

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## GLOBAL CONFLICT ESCALATION AS US-ISRAEL WAR ON IRAN SPREADS TO INDIAN OCEAN AND LEVANT

### DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

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March 5, 2026, marks the sixth day of "Operation Epic Fury," a joint US-Israeli military campaign against the Islamic Republic of Iran that has rapidly transitioned from a targeted strike into a sprawling regional and extra-regional conflict. The day was defined by a significant expansion of the maritime theater, with a [US submarine torpedoing an Iranian warship](#) near Sri Lanka, the first such engagement since World War II. Simultaneously, Israel has intensified its [ground incursion into southern Lebanon](#) to dismantle Hezbollah infrastructure, following a historic declaration by the Lebanese government outlawing the militia's military activities. Despite establishing air dominance over Iran, the US and Israel face a growing war of attrition as Iran utilizes low-cost [Shahed drones to overwhelm expensive air defenses](#) across the Gulf, causing significant disruptions to energy markets and global shipping through the now-closed Strait of Hormuz.

On the domestic front in the United States, the administration is navigating severe political turbulence. President Donald Trump [fired Homeland Security Secretary Kristi Noem](#) following a controversial immigration crackdown that resulted in the deaths of US citizens, replacing her with Senator Markwayne Mullin. This shakeup occurs as the US Senate [voted down a resolution](#) that would have required congressional approval for further military action against Iran, signaling a consolidation of executive power during wartime. However, the administration's stated objectives remain contradictory, oscillating between total regime change and the mere degradation of military capabilities, even as reports emerge of [conflicts with AI firms like Anthropic](#) over the use of autonomous technology in mass surveillance.

The ripple effects are being felt acutely in Europe and Africa. The European Union remains fractured, with [Spain and the UK expressing vocal opposition](#) to the conflict, prompting threats of a trade war from Washington. In Ukraine, the war in the Middle East has created a strategic crisis; [surging oil prices are replenishing Russia's war chest](#), while US munitions—particularly Patriot interceptors—are being diverted to the Gulf. Meanwhile, in the Horn of Africa, [tensions between Ethiopia and Eritrea](#) are escalating toward a separate war over Red Sea access, threatening to ignite a second major front of instability on the continent.

## MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

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### Expansion of Maritime and Regional Conflict

- A US submarine used a torpedo to sink the Iranian warship IRIS Dana in international waters off the coast of Sri Lanka, marking a [watershed moment in naval warfare](#) and extending the conflict into the Indian Ocean.
- Iran launched [drone strikes against Azerbaijan](#), hitting an airport and a school, leading Baku to vow retaliation and accusing Tehran of state-sponsored terrorism.
- The Strait of Hormuz is effectively [closed to commercial traffic](#), forcing the re-routing of tankers and causing a sharp spike in global energy prices.

### The Lebanon Front and Hezbollah's Marginalization

- The Lebanese government has taken the [unprecedented step of outlawing](#) Hezbollah's military and security activities, reasserting a state monopoly on weapons.
- Israeli ground forces have pushed into southern Lebanon to [create a security buffer zone](#), while air strikes on Beirut suburbs continue to target the group's command centers.
- Despite leadership losses, including the killing of Hassan Nasrallah earlier in the conflict, Hezbollah remains [capable of conducting asymmetric operations](#) and has rejected the government's ban.

### US Domestic Political and Defense Shakeup

- Kristi Noem was removed as DHS Secretary after [calling two US citizens killed by federal agents](#) "domestic terrorists," reflecting deep dysfunction within the administration's security apparatus.
- The Senate [struck down a bill](#) intended to reign in President Trump's ability to wage war, ensuring the executive branch retains total control over "Epic Fury."
- A dispute has erupted between the [Pentagon and AI company Anthropic](#) over the refusal to allow its Claude chatbot to be used for mass surveillance and autonomous weaponry.

### Strategic Impact on the Russia-Ukraine War

- Russia is benefiting from the [rising price of oil](#), which may allow the Kremlin to bypass the financial strain caused by Western sanctions.
- Ukraine faces a [critical shortage of Patriot missiles](#) as US production—limited to 600 units annually—is prioritized for Gulf allies defending against Iranian salvos.
- President Zelensky has offered [operational expertise in countering Shahed drones](#) to the US and Gulf partners in exchange for continued military financing.

### Secondary Tensions in the Horn of Africa and Nepal

- Ethiopia and Eritrea have [moved massive troop concentrations](#) to their shared border as Ethiopia's Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed seeks sovereign access to the Red Sea.

- Nepal's elections are being framed as a [geopolitical tug-of-war](#) between India and China, with youth candidate Balendra Shah challenging the pro-China establishment of KP Oli.

## KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

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**Elite Politics & Leadership Dynamics** The Iranian regime is currently undergoing a [clandestine succession process](#) following the decapitation of its senior leadership, with reports suggesting Mojtaba Khamenei may be the preferred candidate. In the US, the [firing of Kristi Noem](#) and her immediate reassignment as a special envoy indicates a preference for loyalty over bureaucratic competence within the Trump cabinet.

**Security Architecture & Cybersecurity** Modern warfare is increasingly defined by the [integration of AI-driven data analysis](#), though the Pentagon's move toward an "AI-first" force is meeting resistance from tech developers. Cyber warfare is being waged by [state-backed activist groups](#) targeting industrial control systems in Israel and the US, highlighting vulnerabilities in critical infrastructure hygiene.

**Energy Security & Trade** The closure of the Strait of Hormuz has [disrupted 20% of the world's oil supply](#). While the US is more energy-independent than in previous eras, the global inflationary pressure remains a significant risk. The Trump administration is leveraging [threats of trade cuts against Spain](#) to force compliance with its military objectives, demonstrating the use of economic statecraft as a tool of war.

**Succession & Stability** The "decapitation strategy" employed by the US and Israel has removed the top tier of Iranian leadership, yet analysts warn this may lead to [unprecedented](#)

[chaos](#) rather than a democratic transition. The IRGC remains largely intact and may [entrench a more repressive](#), paranoid regime in the resulting power vacuum.

## International Relations & Foreign Policy

The transatlantic relationship is under severe strain as the [EU and US hold different threat perceptions](#) regarding Iran. The US's failure to consult European partners before launching attacks has been described as a "nail in the transatlantic coffin," [weakening trust](#) at a time of global instability.

## LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

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Legislative activity today was dominated by the US Senate's response to the war in Iran and the ongoing crisis at the Department of Homeland Security. Lawmakers are grappling with the limits of executive power during a "war of choice," while simultaneously managing a partial government shutdown impacting security agencies.

### BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **War Powers Act Resolution:** A bill that would have [forced President Trump to seek congressional approval](#) for further military action in Iran. It was defeated in a narrow vote, signaling continued Republican support for the executive's war-making authority.
- **DHS Reform Proposals:** Measures sought by Democrats to [regulate the behavior of DHS agents](#) following the killing of two Americans. The department currently remains partially unfunded due to this legislative deadlock.

- **European Maritime Services Band:** A policy being pushed by EU diplomats to [curtail Russia's "Shadow Fleet"](#) and reduce oil revenues used to fund the war in Ukraine.

## HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth Press Briefing:** Hegseth declared that "Iran is toast" and emphasized that the mission is [not about nation-building](#), but about sheer destruction of military capabilities.
- **White House Press Briefing (Karoline Leavitt):** Claimed erroneously that [Spain had agreed to cooperate](#) with the US military, a statement quickly refuted by the Spanish government.
- **Kier Starmer Statement:** The UK Prime Minister emphasized the need for a [lawful basis for military action](#), citing lessons learned from the 2003 Iraq war.
- **Spanish PM Pedro Sanchez Address:** Doubled down on his opposition, summarizing Spain's position as ["no to the war"](#) and refusing the use of military bases for offensive strikes.

## DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

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**The Economics of Interceptor Depletion** A critical trend emerging is the [asymmetric cost of defense](#). Iran is launching mass-produced drones costing roughly \$20,000 each to force the US and its allies to expend Patriot interceptors that are both expensive and scarce. With the US producing only [600 interceptors per year](#), and Iran firing over 150 missiles in a single salvo, the sustainability of the current defensive posture is in doubt. ### Decapitation vs. Ideological Resilience

The US and Israel are banking on a "decapitation strategy," having already [removed the Supreme Leader and 49 senior officials](#). The risk is that instead of a "Venezuela model" of regime change, the conflict produces a fragmented "failed state" [similar to Syria or Iraq](#), leading to protracted civil war and massive refugee flows toward Europe.

### The Normalization of Illegal Warfare

There is a growing consensus among legal analysts that the current conflict [violates international law](#), as there was no imminent threat justifying a pre-emptive strike. The disregard for the UN Security Council and the [erosion of the rules-based order](#) signal a shift toward a "Hobbesian world" where raw power dictates global norms. This poses a long-term risk to [middle powers like Germany](#) that rely on international law for security.

## STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

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### Short Term (1-4 Weeks)

- **Kurdish Insurgency:** Murky reports of Kurdish forces [launching ground offensives](#) into Iran may materialize into a full-scale ethnic conflict, potentially dragging Turkey into the war to prevent Kurdish autonomy.
- **Oil Price Volatility:** As the Strait of Hormuz [remains closed](#), energy prices will likely reach record highs, further stressing the global economy and bolstering Russian revenues.

- **Retaliatory Cyber Attacks:** Expect a surge in [Iranian-linked cyber attacks](#) on Western infrastructure, particularly water treatment and power grids, as a low-cost retaliation for naval losses.

### Medium Term (1-6 Months)

- **Ukraine's Munition Crisis:** The [diversion of air defense stocks](#) to the Middle East will likely lead to a Russian breakthrough in Ukraine as Kyiv's "Patriot umbrella" fails.
- **Iranian Succession:** A new Supreme Leader will likely be [appointed under conditions of siege](#), resulting in an even more hardline, IRGC-dominated military junta.
- **European Defense Autonomy:** The rift with Washington will accelerate [discussions regarding a joint EU defense force](#), as Europe realizes it can no longer rely on the US for regional stability.

### Long Term (1-5 Years)

- **The "Failed State" Scenario:** If the Iranian state [dissolves into total chaos](#), the resulting humanitarian crisis and refugee flows will dwarf the Syrian conflict, potentially destabilizing the political landscape of the entire European continent.
- **Arms Market Shift:** Traditional Western dominance in fighter jet exports will be challenged by [low-cost suppliers like Pakistan](#), whose combat-tested JF-17 Thunders are gaining market share during periods of global supply chain stress.

## RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

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### For International Policy:

- **Establish Neutral Backchannels:** Given the [unpredictability of the Trump administration](#), international actors should utilize neutral mediators like Oman or Qatar to find a "diplomatic offramp" before the conflict reaches a point of no return.
- **Reinforce Cyber Defenses:** States must prioritize [cyber hygiene and investment](#) in industrial control system security to mitigate the threat of asymmetric retaliation from state-backed hacking groups.
- **Diversify Energy Supplies:** Europe must accelerate its [independence from both Russian and Middle Eastern](#) energy sources to mitigate the risk of price manipulation during regional conflicts.

### For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Supply Chain De-Risking:** Companies dependent on [shipping through the Strait of Hormuz](#) should immediately secure alternative logistics routes and expect prolonged increases in freight and insurance costs.
- **Monitor US Tariff Policy:** The administration's use of [punitive tariffs as a diplomatic weapon](#) (as seen with Spain) requires businesses to maintain flexible production models, including the potential for localized manufacturing in the US.
- **Investment in Defense Tech:** There is a significant growth opportunity in [low-cost anti-drone and acoustic detection](#) technologies, as modern militaries pivot to address the threat of swarming munitions.
