UNDER OPERATION EPIC FURY

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

The geopolitical landscape underwent a fundamental shift on March 8, 2026, as the United States and Israel escalated "Operation Epic Fury" against the Iranian regime following the death of Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei. While the coalition achieved significant military milestones—including the destruction of the Iranian navy and the degradation of ballistic missile sites—the day was defined by a historic rupture in the Anglo-American "Special Relationship." President Donald Trump issued a series of public rebukes against UK Prime Minister Sir Keir Starmer, characterizing the British response as [too little, too late](#) and explicitly stating that the US no longer required British aircraft carriers. This diplomatic fallout follows a week of perceived dithering by the Starmer government, which initially refused the US use of RAF bases for offensive strikes, only relenting after British interests in Cyprus and the Gulf were directly targeted.

Domestically, the UK government is besieged by a convergence of energy, security, and leadership crises. Reports indicating the UK possesses as little as [two days of gas storage](#) have coincided with oil prices exceeding \$100 per barrel, sparking calls for Energy Secretary Ed Miliband to abandon his Net Zero agenda in favor of North Sea drilling. The Prime Minister is also facing a "Cabinet coup," with leaks suggesting that senior ministers like Miliband and Yvette Cooper successfully blocked Starmer's initial instinct to support the US earlier in the conflict. This internal paralysis has been compounded by sensational allegations in the House of Commons regarding [sectarian voting orders](#) being issued to British Muslim communities from clans in Pakistan, raising profound questions about the stability of British democratic processes.

In Iran, the regime's Assembly of Experts reportedly selected Mojtaba Khamenei, the eldest son of the late Ayatollah, as the new Supreme Leader, though the appointment was immediately [dismissed by Donald Trump](#) as unacceptable. As the war enters its second week, the regional escalation has seen Iranian drones striking targets in Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, and the UAE, while the IDF has expanded its operations into the heart of Beirut. The day concluded with major reports that the King's planned state visit to Washington is now [under serious threat](#), potentially removing the final vestige of UK "soft power" influence in the White House.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

The Collapse of the Special Relationship

- President Trump used Truth Social to humiliate Prime Minister Starmer, referring to the UK as a [once great ally](#) and rejecting the late offer of aircraft carriers. ["We will remember."](#) Trump warned, signaling a long-term shift in US-UK strategic cooperation.
- Former Prime Minister Tony Blair broke with party protocol to publicly condemn Starmer, arguing that Britain should have [backed America from the start](#) rather than turning up late to a war already being won.
- Whitehall sources report a "last-minute wobble" regarding King Charles's scheduled April visit to the US, with officials fearing the [trip may be shelved](#) due to the diplomatic frost.

Operation Epic Fury and Iranian Succession

- The IDF and US military hit over [400 targets across Iran](#) in a 24-hour period, focusing on oil depots, missile launchers, and command centers. Reports of "acid rain" falling in Tehran followed strikes on the Sharan facility.
- Mojtaba Khamenei has been named successor to his father, Ali Khamenei, despite US warnings that any leader chosen without [Trump's approval](#) will not last long.
- The conflict has spilled over into neighboring states, with a drone strike on a [Kuwaiti airport](#) killing two officials and a projectile hitting a residential area in Riyadh.

UK Military Readiness Crisis

- The Royal Navy's inability to deploy immediate force was highlighted by the fact that [HMS Dragon](#) remains in Portsmouth undergoing repairs, while the HMS Prince of Wales was only recently put on five days' notice.
- Defense analysts noted that for the first time since 1980, the UK began the year with [no naval assets](#) in the Gulf region, leaving sovereign bases in Cyprus vulnerable to drone attacks.
- General Lord Dannatt characterized the state of British defense as "dire," claiming successive governments had [hollowed out capability](#) to the point of international embarrassment.

Global Energy Market Shock

- Oil prices spiked past [the \\$100 per barrel mark](#) following Israeli strikes on Iranian oil infrastructure, a development the US White House reportedly viewed with dismay.
- The CEO of Octopus Energy joined calls for the UK to [reopen North Sea drilling](#), as data revealed the country's gas storage is dangerously low.
- The closure of natural gas facilities in Qatar and the blockage of the Strait of Hormuz have left the UK [staring down the barrel](#) of a severe energy shortage.

Scientific Milestone: NASA Redirection

- Amidst the global conflict, NASA successfully confirmed the results of a mission to [change an asteroid's course](#). This marks the first time humanity has intentionally altered the motion of a celestial body, providing a potential defense against future planetary impacts.

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

National Security and International Relations

- The UK government relented on its ban of US offensive use of bases, now permitting [military cooperation via RAF bases](#) for what it terms "collective self-defense," though the U-turn has failed to placate Washington.
- The Chagos Islands sovereignty deal is under renewed scrutiny, with Nigel Farage lobbying President Trump in Mar-a-Lago to [nuke the "surrender" deal](#) on security grounds.
- Lord Walney's landmark report identified [40 UK charities](#) with alleged links to the Iranian regime, claiming the Charity Commission has been "soft" due to fears of racism accusations.

Energy Security and Economic Resilience

- The UK's strategic gas reserve is criticized as [insufficiently regulated](#) compared to European counterparts who mandate 90% storage levels.
- Chancellor Rachel Reeves's Spring Statement is being characterized as "complacent," with economists warning that [further tax increases](#) are inevitable in the autumn due to the Middle East crisis.
- A proposed 1 billion pound energy support scheme for heavy industry may [shift costs to households](#), potentially driving up bills for smaller businesses and individuals.

Domestic Stability and Social Order

- A leaked social cohesion strategy from the Home Office suggests that [flying the English flag](#) could be treated as a "tool of hate" by extremists, while proposing a new representative for anti-Muslim hostility.
- Police Scotland condemned "shameful" behavior after [fans clashed on the pitch](#) following a Celtic vs. Rangers match at Ibrox, leading to multiple arrests.
- Justice Secretary David Lammy is facing a rebellion of up to 80 MPs over plans to [curb jury trials](#) for offenses carrying sentences of less than three years to clear court backlogs.

Elite Politics and Leadership Dynamics

- Kemi Badenoch is reportedly planning a [major Shadow Cabinet reshuffle](#) to remove "dead wood" and promote rising stars like Katie Lam to prevent further defections to Reform UK.
- The Prime Minister's authority is being questioned following reports that the [National Security Council](#) was split, with "old labor" elements preventing a more robust military stance.

LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

The week was marked by significant policy shifts and pending legislative challenges, primarily focused on national security, judicial efficiency, and digital tax management. The government is attempting to navigate a massive court backlog while simultaneously implementing digital overhauls of the tax system that have drawn fierce criticism from the House of Lords.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **Courts and Tribunals Bill:** Proposed by David Lammy to enhance efficiency through digital transformation; however, it is under fire for [undermining the right to trial by jury](#) in certain criminal cases.
- **Making Tax Digital (HMRC):** Criticized by Lord Craig McKinley as a [labyrinth of bureaucracy](#) that will force small traders and landlords to file quarterly, potentially increasing costs for millions of taxpayers.
- **Online Safety Act:** Discussed in the context of US relations, with Marco Rubio warning that [fining American tech companies](#) for speech violations is causing a major rift with the US State Department.

HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **Downing Street Iran Briefing:** Prime Minister Starmer insisted the UK was "fully prepared" for the conflict, despite [HMS Dragon being in dock](#) at Portsmouth for repairs during the announcement.
- **Air Force One Press Gaggle:** Donald Trump asserted that negotiations with Iran are [becoming irrelevant](#) as leadership is eliminated, dismissing the need for UK diplomatic mediation.
- **COVID-19 Inquiry Final Hearings:** Marked by a [National Memorial Day](#), the inquiry has cost an estimated £200 million, with critics questioning the utility of its eventual findings.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The End of "Strategic Ambiguity" The Starmer government's attempt to chart a middle path between US military action and domestic anti-war sentiment has

fundamentally failed. By refusing early base access on legal grounds, only to grant it later for "defensive" purposes, the UK has [alienated both the Biden-skeptical Trump administration](#) and the pacifist wing of the Labour Party. The perception of the UK as a "fair-weather friend" is being solidified in Washington, where Trump's transactional view of alliances sees the UK as having zero "credit in the bank." This is a departure from the "Rock and a Hard Place" narrative; the UK is now seen as the "Isolated Island."

Sectarianism as a Foreign Policy Driver A recurring theme throughout the day's broadcasts was the allegation that the UK's foreign policy is being [influenced by a "Muslim voting block."](#) Analysts and opposition MPs suggest Starmer's hesitation to back Israel and the US fully is a direct result of fears regarding local elections and the rise of the Green Party in "Red Wall" seats. The sensational claims by Danny Krueger regarding [clan-based voting orders from Pakistan](#) suggest that sectarianism is no longer a fringe concern but a core threat to community cohesion and national strategic decision-making.

The Infrastructure of Ideological Infiltration The day's reports on the Green Party's "witch hunt" against gender-critical women [sharing biological facts](#) and Lord Walney's report on Iranian-linked charities point to a broader trend: the capture of UK institutions by radical ideologies. Whether it is universities failing to vet [extremist speakers](#) or the Charity Commission's paralysis in the face of Islamism, the theme is one of state incapacity to defend liberal values against internal and external non-state actors.

The Energy-Security Nexus The UK's "green" energy policy is hitting a reality wall. The revelation of [two-day gas storage](#) at a

time of war demonstrates that "Net Zero" has created a strategic vulnerability that adversaries are now exploiting. The fact that even progressive energy companies are calling for North Sea drilling indicates a massive shift in the national conversation toward "Energy Realism" and away from "Climate Idealism."

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks)

- Expect a [sharp rise in petrol prices](#) at the pumps, potentially reaching record highs of 191.5p per liter as the \$100/barrel oil price is baked into supply chains.
- A major Shadow Cabinet reshuffle by Kemi Badenoch is likely, aimed at [shoring up the Tory right](#) before the May local elections.
- Protests in London and other major cities are expected to intensify as the "Hand off Iran" coalition and anti-regime groups [clash more frequently](#).

Medium Term (1-6 Months)

- The King's state visit to the US will likely be [postponed until the autumn](#), or potentially cancelled entirely if the Chagos Islands deal proceeds against Trump's wishes.
- The Starmer government may face a formal leadership challenge if the May local elections result in a [landslide loss to Reform UK](#) and the Greens.
- HMRC's "Making Tax Digital" rollout will face significant legal or parliamentary delays as [backbench pressure mounts](#) from small business owners.

Long Term (1-5 Years)

- The UK may be forced to choose between a "European Defense Pillar" or total subservience to a US-led "Americas First" policy, as [NATO's structure undergoes fundamental revision](#).
- A structural shift back toward [fossil fuel exploration](#) in the North Sea is inevitable as the 2030 Net Zero target for the grid becomes technically and politically unfeasible.
- The "Special Relationship" may be replaced by an [American-Israeli-Middle East axis](#), with the UK relegated to a tertiary role unless a massive increase in defense spending (3-5% of GDP) is realized.

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy:

- **Security Pillar:** The UK must immediately [proscribe the IRGC](#) to align with US and Israeli intelligence priorities and demonstrate a commitment to the "axis of democracy."
- **Alliance Repair:** A diplomatic "charm offensive" involving Prince William may be the only way to bypass the [personal animosity](#) between Trump and Starmer.
- **Sovereignty Defense:** The government should pause the Chagos Islands transfer indefinitely to prevent a total [collapse of the strategic military relationship](#) with the US Navy.

For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Supply Chain Risk:** Investors should hedge against [oil volatility](#), as further strikes on Iranian desalination and refining plants could drive prices toward \$150/barrel.
- **Energy Investment:** The shift toward [domestic energy production](#) creates significant long-term opportunities in North Sea services and nuclear technology providers.
- **Compliance Burden:** Small businesses and landlords must prepare for [quarterly digital tax reporting](#) despite political pushback, as the civil service continues its drive for data centralization.
