

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

March 5, 2026, marked a significant pivot in the US-Israel-Iran conflict, transitioning from an attritional air campaign to an explicit effort to manage Iranian regime succession. President Trump declared that he must be [personally involved](#) in selecting Iran's next leader, specifically rejecting the late Supreme Leader's son, Mojtaba Khamenei, as an "unacceptable" choice. This move follows the reported killing of Ayatollah Ali Khamenei in the opening salvos of the war. Simultaneously, the conflict has moved into a "next phase" aimed at [systematically dismantling](#) regime infrastructure, including the destruction of the Azadi Sports Stadium in Tehran, which the IDF claimed was a gathering point for security forces.

The economic consequences of the conflict reached a critical threshold as the Strait of Hormuz remained effectively closed, with over [300 oil vessels](#) trapped in the Gulf. Global energy supplies are facing "astronomical"

insurance hikes, prompting the US Treasury to propose financial guarantees in lieu of traditional insurance. However, the expansion of the war zone to international waters off Sri Lanka—where a US submarine [sank an Iranian frigate](#)—has signaled to commercial shippers that no maritime route is safe. In response to identifying unidentified drones at its facilities, BP began [evacuating foreign staff](#) from the Rumaila oil field in Iraq, further tightening the global supply outlook.

Domestically, President Trump consolidated his cabinet and authority. He replaced Homeland Security Secretary Kristi Noem with [Senator Mark Wayne Mullin](#) following intense criticism of the DHS's immigration enforcement and a controversial crackdown in Minneapolis. In a major win for the executive branch, both the US House and Senate rejected [War Powers resolutions](#) that would have limited the President's ability to wage war without congressional approval. This effectively grants the administration a 60-to-90-day window of unchecked military operations, which the administration claims are "special operations" rather than a full-scale war.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

Unilateral Succession Management and Regime Change

- Trump explicitly compared the Iranian situation to Venezuela, where US forces [seized Nicolas Maduro](#) in January and installed an interim president.
- The administration is vetting "moderate" or "centrist" establishment figures like Hassan Rouhani or Hassan Khomeini, while rejecting the [hereditary succession](#) favored by the IRGC.

- US Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth signaled that the "dumb, politically correct wars of the past" are over, asserting [maximum authorities](#) on the battlefield.

Global Expansion of the War Zone

- The sinking of the Iranian frigate Dana near Sri Lanka is the [first US torpedo sinking](#) since WWII, marking a transition to globalized maritime targeting.
- Azerbaijan was drawn into the conflict following [Iranian drone strikes](#) on its Nakhchivan airport, prompting threats of retaliation.
- NATO air defenses in Turkey intercepted an Iranian missile, though Iran [denies targeting](#) Turkish territory.

The Energy Choke Point and Economic Warfare

- The Strait of Hormuz is at a standstill; 20% of the world's oil and a significant portion of LNG (particularly from Qatar) is [blocked](#).
- BP's evacuation of the [Rumaila oil field](#) in Iraq signals a shift from threat to operational paralyzation of Western energy assets.
- US Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent announced plans for a [15% global tariff](#) to replace sweepingly struck-down import taxes.

Domestic Political Realignment

- Kristi Noem was ousted as DHS Secretary and reassigned as [Special Envoy](#) for the "Shield of the Americas," a newly created position.
- The US House of Representatives voted [219 to 212](#) to reject restrictions on Trump's authority to continue the war.

- UK Prime Minister Keir Starmer defended his refusal to join offensive strikes, citing [international law](#), but faced severe criticism for the "slowness" of the Royal Navy's response.

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Energy Security and Critical Infrastructure The effective closure of the Strait of Hormuz is causing a [logistical nightmare](#) for global trade. Iraq has slashed production as it has [no way of exporting](#). In the US, regular gasoline hit [\\$3.20 per gallon](#), a 30-cent jump in a month, while diesel reached its highest point since the Ukraine invasion. India is reporting [reduced supplies](#) to factories and a halt in Basmati rice exports due to port congestion.

Elite Politics & Leadership Dynamics The removal of Kristi Noem reflects a tension between high-profile "stars" and the President's desire for a [cohesive team](#) that does not overshadow the White House. The appointment of Senator Mark Wayne Mullin, a former [MMA fighter](#), signals a continue preference for "tough" loyalists. In the UK, internal cabinet divisions between Starmer and [Energy Secretary Ed Miliband](#) over the legality of supporting US strikes have been publicly exposed.

Succession and Stability The US administration is operating on the assumption that the Iranian regime is [near collapse](#), but military analysts warned that the IRGC retains a [decentralized command structure](#) designed to survive such scenarios. The "Venezuela Model" of installing Delcy Rodriguez is being used as a template, though experts note that Iran's [theocratic military state](#) is fundamentally different from Maduro's regime.

International Relations and Foreign Policy

The transatlantic relationship is showing "fractures," with European allies like Spain and the UK refusing initial offensive support due to [international law concerns](#). However, as Iran attacks neighbors and British assets, the UK has pivoted to "defensive operations," sending [four typhoon jets](#) to Qatar. China, while protesting the US actions, has been noted for [not interfering](#) to rescue its allies in either Venezuela or Iran, signaling a prioritization of its own domestic stability over global strategic partnerships.

LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

Legislative activity centered on the constitutional limits of presidential war-making power and the funding of immigration enforcement agencies amidst leadership turmoil.

- **War Powers Resolution (Senate & House):** Both chambers [rejected resolutions](#) intended to require congressional approval for further military action in Iran. Republicans argued that the war [had already begun](#) and withdrawal would jeopardize troops.
- **DHS Funding Bill:** The House passed a [funding bill](#) for the Department of Homeland Security, with four Democrats joining Republicans to end a partial government shutdown.
- **China's Ethnic Unity Law:** In Beijing, the National People's Congress is set to pass an [Ethnic Unity Law](#), which critics claim will accelerate the forced integration of minorities by prioritizing Mandarin Chinese.

HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS

- **Keir Starmer Press Conference:** The UK PM defended his "calm, level-headed leadership" and announced that the [first charter flight](#) from Oman had departed. He insisted the UK had been [pre-deploying assets](#) since January.
- **Centcom Briefing (Hegseth/Cooper):** Secretary Hegseth announced that US B2 bombers dropped [2,000-pound penetrator bombs](#) on buried launchers and that 30 Iranian ships have now been sunk.
- **China's National People's Congress:** Leaders lowered the annual growth target to [4.5% to 5%](#), the lowest in decades, citing domestic debt and the real estate crisis.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The End of Traditional Maritime Norms

The US submarine strike in international waters near Sri Lanka signals a definitive end to the "safe harbor" of international waters for Iranian assets. By hitting a vessel [thousands of miles](#) from the conflict zone, the US is telegraphing a doctrine of global reach. This has [immediate implications](#) for the insurance industry, which is now elevating prices to "astronomical levels," effectively forcing commercial trade to seek government-backed alternatives or stay at anchor.

The "Venezuela Model" as Foreign Policy Template

The administration's focus on the success of [Operation Absolute Resolve](#) in Venezuela appears to be the primary intellectual driver for the Iran campaign. Trump's mention of [re-establishing diplomatic relations](#) with Venezuela and re-engaging with Shell for its oil suggests a "capture-and-privatize" approach to regime change. The

administration believes it can replicate this by [hand-picking](#) centrist Iranian leaders who will surrender nuclear ambitions in exchange for regime survival and access to global markets.

Supply Chain Paralyzation Beyond Energy

While oil prices are the headline, the "gumming up" of the [choke point](#) at Hormuz is impacting agriculture via the petrochemical byproduct, [urea](#). As fertilizer production stalls, food security risks are increasing in major agrarian economies like [India](#). This represents an intrinsic part of how the conflict plays out, moving from military damage to broader "economic pain" intended to pressure Gulf states to act as intermediaries or join the offensive.

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks)

- Intensified [evacuation efforts](#) from Lebanon as Israel level parts of Beirut southern suburbs to look like "Khan Younis in Gaza."
- Spiking [US gasoline prices](#) leading to increased domestic political pressure ahead of the midterms.
- Possible [Kurdish ground offensive](#) supported by US air cover into western Iran.

Medium Term (1-6 Months)

- US Navy implementation of [tanker escorts](#) in the Persian Gulf, potentially leading to direct engagements with IRGC small-boat swarms.
- Succession struggle in Tehran between [Mojtaba Khamenei](#) and Western-preferred centrist clerics.

- Formalization of the "Shield of the Americas" initiative under [Noem](#) targeting regional cartels.

Long Term (1-5 Years)

- Structural shift in global energy flows as Europe and Asia [ween off](#) Middle Eastern reliance in favor of more stable, though potentially more expensive, sources.
- The potential "Balkanization" of Iran if [ethnic separatist groups](#) (Kurds, Baluchis) gain significant territorial footholds.
- A new [US-Venezuela-Iran](#) diplomatic axis defined by "pragmatic theocracy" and private industry energy management.

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy

- Security: All nations with assets in the Gulf must prepare for [long-term defensive deployments](#), as the US has indicated it will not unilaterally defend all foreign infrastructure.
- Diplomacy: Allies should seek clarification on the "Venezuela template" to ensure [democratization pathways](#) are not entirely sacrificed for energy stability.
- Legal: The shift toward [unilateral "preemptive self-defense"](#) risks a total breakdown of the UN-led collective security order.

For Private Sector/Investors

- Supply Chain: Manufacturers reliant on [urea or petrochemical byproducts](#) from the Gulf should initiate "Force Majeure" contingencies and seek suppliers outside the Indian Ocean.

- Energy: Shift investment toward [domestic production](#) or "safe" zones (like the North Sea) as the risk of "indiscriminate" targeting of Gulf rigs remains high.
- Regulatory: Prepare for a [15% global tariff](#) that could impact everything from electronics to basic commodities as the administration seeks new revenue streams.
