

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DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

March 12, 2026, marks the 12th day of "Operation Epic Fury," a massive military escalation in the Middle East led by the United States and Israel against Iran and its proxies. The conflict reached a critical juncture with the debut of Mojtaba Khamenei as Iran's new Supreme Leader, following the death of his father. His first official communique demanded the [closure of all US bases](#) in the region and the continued blockade of the Strait of Hormuz. This geopolitical chokehold has paralyzed global shipping, with approximately 150 tankers stranded as insurance providers withdraw coverage, citing an [uncalculable risk environment](#). In response, the International Energy Agency (IEA) has authorized the release of 400 million barrels of oil from emergency reserves to prevent a total global economic meltdown, even as prices surge past \$100 per barrel.

In the Balkans, the day is underscored by a profound sense of historical irony and democratic regression on the 23rd anniversary of the assassination of Serbian Prime Minister Zoran Đinđić. While regional leaders paid lip service to his legacy, reports emerged of systemic voter intimidation and the use of "phantom" electoral lists ahead of the March 29 local elections. Most alarming is the [closure of Serbia's Eurojust office](#) in The Hague, a move that effectively halts cooperation on high-level organized crime cases. Domestically, the Serbian government is intensifying its crackdown on dissent, detaining environmental activists and students on questionable "security" charges, suggesting a shift toward open repression as the ruling party consolidates power through shadow brokers like Milan Radojčić.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

- **Operation Epic Fury and the New Iranian Leadership**
 - The conflict has entered a more lethal phase; US and Israeli forces targeted Iranian infrastructure, including a [precision strike in Minab](#) that reportedly killed 168 schoolgirls, an incident blamed on outdated intelligence data.
 - Mojtaba Khamenei has assumed the role of Supreme Leader, signaling a hardline stance by [vowing to avenge](#) the blood of "martyrs" and maintaining the Hormuz blockade.
 - The US Pentagon reports at least six American service members [killed in action](#) during the first week of the offensive, which President Trump maintains is nearing "total victory."

• Global Energy and Maritime Paralysis

- The Strait of Hormuz is effectively closed to commercial traffic due to Iranian mining and the refusal of [protection and indemnity \(P&I\) clubs](#) to issue insurance for tankers.
- IEA nations agreed to release [400 million barrels](#) of crude to stabilize markets, while Serbia has preemptively banned oil exports until March 19 to protect domestic reserves.

• Electoral Integrity Crisis in Serbia

- Opposition leaders in Bajina Bašta allege that former Serbian List VP Milan Radojčić is [pressuring local businessmen](#) with lists of employees who must be prevented from voting for the opposition.
- Monitoring organizations have identified at least [12 "phantom" candidate lists](#) designed to confuse voters and dilute the opposition's reach in the 10 municipalities holding elections on March 29.

• Judicial and Civil Crackdown

- The High Prosecutorial Council's failure to appoint a liaison to Eurojust has resulted in the [suspension of 200 cases](#), including nine active investigations into high-level organized crime in Serbia.
- Student activist Luka Pešić was [detained and his home searched](#) for allegedly "endangering security" by distributing stickers featuring the image of the UKP chief.
- Environmental activist Zlatko Kokanović remains in [detention in Šabac](#), facing charges of assaulting a public official, a claim his defense denies as politically motivated.

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Energy Security & Infrastructure The EU is pivoting rapidly toward nuclear energy as Middle Eastern oil supplies remain volatile. France is leading a [nuclear alliance of 16 nations](#) to invest €250 million in Small Modular Reactors (SMRs). Croatia is advancing plans for a [second block at the Krško](#) nuclear plant, targeting 30% nuclear capacity by 2040. In Serbia, controversy surrounds [unpermitted construction for Expo 2027](#) on the Savski Kej, which critics argue ignores safety and environmental regulations in favor of rapid hotel expansion.

International Relations & Diplomatic Warfare A diplomatic rift has opened between Croatia and Israel. President Zoran Milanović [rebuked Israeli Ambassador](#) Amir Korun for suggesting the Iranian embassy in Zagreb might be a "terrorist den," calling the ambassador's rhetoric an unacceptable harassment of the Croatian public. Meanwhile, the EU's draft report on Serbia, authored by Tonino Picula, indicates that Serbia's [integration process has stalled](#) due to backsliding on the rule of law and political polarization.

AI & Cybersecurity Technological sovereignty is under scrutiny as AI tools are integrated into warfare and surveillance. Reports highlight Israel's use of [AI-generated "kill lists"](#) in Gaza, while the UK is deploying AI-driven cameras for facial recognition in crime hotspots. Domestically, Serbian activists are being targeted by [AI-manipulated imagery](#) and propaganda used by pro-government "centers for social stability" to discredit academics and students.

Labor & Industry In Bosnia and Herzegovina, the healthcare sector faces a crisis as the Tuzla Canton Union of Doctors

[announced protests](#) over a shortage of 200 specialists and poor working conditions, which are driving medical professionals to emigrate. Similarly, agricultural workers in the region express [profound uncertainty](#) regarding the upcoming planting season due to a lack of state guarantees and rising fuel costs.

LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

Legislative activity today focused on crisis management and the centralization of state power, with several Balkan governments passing emergency measures to mitigate the fallout of the Middle East war. These moves are often coupled with controversial "security" laws that expand the reach of the executive branch.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **Serbian Oil Export Ban:** An emergency decree [prohibiting the export](#) of crude oil and derivatives until March 19 to secure domestic supply during the Hormuz blockade.
- **BiH Financial Innovation Laws:** A package of laws regarding [leasing, electronic money, and banks](#) aimed at modernizing the market and reducing banking fees, currently stalled in the Federal Parliament.
- **Croatia Nuclear Development Law:** Legislation opening the path for a [long-term nuclear strategy](#), including the selection of technologies and sites for new reactors.

HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **Pentagon Press Briefing:** Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth claimed media coverage of US service member deaths is a [political vendetta](#) against the Trump administration, insisting the war is a success despite casualties.
- **Kokanović Hearing:** Environmentalist Zlatko Kokanović was [interrogated in Šabac prison](#) rather than a court, due to alleged "lack of vehicles," a move seen by supporters as an attempt to avoid public protests in Loznica.
- **Picula Report Presentation:** Tonino Picula presented a draft report to the European Parliament, recommending a [full revision of Serbia's judicial laws](#) and expressing deep concern over democratic backsliding.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The Privatization of State Power A recurring theme across today's reports is the personalization and privatization of state functions, particularly in Serbia. The [centralization of arms export decisions](#) into the hands of a few individuals has reportedly bypassed standard ministerial oversight, leading to secret deals with Israel and Azerbaijan. Military analyst Aleksandar Radić notes that [contracts are now direct](#) and lack tenders, serving the interests of "TV spectacles" rather than long-term strategic planning. This privatization extends to electoral politics, where shadowy figures like Radojčić allegedly operate outside the legal framework to influence local outcomes.

The End of Judicial Independence The closure of the Eurojust office is perhaps the

most significant indicator of the collapse of judicial autonomy in Serbia. By failing to renew the mandate of the liaison prosecutor, the state has effectively [blindfolded European investigators](#) regarding Serbian organized crime. This occurs as internal police units are used to intimidate students for sticker distribution, a [gross disproportion of force](#) that signals the judiciary and police have transitioned from public servants to tools of political survival.

Historical Regression vs. Modernization

On the Đinđić anniversary, the prevailing sentiment is one of "falling into an abyss" (u provaliju). Comparisons between 2003 and 2026 suggest that the "vision of a modern European state" has been [replaced by the methods of the 1990s](#). Activists note that while the technology has improved—citing the use of "zvučni topovi" (LRAD) and AI—the political culture has regressed to one of fear, state-sponsored propaganda, and the suppression of the [intellectual elite](#).

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks): Expect extreme volatility in fuel prices as the 400 million barrel IEA release hits a market still hindered by a [closed Hormuz Strait](#). In Serbia, the run-up to the March 29 elections will likely see increased civil unrest and more arrests of "security threats" as the government attempts to suppress opposition momentum in critical municipalities like Bajina Bašta and Loznica.

Medium Term (1-6 Months): If "Operation Epic Fury" concludes with the "victory" promised by the US administration, a [prolonged humanitarian crisis](#) in Iran is inevitable, with UNHCR projecting 3 million displaced persons. Balkan states will accelerate their shift toward nuclear energy

to decouple from Middle Eastern instability, likely resulting in significant [new contracts for SMR technology](#) and Block 2 of Krško.

Long Term (1-5 Years): The structural decoupling of Serbia from European judicial standards (Eurojust) could lead to a [formal suspension of EU accession](#) talks. The regional power architecture will shift as Croatia and Albania deepen ties with the US/Israel bloc, while Serbia potentially moves closer to China for advanced military hardware, such as the [long-range missiles](#) recently spotted on Serbian MiG-29s.

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy:

- The EU should consider [formal sanctions or the withholding of funds](#) linked to the rule of law, given the deliberate obstruction of Eurojust cooperation.
- NATO and EU maritime authorities must develop a [secondary insurance framework](#) for tankers to bypass the blockade of Hormuz, as P&I clubs will not return until kinetic operations cease entirely.
- Pressure must be applied to the Serbian government to ensure the safety of activists like Zlatko Kokanović, as his detention [violates international standards](#) for the treatment of political dissenters.

For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Energy Sector:** Diversify away from Middle Eastern crude immediately; focus on the [burgeoning nuclear supply chain](#) in Central and Eastern Europe, specifically SMR component manufacturing.

- **Balkan Risk:** Re-evaluate investments in Serbian state-led infrastructure (e.g., Expo 2027) due to a [lack of regulatory transparency](#) and high corruption risk.
- **Logistics:** Prepare for long-term [insurance premium hikes](#) for all maritime routes passing near conflict zones, as the risk models for drapes and drone strikes are being permanently recalibrated.
