



DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

On March 12, 2026, the Algerian government signaled a concerted effort to modernize its state apparatus and economic pillars, most notably through the formalization of a five-year National Cinema Strategy and the election of new leadership for the National Human Rights Council. Prime Minister Sabba's interministerial meeting emphasized the transformation of the film industry from a purely cultural pursuit into a multifaceted economic, diplomatic, and investment sector. This move aligns with President Tebboune's broader vision of a "New Algeria," where soft power and industrial diversification are prioritized to reduce the nation's historical reliance on energy exports. The strategy is grounded in the outcomes of the 2025 National Cinema Conference, suggesting a disciplined, multi-year approach to legislative and structural reform within the arts.

Concurrently, the election of Maya Fadhal Sahli as President of the National Human

Rights Council (CNDH) provides the state with a refreshed institutional face at a time of increasing international scrutiny. This transition, overseen by the Supreme and Constitutional Courts, underscores a push for domestic stability and the formalization of the rule of law. On the technological front, Ooredoo Algeria's completion of its 5G network expansion across all 58 provinces marks a significant milestone in digital sovereignty and critical infrastructure, positioning Algeria as a regional leader in telecommunications readiness. These domestic wins are being juxtaposed against a harsh narrative regarding neighboring Morocco, with state media reporting on a supposed "collapse of purchasing power" and social fragility within the Moroccan kingdom, likely intended to bolster domestic Algerian sentiment regarding their own state-managed stability during the Ramadan period.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

- **National Cinema Strategy 2026-2030**

- The Prime Minister chaired a high-level meeting to review the [national cinema strategy](#) aimed at creating a modern and competitive industry.
- The plan integrates cultural, economic, and diplomatic dimensions, viewing film as a "national project" to meet public expectations and drive investment.
- The strategy follows specific [presidential orientations](#) derived from a landmark 2025 conference.

- **Leadership Transition at the National Human Rights Council (CNDH)**

- Maya Fadhal Sahli was elected President of the CNDH following [Presidential Decree 26-109](#) which redefined the council's composition.
- The election was validated by a majority of members in the presence of the Presidents of the Supreme and Constitutional Courts, signaling high-level state backing.

- **Telecommunications and Digital Infrastructure**

- Ooredoo Algeria announced the [expansion of 5G services](#) to all provinces, a major step for the nation's digital economy.
- A strategic partnership was signed between Ooredoo and the National Publishing and Advertising Agency (ANEP) to [launch new services](#) and digital advertising capabilities.

- **Aviation and Pilgrimage Management**

- Algiers International Airport implemented a special [operational plan for Omra](#) pilgrims, managing high passenger volumes that exceeded 614,000 movements in the previous year.
- Infrastructure upgrades include the integration of [facial recognition e-gates](#) to facilitate smooth departures and arrivals.

- **Regional Narrative and Geopolitical Posturing**

- State media reports highlighted [daily hardships in Morocco](#), citing the collapse of purchasing power and repressive policies as a source of social instability.
- The narrative portrays the Moroccan "Makhzen" (the ruling elite) as [deaf to the struggles](#) of its people, contrasting with Algeria's state-led support programs.

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

- **Economic Security and Domestic Stability**

The state is actively managing social order during Ramadan through cultural programming and the monitoring of essential goods. Popular media segments like "Colombo" highlight the governance priority of combating [market speculation and oil hoarding](#), which are perennial threats to social stability during high-consumption religious periods. Furthermore, the focus on [vocational training](#) through "Careers Days" aims to address youth unemployment by pivoting toward practical trades and entrepreneurship via the NESDA group.

- **Technology Policy & Digital Sovereignty**

The nationwide [5G network expansion](#) is not merely a commercial success but a strategic move for state capacity. By providing high-speed connectivity to all provinces, the government is laying the groundwork for digital administrative services and improved state-citizen communication, essential for managing a large, geographically diverse population.

- **Diplomatic Engagement & Soft Power**

The 2026-2030 Cinema Strategy is explicitly designed with a [diplomatic dimension](#), indicating that Algeria intends to use its cultural output to project a modernized image abroad. Additionally, religious diplomacy continues through events like the [Taj Al-Quran international competition](#), which brings together participants from across the Arab and African worlds, reinforcing Algeria's role as a regional hub for Islamic scholarship and cultural unity.

- **Rule of Law and Institutional Integrity**

The formal election process for the Human Rights Council, involving the [Minister of Justice and Keeper of the Seals](#), suggests an effort to institutionalize human rights discourse within a legalistic framework. This move is critical for Algeria's standing in international forums and its pursuit of foreign investment, which often requires a baseline of institutional predictability.

LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

Legislative activity was focused on executive decrees and the formalization of long-term sector-specific strategies. These actions reflect a shift toward structured planning over reactive policymaking.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **National Cinema Strategy 2026-2030:** A comprehensive policy framework reviewing film as an economic and cultural investment tool. It outlines [concrete measures](#) to revive national production and build a modern industry.

- **Presidential Decree 26-109:** Defines the [composition and mandate](#) of the National Human Rights Council, providing the legal basis for the recent leadership election.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The Industrialization of Culture

Algeria is pivoting toward a "cultural industry" model, specifically in cinema. This is a departure from previous years where the arts were often viewed as a subsidiary of state propaganda or a drain on the budget. By framing the [National Cinema Strategy](#) as a crossroads of economic and financial dimensions, the state is seeking to create a self-sustaining sector that can attract private investment. The historical baseline here is significant; Algeria had a vibrant cinema scene in the 1960s-70s that subsequently withered. This 2026-2030 plan is an attempt to reclaim that legacy while modernizing the infrastructure for a digital audience.

Strategic Religious Soft Power

During Ramadan, the state leverages religious heritage to solidify regional ties. The [Taj Al-Quran](#) competition serves as more than a religious event; it is a diplomatic platform. The inclusion of participants from Arab and African nations, coupled with symbolic gestures like [planting olive trees from Al-Quds](#) (Jerusalem), positions Algeria as a staunch defender of Islamic values and the Palestinian cause. This reinforces a sense of moral leadership in the region, particularly when contrasted with the reported social "humiliation" occurring in Morocco.

Infrastructure as a Guarantor of Social Peace

The government's heavy emphasis on the "smoothness" of the Omra pilgrimage and the [5G rollout](#) demonstrates a belief that high-quality public service delivery is essential for domestic stability. In 2025, the [record-breaking 614,000 movements](#) at Algiers Airport were managed through new systems, including facial recognition. This "technological fix" for logistical challenges is a core theme of the current administration's approach to governance—using digital modernization to improve citizen satisfaction and reduce friction in social life.

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks)

- Expect continued state media focus on managing [Ramadan market prices](#) and countering hoarding, as evidenced by cultural segments addressing these issues.

- The newly elected Human Rights Council will likely release its first statement, setting the tone for its interaction with international NGOs and the domestic legal system.

Medium Term (1-6 Months)

- Implementation of the [Cinema Strategy](#) will likely lead to the announcement of new film studio projects or tax incentives for foreign co-productions to stimulate the promised "investment dimension."
- Ooredoo's 5G expansion will trigger a wave of digital service launches by both public and private entities, potentially increasing the demand for localized data storage and cybersecurity solutions.

Long Term (1-5 Years)

- The 2026-2030 National Cinema Strategy seeks to fundamentally alter the [Algerian cultural landscape](#), moving away from state-funded projects to a competitive market model by 2030.
- If infrastructure and digital upgrades at Algiers Airport continue, the facility is positioned to become a major trans-African hub, potentially challenging established regional airports in Morocco and Tunisia.

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy:

- Western and regional diplomats should monitor the [Human Rights Council transition](#) as a bellwether for Algeria's openness to institutional dialogue and legal reform.

- The heavy emphasis on Palestine and Al-Quds in cultural programming indicates that Algeria's foreign policy on the Levant will remain a non-negotiable cornerstone of its [religious and soft-power diplomacy](#).
- The sharp rhetoric against Morocco suggests a continued period of high tension, with Algeria using its [state-managed economic stability](#) as a psychological tool against its neighbor.

For Private Sector/Investors:

- The [National Cinema Strategy](#) presents a significant opportunity for investors in media production, post-production services, and cinema infrastructure (theaters and studios).
- The 5G expansion across all 58 provinces creates a [market for smart-city technologies](#), IoT applications for agriculture, and enhanced mobile financial services.
- Companies involved in [biometric and security technology](#) should note the successful integration of facial recognition at Algiers Airport, indicating a high state appetite for high-tech border and infrastructure management solutions.
