

COMPOUNDING CRISES AS MIDDLE
EAST WAR DRIVES TRIPLE-DIGIT OIL
PRICES AMID DOMESTIC POLITICAL
REALIGNMENT AND ECOLOGICAL
WARNINGS

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

March 13, 2026, marks a critical juncture for Nigeria as the convergence of a full-scale [US-Israeli war with Iran](#) and significant domestic political volatility threatens the nation's fragile economic recovery. Global energy markets have been upended by the [closure of the Strait of Hormuz](#) by Iran's new Supreme Leader, Mojtaba Khamenei, pushing Brent crude prices [higher than \\$100 per barrel](#). While this theoretically increases Nigerian export earnings, the lack of domestic refining capacity and the subsequent spike in [landed fuel costs to 1,175 Naira per liter](#) are stoking fears of hyper-inflation and social unrest, forcing the Tinubu administration to establish an emergency [Petroleum Reform and Value Optimization Task Force](#).

Domestically, the political landscape is shifting rapidly. A "gale of defections" has swept the National Assembly, with [nine](#)

[senators moving to the African Democratic Congress \(ADC\)](#), signaling a major fracture in the opposition People's Democratic Party (PDP) and a possible consolidation of a new third force ahead of 2027. Simultaneously, the appointment of [Olatunji Disu as Inspector General of Police](#) comes at a moment of heightened scrutiny over internal security failures, specifically the military's inability to prevent [highly coordinated insurgent attacks on bases in Borno](#). The administration is attempting a narrative of "Renewed Hope" through infrastructure projects, but this is being undermined by a [disconnect between macroeconomic claims of stability](#) and the lived reality of citizens facing surging costs for basic services and transportation.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

1. Global Energy Shock and the Strait of Hormuz Crisis

- Iran has effectively [blocked the Strait of Hormuz](#), a vital waterway handling 20% of global oil traffic, leading to a surge in crude prices above the \$100 mark [yet again today](#).
- The Nigerian government has begun [evacuating its citizens from Iran](#) via the Armenian border as US and Israeli bombings of Iranian cities intensify [amid ongoing bombings in Tehran](#).
- Domestic fuel prices have reached [1,175 Naira per liter](#), with the Dangote Refinery reportedly increasing its prices in response to global market turmoil [increased petrol price again](#).

2. Parliamentary Volatility and the Rise of the ADC

- The Senate witnessed a massive shift in the balance of power as [ten minority lawmakers defected](#), with nine joining the African Democratic Congress (ADC), making it the [leading opposition party](#) in the upper chamber.
- Senate President Godswill Akpabio has questioned the [procedural validity of Senator Abaribe's defection](#) from APGA, threatening to declare his seat vacant due to a lack of documented internal party crisis [could lose his seat](#).
- In the House of Representatives, 12 members [dumped the PDP and Labor Party](#) for the APC and ADC, indicating a widespread loss of confidence in traditional opposition structures [PDP is gone](#).

3. Strategic Security Leadership Transition

- Olatunji Disu has been appointed as the new [Inspector General of Police \(IGP\)](#), tasked with restoring public confidence and navigating the [intense debate over state police](#).
- The military leadership is facing severe criticism following [intelligence failures in Borno State](#), where insurgents successfully raided four military bases and released high-quality propaganda videos of the destruction [shamed by this criminal element](#).
- US military cooperation has come under fire as [boots on the ground training](#) has failed to stem the tide of mass kidnappings and rural banditry [not seeing the benefits](#).

4. Ecological and Infrastructure Alerts

- Lagos State has issued an urgent [seasonal climate prediction for 2026](#), warning of "above normal" rainfall and flash flooding, with the rainy season expected to commence [around March 31](#).
- The Kenyan capital, Nairobi, has reported [50 deaths following severe flash floods](#), highlighting regional vulnerability to climate instability [147,000 people have been displaced](#).
- The Nigerian government has launched a [multi-purpose dam and hydropower project in Cross River](#) valued at \$654 million to combat flooding and boost renewable energy [generate 250 megawatts](#).

5. Judicial Activism and Electoral Tenure Limits

- A High Court in Plateau State ruled that local government chairmen [must serve four-year terms](#), declaring shorter state-legislated tenures unconstitutional [inconsistent with the 1999 constitution](#).
- In Ondo State, a court ruled that [Governor Lucky Aiyedatiwa is ineligible](#) to run for another term in 2028 because his completion of the late Akeredolu's term counts as a full first term [restrained from seeking court interpretation](#).

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Energy Security The global energy shock is the single greatest threat to Nigerian fiscal stability. The [elevated price of Brent crude](#) is a "double-edged sword," increasing foreign reserves while [tightening the cost of daily living](#) via imported fuel. The administration's response includes the [Presidential Petroleum Reform Task Force](#) led by Fola Adeola, aiming

to unlock capital and streamline the next phase of structural reforms [execution-ready reform blueprints](#). However, the immediate [unwillingness to reintroduce subsidies](#) despite 1,175 Naira/liter pump prices suggests a rigid adherence to market-driven policies that may test social order [forget bringing back subsidy](#).

Economic Security & Financial Resilience

CBN Governor Olayemi Cardoso continues to project confidence, stating the [financial system is becoming more stable](#) due to deliberate reforms. The IMF is currently [conducting its Article IV consultation](#) to assess the health of the Nigerian economy. Despite claims that debt-to-GDP has dropped to 68% [from a inherited 96%](#), critics point to the "parallel universe" of the street economy, where [inflation continues to erode purchasing power](#) and forced shifts from private to public schooling are becoming common [parents taking children out of private schools](#).

Elite Politics & Leadership Dynamics The defection of nine senators to the [ADC signifies a major realignment](#). Some analysts view the ADC as a "beautiful bride" [vehicle to actualize ambition](#) for those disgruntled with the PDP and APC. There are allegations that the [presidency is using the EFCC and ICPC](#) to hunt political opponents, specifically following the [detention of figures who joined the ADC](#). Meanwhile, the [Ondo governor's term limit ruling](#) has created a legal firestorm, as the court applies the 2018 constitutional amendment prohibiting more than two oaths of office [completing Akeredolu's term counts](#).

National Security & Terrorism The security architecture remains porous. The new IGP faces a [deep-seated distrust of the police](#), while the military is struggling with an [insurgency that operates with sophisticated media capabilities](#). Calls for the [Nigerian Army to have its own aviation base](#) and attack

helicopters reflect a lack of synergy between the Army and Air Force during active engagements [stop shaming us globally](#).

Technology Policy & AI The launch of [Sentinel Mesh, an AI operating system](#), highlights a growing tech-forward approach to governance and business, focusing on [orchestrating and automating AI activities](#) with security-first DNA. However, the use of [deepfake AI scams](#) targeting high-profile business leaders like the founder of Nairametrics [likeness telling people to join investment groups](#) shows the predatory potential of the technology in a poorly regulated environment.

LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

The National Assembly is currently the center of both legal warfare and structural reform debates. Key legislative priorities include [Special Seats for Women](#) to improve representation from the current abysmal 4.5% in the National Assembly, and the implementation of [harmonized government emails](#) to track corruption [must transact everything through official email](#).

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **Special Seats Bill for Women:** A proposed law to create [reserved seats for women](#) to counter structural barriers that keep 15 states without a single woman in their legislatures [half of Nigeria's population is effectively shut out](#).

- **Police Reform (Ongoing):** Discussions continue regarding the [constitutional amendment for State Police](#), though the executive's commitment is questioned [Tinubu does not want state police](#).

HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **IMF Article IV Consultation:** Engagement between the Senate and the [IMF mission](#) to assess President Tinubu's "million-dollar initiatives" and structural reform agenda [discuss the country's economic outlook](#).
- **Lagos Climate Briefing:** Commissioner Tokunbo Wahab's [emergency press conference](#) warning of impending flash floods and the "above normal" rainfall cycle [seasonal climate predictions](#).
- **AON Press Briefing:** United Nigeria Airlines Chairman Obiora Okonkwo [defending the aviation sector](#) against price-fixing allegations by the FCCPC [not a business you create sentiment in](#).

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The Cost of Global Entanglement The transcripts reveal a nation deeply vulnerable to "geocentric" shocks. STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks): Expect [increased localized flooding](#) in Lagos as the rainy season begins, potentially disrupting logistics in the commercial capital. Domestic fuel prices may [hit 1,200 Naira per liter](#) if Brent crude remains above \$100. Social tensions are likely to rise, particularly in urban centers where [women are already using private cars as commercial taxis](#) to survive.

Medium Term (1-6 Months): The [Petroleum Reform Task Force](#) is expected to release its first "blueprints," which may include radical divestment or restructuring of the NNPC. Political pressure will mount on Governor Aiyedatiwa to [accept his ineligibility](#) or face a protracted legal battle that could paralyze

Ondo State's governance ahead of the next election cycle.

Long Term (1-5 Years): The [emergence of the ADC](#) as a viable third force could permanently end the two-party dominance of the APC and PDP, leading to a more fragmented but potentially more representative parliamentary system. Structural reliance on [renewables and bitumen](#) may finally begin to decouple Nigeria from the volatility of the "geocentric" energy market [protecting against economic shocks](#).

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy:

- The US and Israel must account for [collateral economic damage](#) in West Africa as the war with Iran drives fuel prices toward social breaking points [unwillingness to make move that is deregulated](#).
- The [IMF's Article IV consultation](#) should prioritize social safety net funding over rigid austerity, given the [dwindling hope](#) of the Nigerian middle class [hope is dwindling](#).
- Diplomatic engagement should focus on the [African Missions Global](#) initiatives for primary education to prevent long-term radicalization in regions [devastated by Boko Haram](#).

For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Energy Diversification:** The [adoption of EVs and CNG](#) in Nigeria is no longer a luxury but a necessity for business continuity [cheaper to maintain on the long run](#).

- **Regulatory Compliance:** Investors in the maritime and extractives sectors must brace for [forensic audits and boundary disputes](#) in the Cross River corridor following the [petition to review the 2002 ICJ judgment](#).

- **Security Risk:** The [failure of intelligence](#) in the Northeast suggests that private security for remote critical infrastructure remains a mandatory expense for all [large mineral finance](#) ventures [criminal elements that invade military bases](#).
