade concessions with China.

Long Term (1-5 Years) The reported death of Khamenei and the "Eternal Fire" operation could lead to a permanent restructuring of the Middle East, possibly reducing Iran's role as a regional spoiler but leaving a legacy of [asymmetric warfare](#) and terrorism. For Taiwan, this period will necessitate a move toward total energy independence or a radical diversification of suppliers. The political landscape may shift toward a "Third Way" that prioritizes [domestic health and demographic survival](#) over traditional geopolitical alignment.

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy

- The international community must brace for a protracted period of [energy-market instability](#) if Iranian proxy forces continue to target oil tankers and regional infrastructure.
- Diplomats should monitor the "evacuation gap" in the Middle East, as China may use its superior logistics to [provide humanitarian aid](#) to Taiwanese citizens, thereby undermining the sovereignty of the current administration.
- The U.S. must address the "delivery delay" grievances in Taiwan's legislature to maintain the [integrity of the security architecture](#) in the First Island Chain.

For Private Sector/Investors

- Supply chains involving semiconductors and high-tech components are at risk due to [surging industrial power costs](#) in Taiwan and shipping delays in the Persian Gulf.
- Investors in the Taiwanese market should hedge against [futures-driven volatility](#), as the prevalence of high-leverage retail trading could lead to "flash crashes" during geopolitical shocks.
- Opportunities exist in "demographic resilience" sectors—healthcare, automation, and state-subsidized insurance—as Taiwan pivots to [combat its birth rate crisis](#).
