ALGERIA ADVANCES LANDMARK ANTI-COLONIAL LEGISLATION AND STRICT NATIONAL DRONE REGISTRATION MANDATES AMID REGIONAL SECURITY CONCERNS.

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

March 9, 2026, was marked by a heavy emphasis on state-directed identity building, legislative sovereignty, and the tightening of national security protocols. The Algerian government, led by Prime Minister Nadir Larbaoui and supported by the military leadership under General Saïd Chengriha, utilized the occasion of International Women's Day to project an image of a "triumphant and emerging" Algeria. This narrative was reinforced by high-level ceremonies honoring female military and civilian personnel, signaling a continuing effort to integrate women into [specialized combat roles](#) such as aviation and naval operations.

Strategically, the day featured two major regulatory and legislative pivots. First, the Ministry of National Defense announced a strict six-month deadline for the mandatory [registration of all drones](#) with a newly established National Center, threatening

seizure for non-compliance. Second, the National People's Assembly (APN) moved to approve a controversial bill [criminalizing French colonialism](#), a move that likely signals a hardening of "lawfare" tactics in Algiers' complex relationship with Paris. These developments suggest a state prioritizing internal order, technological oversight, and the codification of historical grievances as pillars of domestic stability.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

- **Legislative Sovereignty and Historical Redress**
 - The National People's Assembly (APN) approved five major draft laws, most notably the bill [criminalizing French colonialism](#) in Algeria, alongside an organic law on political parties and territorial organization.
 - The move follows a joint committee report aimed at resolving outstanding provisions between the two chambers of parliament, indicating a consolidated legislative front.
- **National Security and Technological Oversight**
 - The Ministry of National Defense (MDN) has mandated the registration of all Unmanned Aerial Systems (UAS/drones) through the [National Center for UAS](#) by April 30, 2026.
 - The regulation requires physical and moral persons to provide serial numbers, photos, and proof of residence, signaling a comprehensive crackdown on unregulated domestic drone use to protect national security.

- **Military Integration and Gender Policy**
 - General Saïd Chengriha highlighted the expansion of female roles within the People's National Army (ANP), including [parachuting, aviation, and combat units](#).
 - The state is framing women's participation not just as a social metric, but as a critical component of state development and defense readiness.
- **Diaspora Management and Reintegration**
 - Algerian consulates in Europe (Paris, Marseille, Barcelona, Brussels) have launched major outreach initiatives, including organized Iftars for students and [status regularization programs](#) for irregular citizens.
 - The Barcelona consulate reported handling over 11,000 applications, reflecting a high-volume state effort to facilitate the legal return of vulnerable citizens abroad.

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Security Architecture & Technology Policy

The MDN's drone registration mandate is a significant expansion of state biosurveillance and critical infrastructure protection. By centralizing drone oversight, Algiers aims to mitigate risks associated with domestic unrest and the potential use of drones by non-state actors. The [mandatory registration](#) of serial numbers and identity certificates suggests a move toward a total-visibility environment for civilian-grade technology.

Domestic Stability & Social Order

The government launched a national program to [mentor 1,000 young leaders](#) aged 18 to 28. This initiative is designed to channel youth energy into state-approved field initiatives and "leadership skills," likely serving as a

preventative measure against civil unrest by incorporating potential youth organizers into the state apparatus.

Legal Warfare (Lawfare) & International Relations

The approval of the bill criminalizing colonialism is a significant diplomatic maneuver. It elevates historical grievances to a formal legal status, potentially impacting trade, reparations discussions, and diplomatic protocol with France. This represents a strategic use of [legal instruments](#) to project national pride and exert pressure on European partners.

Statecraft & Religious Identity

The Ministry of Religious Affairs is actively promoting a "national" religious narrative. Dr. Moussa Ismaïl, a high-ranking cleric, delivered a lecture emphasizing the [service of Sufism to Maliki Fiqh](#). This alignment of Sufi ethics with Maliki law is a deliberate strategy to foster a moderate, state-sanctioned Islamic identity that counters more radical, imported ideologies.

LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

The Algerian legislature moved forward with a dense package of laws focused on political structure and historical identity. The National People's Assembly approved several draft laws intended to redefine the relationship between the state and its colonial past, as well as its internal administrative boundaries.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **Bill Criminalizing French Colonialism:** A landmark law seeking to [legally condemn the colonial period](#), likely carrying implications for future diplomatic and judicial claims.

- **Organic Law on Political Parties:** Updates the regulatory framework for party formation and activity, likely tightening state oversight.
- **Territorial Organization Law:** Addresses the country's internal administrative divisions and governance structures.
- **Road Traffic Law:** Aimed at reducing traffic accidents through stricter enforcement and revised regulations.

- **APN Public Session:** Chaired by Speaker Ibrahim Boughali to [approve the draft law package](#) after joint committee resolution.
- **International Women's Day Ceremony:** PM Larbaoui, representing President Tebboune, delivered a keynote address on [women's contributions to the "New Algeria"](#).
- **Military Iftar Ceremony:** General Chengriha hosted personnel at the National Army Club to discuss the [integration of women in the ANP](#).
- **Great Mosque Religious Lecture:** Dr. Moussa Ismaïl presented on the role of [Sufi masters in Maliki jurisprudence](#).

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The Weaponization of History The move to criminalize colonialism is not merely symbolic; it is part of a broader trend where Algiers uses historical memory as a diplomatic lever. By codifying "colonialism as a crime," the state creates a legal basis for challenging French narratives and potentially seeking future damages or restricting the activities of entities that do not acknowledge this legal framework. This trend toward [historicized](#)

[lawfare](#) is a core component of the administration's nationalist platform.

Centralization of Emerging Tech Control

The MDN's drone center indicates that the state views civilian technology as a primary security threat. Unlike earlier years where drone use was a legal grey area, the state is now moving toward [total registration and identification](#). This suggests that the security apparatus is preparing for a regional environment where low-cost aerial technology is increasingly used for both surveillance and disruption.

Diaspora as a Pillar of State Capacity

The intensive consular activities in Europe suggest Algiers is no longer viewing its diaspora as a separate entity but as a [strategic extension](#) of the nation. The emphasis on students and "regularizing" irregular citizens indicates a desire to harness the skills and loyalty of Algerians abroad while mitigating the "brain drain" by keeping legal paths to return open.

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks): Expect a surge in drone registration as the April 30 deadline approaches, potentially accompanied by public awareness campaigns highlighting the legal risks of non-compliance. Diplomatic tension with France may spike as the details of the [anti-colonialism bill](#) are publicized in European media.

Medium Term (1-6 Months): The National Center for UAS will likely transition from registration to enforcement, with the first seizures of [unregistered drones](#) occurring after the May deadline. The 1,000 young leaders program will conclude its first phase, likely leading to the announcement of new state-aligned community projects across the 58 provinces.

Long Term (1-5 Years): The criminalization of colonialism bill could lead to a permanent restructuring of Franco-Algerian diplomatic protocols, possibly influencing educational curricula and international court filings. The integration of women into [high-tech military roles](#) will likely modernize the ANP's image, making it a more attractive career path for the country's educated youth, potentially shifting the internal power dynamics of the military elite.

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy:

- The criminalization of colonialism bill may necessitate a review of bilateral treaties and "memory-based" diplomatic initiatives with Algeria.
- The drone registration mandate highlights Algeria's interest in regional UAS security standards, providing an opening for technical cooperation on [border security technology](#).
- The state's promotion of Maliki-Sufi Islam provides a potential framework for counter-extremism partnerships with Algiers.

For Private Sector/Investors:

- Companies using drone technology for industrial or agricultural purposes in Algeria must ensure [immediate compliance](#) with the MDN's April 30 deadline to avoid asset seizure.
- The youth leadership program suggests future investment opportunities in vocational training and "field-based" social entrepreneurship sanctioned by the state.

- The focus on Tlemcen's heritage and infrastructure (caves, palaces) indicates potential state-backed [tourism and cultural development](#) projects that may seek private partnerships.
