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

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DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

The March 12, 2026, news cycle is dominated by the cascading effects of the second week of the United States and Israeli military campaign against Iran. Following the death of Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, the succession of his son, Mojtaba Khamenei, has resulted in a vow to [keep the Strait of Hormuz closed](#), a move that has sent global oil prices into a volatile spiral. While Brent crude briefly touched \$100 per barrel, subsequent market reactions to the International Energy Agency's (IEA) historic release of [400 million barrels of crude reserves](#) have failed to provide long-term stability due to ongoing attacks on cargo vessels in the Gulf. This energy crisis is putting immense pressure on Nigeria's domestic economy, with petrol prices at filling stations soaring between 1,160 and 1,250 naira per liter, despite marginal price reductions by the [Dangote petroleum refinery](#).

Domestically, Nigeria is experiencing a seismic shift in its political landscape. The ruling All Progressives Congress (APC) is consolidating power through high-profile defections, now controlling 31 of 36 state governorships, while the opposition People's Democratic Party (PDP) remains paralyzed by internal legal warfare. A Court of Appeal ruling [invalidating the PDP's 2025 National Convention](#) has created a leadership vacuum, even as FCT Minister Nyesom Wike sets stringent conditions for reconciliation. Simultaneously, a landmark Federal High Court ruling in Ondo State has [restrained Governor Lucky Aiyedatiwa](#) from seeking re-election, interpreting constitutional term limits in a way that suggests a deputy who succeeds a governor can serve no more than eight total years in office. This creates a significant legal precedent for executive succession across the federation.

The administration is attempting to project resilience and stability through strategic appointments and policy shifts. The Senate's confirmation of [Professor Taiwo Oyedele](#) as Minister of State for Finance signals a commitment to fiscal reform and digitalization of revenue collection. However, these efforts are contrasted by rising insecurity in the Northeast, where Boko Haram has [razed villages in Adamawa State](#), prompting calls for a permanent military command. The day concludes with a mix of cultural soft power, such as the launch of the Savage Music Foundation, and the stark reality of "citizen journalism" exposing the failures of Lagos State's [public transportation infrastructure](#), highlighting the disconnect between governance rhetoric and the lived experience of the populace.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

Middle East War and Global Energy Volatility

- The US-Israeli operation "Epic Fury" enters its second week following the killing of Supreme Leader Khamenei, with President Trump claiming the [war was won in the first hour](#) despite continued hostilities.
- New Iranian leader Mojtaba Khamenei maintains a low profile but has officially [vowed to revenge](#) Iranian casualties and sustain the blockade of the Strait of Hormuz.
- The IEA has authorized the largest emergency oil release in history, yet Brent prices returned to \$97 per barrel following [attacks on three cargo ships](#) in the Persian Gulf.
- A drone strike on fuel storage facilities at the [Port of Salalah in Oman](#) has raised fears of the conflict expanding to neutral regional actors.

Nigeria's Internal Political Fragmentation

- The APC has achieved a near-supermajority of subnational control, with 31 governors now aligned with the party, leading to concerns regarding [multi-party contest options](#) in 2027.
- The African Democratic Congress (ADC) is emerging as a primary beneficiary of opposition fractures, with [nine senators defecting](#) to the party in a single day.

- Ondo State Governor Lucky Aiyedatiwa faces a sudden end to his re-election ambitions after a court ruled that his total time in office [cannot exceed eight years](#) including his time finishing his predecessor's term.
- PDP reconciliation efforts remain stalled as Nyesom Wike demands [sincere reconciliation](#) while maintaining his stance against the Turaki-led faction.

Security Crisis and Counter-Terrorism

- Boko Haram insurgents have [completely razed four villages](#) in the Hong local government area of Adamawa, resulting in at least 21 deaths.
- The National Counter Terrorism Center is assessing a [maturity self-assessment tool](#) to better coordinate the national response to the persistent threat of improvised explosive devices (IEDs).
- The Nigerian Police officially retired IGP Kayode Egbetokun, with [Olatunji Disu taking over](#) as the new Inspector General to lead institutional reforms.

Fiscal and Economic Management

- Finance Minister Wale Edun reports that inflation has dropped from [34% to 15%](#) and claims the economy is on a recovery path despite global shocks.
- External debt servicing costs have reached a critical level, with [5.2 billion dollars spent](#) on servicing alone, according to recent data.
- The Central Bank of Nigeria (CBN) has issued a [new compliance deadline](#) for banks to implement automated Anti-Money Laundering (AML) solutions within 18 to 24 months.

Infrastructure and Industrial Strategy

- The NNPC and Shell have reached a Final Investment Decision (FID) on the long-delayed [Bonga Southwest Aparo](#) deepwater project.
- Benue State has signed a [10-year agricultural deal](#) with a consortium of Chinese investors to mechanize production and reduce post-harvest losses.
- The federal government is accelerating the introduction of [additional buses](#) in Lagos to meet the surge in demand caused by rising fuel costs and the relative affordability of regulated transport.

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Energy Security The ongoing war in Iran has transformed from a regional conflict into a global energy security threat. The blockade of the Strait of Hormuz is creating a "third-party premium" on shipping, as tankers are forced to take the [longer journey around Africa](#) via the Cape of Good Hope. Domestically, Nigeria remains unable to leverage high oil prices effectively due to a decline in crude exports, which [fell nearly 30%](#) in Q4 2025. This failure highlights a systemic inability to achieve energy sovereignty despite having the Dangote refinery online, as the facility still sources [less than 50% of its crude](#) from local supplies.

Rule of Law and Succession The Federal High Court's ruling in Akure represents a significant interpretation of the 1999 Constitution (as amended). By restraining Governor Aiyedatiwa, the court has reinforced the [eight-year total limit](#) for any individual in the executive office, regardless of whether they began as an elected deputy. This

reinforces the "Jonathan Rule" intended to prevent perpetual incumbency through succession, though the Governor's legal team is expected to [seek further interpretation](#) at higher courts. This legal warfare (lawfare) is increasingly becoming the primary tool for settling intra-party disputes ahead of the 2027 cycle.

Technology and AI Policy Nigeria is positioning itself as a hub for AI adoption in Africa, with Microsoft leading efforts to [accelerate AI services](#) to counter competitors like DeepSeek. In the public sector, Kogi State has launched a [three-day AI capacity building training](#) for civil servants and youths, indicating that subnational governments view digital literacy as a tool for "economic growth and workplace relevance." However, there is a noted "gender bias" and "mindset" barrier in the tech sector that [NGOs are working to tackle](#) through mentorship and specialized training for women in STEM.

Corruption and Financial Governance The CBN is tightening its oversight of the financial system, mandating that [automated AML solutions](#) be implemented to combat illicit financial flows. This coincides with a regulatory crackdown on cryptocurrency, as Ghana launches a [12-month regulatory sandbox](#) to formalize oversight of virtual asset service providers. In Nigeria, the SEC is holding "Fintech Clinics" to ensure that [technological advancements](#) align with investor protection and market transparency, reflecting a cautious but necessary integration of digital finance into the formal economy.

Diplomatic Engagement and Diaspora Influence The role of the Nigerian diaspora in global governance is expanding, as evidenced by Nigerians in Canada stepping into [civic leadership and council roles](#). These individuals are shaping local policies in

kitchener, Ontario, and Alberta, providing a voice for immigrant communities. Simultaneously, the Nigerian Diaspora Commission (Nidcom) is partnering with [healthcare professionals abroad](#) to strengthen Nigeria's local health system, leveraging expertise that exceeds the value of financial remittances, which currently top \$20 billion annually.

LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

The National Assembly has been exceptionally active in modifying the electoral framework and confirming key executive appointments. The primary focus has been on tightening the rules of political engagement to prevent the "cross-carpeting" and "dual membership" that have historically undermined party discipline. Hearings also addressed the immediate security needs of the federation and the funding of the FCT.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **Electoral Act Amendment (Dual Membership):** Prohibits a person from being registered as a [member of more than one party](#). Violations carry a fine of up to 10 million naira or two years' imprisonment. It also mandates that parties submit their digital register 21 days before primaries.
- **FCT Appropriation Bill:** A [2.2 trillion naira](#) bill aimed at funding critical infrastructure in Abuja, passed through a second reading.
- **Virtual Asset Service Providers Act 2025 (Ghanaian Context):** Discussed as a model for [formalizing crypto oversight](#) within a 12-month pilot program.

HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **Ministerial Confirmation Hearing:** The Senate confirmed [Taiwo Oyedele](#) as Minister of State for Finance. Oyedele advocated for zero-based budgeting and digitalization to increase revenue.
- **Security Briefing at Presidential Villa:** Service chiefs briefed President Tinubu for [over two hours](#) on the situation in the North. Defense Minister Musa reassured the public of victory while noting that terrorists are more active during Ramadan.
- **PDP BoT Press Conference:** Former Senate President Adolphus Wabara [rejected the court judgment](#) invalidating the 2025 convention and announced a reconciliation committee.
- **Customs Area Command Meeting:** CGC Adeniyi warned that [airing officers and exporters](#) involved in illicit goods would face severe penalties to protect Nigeria's international reputation.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The Collapse of Traditional Opposition

The Nigerian political system is rapidly trending toward a dominant-party state. The APC's absorption of [31 of 36 governors](#) suggests that the 2027 election may lack a viable multi-party contest unless a "third force" such as the ADC or a Labor-ADC coalition materializes. The PDP's inability to resolve its leadership crisis, coupled with the [defection of nine senators](#) to the ADC, indicates that the traditional two-party structure is being replaced by a fragmented opposition landscape that the ruling party can easily manage.

The Economic Cost of Geopolitical "Moral High Ground" Nigeria is caught in an economic trap. As the US and Israel prosecute a war for "regime change" in Iran, the moral and legal justifications for the conflict are being [challenged by international law experts](#). While Western powers focus on dismantling Iran's "intelligence apparatus," Nigeria is feeling the direct [impact in oil prices](#) and transportation. The administration's refusal to reintroduce subsidies, despite "excess money" from high oil prices, reflects a commitment to long-term fiscal stability that may trigger short-term civil unrest due to the [cost of living crisis](#).

Institutional Fragility vs. Digital Resilience There is a growing dichotomy between Nigeria's physical infrastructure and its digital aspirations. While the BRT system in Lagos is failing due to [insufficient fleet capacity](#), the financial sector is becoming "more stable and resilient" through CBN-led [reduced intervention](#) and technological integration. Governance is increasingly shifting toward digital tools for revenue and oversight, but as long as basic services like transport and security remain erratic, digital progress will not translate into broader social stability.

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks): Expect a continued rise in the cost of basic commodities, particularly staple foods like pepper, which has already [doubled in price](#) this month. The legal fallout from the Ondo court ruling will likely see an appeal filed, potentially creating a constitutional crisis if the Supreme Court does not prioritize the matter. Security operations in the Northeast will likely intensify as the military attempts to

"repel" the Ramadan-period [surge in insurgent activity](#).

Medium Term (1-6 Months): The 2027 electoral realignment will accelerate, with the ADC likely absorbing more PDP defectors. The [confirmed ministerial appointment](#) of Taiwo Oyedele will lead to more aggressive tax collection and "automation" of the fiscal space, which may irritate the informal sector. If the Strait of Hormuz remains closed, the Dangote refinery will likely face [higher replacement costs](#) for its crude, potentially leading to further petrol price hikes in the domestic market.

Long Term (1-5 Years): Nigeria's energy mix will undergo a forced transition. The failure of the fossil-fuel-based economy to provide immediate relief during global shocks will drive investment into [gassifying the energy source](#) and expanding the PCNG (Presidential Compressed Natural Gas) initiative. The Bonga Southwest [deepwater project](#), having reached FID, will become a cornerstone of Nigeria's effort to return to significant crude export levels by 2029-2030, provided regional stability is maintained.

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy:

- The international community must prepare for [mass migration](#) if the Middle East conflict results in a long-term civil war in Iran; the 90-million-strong population represents a significant humanitarian and refugee risk for both the West and regional neighbors.

- Strategic alliances with "pariah" states like Niger Republic, which is [exchanging uranium for Iranian drones](#), will complicate Western efforts to isolate Tehran and secure the Sahel.
- The shift of [diaspora professionals](#) into civic leadership roles in the West provides a unique diplomatic channel for African nations to influence foreign policy from within host countries.

For Private Sector/Investors:

- Investors in the Nigerian energy sector should prioritize "energy drinks" and "ready-to-drink" segments, which have seen [42% growth](#) despite the economic downturn, as seen with Champion Breweries.
- The Nigerian "informal sector" in trade fairs is moving [billions of naira](#) internationally; formalizing this sector through infrastructure and harmonized tax systems represents a massive untapped investment opportunity.
- With the IEA's strategic release failing to cool markets, logistics firms must [prepare for higher insurance costs](#) and extended transit times for any goods passing through the Cape of Good Hope.
