

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AFGHANISTAN AND PAKISTAN ESCALATE TO DIRECT KINETIC CONFLICT AMIDST STRATEGIC TRADE DECOUPLING

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

March 13, 2026, marked a severe escalation in regional instability as the Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan (IEA) and the Pakistani military regime engaged in direct, reciprocal air and artillery strikes. Following Pakistani aerial bombardments of Kabul, Kandahar, Paktia, and Khost—which targeted civilian residences and a commercial fuel storage facility—the Afghan Air Force launched retaliatory strikes against [strategic military centers](#) in the Kohat region of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa. This transition from border skirmishes to conventional aerial warfare signifies a dangerous new phase in bilateral relations, driven by long-standing disputes over the Durand Line and Pakistan's internal security crisis involving the Tehrik-i-Taliban Pakistan (TTP).

Simultaneously, the IEA is leveraging this crisis to accelerate a systemic "decoupling" from Pakistan's economy. Reporting indicates that despite a six-month closure of trade routes, Afghan industry remains resilient by

pivoting to [alternative transit corridors](#) through Iran and Central Asia. Domestic governance is focused on consolidating state capacity through massive infrastructure projects—notably a \$10 billion energy agreement with the Azizi Group—and a rigorous nationwide campaign to [reclaim state-owned land](#) from former power brokers. Geopolitically, the IEA is drawing closer to China, with Beijing positioning itself as a mediator that favors political solutions over the "failed" military actions of Islamabad.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

Conventional Military Escalation with Pakistan

- The Afghan Air Force conducted precision strikes on Pakistani military installations in Kohat, reportedly destroying command centers and [ammunition depots](#) in response to earlier Pakistani incursions.
- Pakistani strikes inside Afghanistan hit a fuel storage facility in Kandahar owned by Kam Air, which provided fuel for [United Nations flights](#) and civilian aviation.
- The UN Assistance Mission in Afghanistan (UNAMA) reported that Pakistani operations since February 26 have resulted in [75 civilian deaths](#) and nearly 200 injuries, intensifying humanitarian concerns.

Energy Independence and Critical Infrastructure

- The IEA signed a landmark agreement with the Azizi Group to produce 10,000 megawatts of electricity, a [project valued at \\$10 billion](#) aimed at ending reliance on imported power.

- Progress was reported on the TAPI (Turkmenistan-Afghanistan-Pakistan-India) pipeline, with IEA officials meeting Turkmen representatives to discuss [land acquisition](#) and capacity building for the project.
- A major commercial and residential development project worth 5 billion AFN was [approved in Kunduz](#) to stimulate the regional economy.

Diplomatic Realignment Toward China and Iran

- Foreign Minister Amir Khan Muttaqi held a high-level call with Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi, where China expressed support for Afghanistan's [national sovereignty](#) and criticized military escalations.
- Trade with Iran continues unabated, with new contracts signed to [reduce liquid gas prices](#) by \$40 to \$50 per ton, stabilizing domestic energy markets.
- Indian Ministry of Foreign Affairs officials reiterated their stance branding Pakistan as a [sponsor of terrorism](#), a narrative the IEA media is utilizing to isolate Islamabad.

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Economic Security & Trade The IEA is actively mitigating the impact of Pakistani border closures by diversifying supply chains. The Deputy of the Chamber of Industry and Mines stated that the [reliance on one route](#) has effectively ended, as traders pivot to Turkish and Central Asian markets. Domestic price controls are also being enforced, particularly for [petroleum products](#) imported from Iran.

State Capacity & Land Governance Under Decree No. 26 of the Amir al-Mu'minin, the IEA has intensified its campaign against land usurpation. To date, authorities claim to have [recovered 40 million acres](#) of state land from "powerful individuals" and former officials, earmarking these areas for industrial parks and public infrastructure. This is framed as a restoration of "Bait-ul-Mal" (public treasury) and a core component of [rule of law](#) initiatives.

National Security & Digital Sovereignty

The National Statistics and Information Authority reported that [17 million citizens](#) have now been registered in the electronic ID (e-ID) system. This represents a significant increase in state surveillance and administrative control, with 44 centers nationwide capable of issuing IDs in [less than 24 hours](#).

Energy Security The Azizi Group partnership marks a strategic shift toward domestic thermal and solar power. Specific projects include 100 MW solar plants in Parwan and 130 MW in Ghazni, alongside [coal-fired plants](#) in Baghlan (350 MW) and Takhar (145 MW). The goal is to keep [millions of dollars](#) currently spent on foreign electricity within the domestic Afghan economy.

LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

Governance activity focused on administrative efficiency and the formalization of property rights through supreme decrees. The IEA Cabinet also addressed technical trade regulations to support the transport sector.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED

- **Decree No. 26 (Land Usurpation):** A supreme decree mandating the immediate identification and [seizure of stolen state lands](#). It establishes specialized courts to adjudicate property disputes according to Sharia law.
- **Vehicle Customs Extension:** The Cabinet decided to extend the [discounted customs rates](#) for "one-key" (undocumented/right-hand drive) vehicles until the end of the year 1405 (solar hijri), aiming to formalize the national fleet.

HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS

- **IEA-China Teleconference:** A strategic discussion between Foreign Ministers Muttaqi and Wang Yi regarding [regional stability](#) and China's role in the "Belt and Road" context for Afghanistan.
- **DABS-Azizi Group Signing Ceremony:** An event detailing the [\\$10 billion investment](#) roadmap for 10,000 MW of power generation.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The "Proxy State" Narrative

A recurring theme in IEA media is the characterization of Pakistan as a "proxy" or "rental" state for Western interests, specifically the United States. Analysts on RTA News argue that Pakistani generals are [fulfilling US-led projects](#) to pressure the IEA, comparing current tensions to past conflicts with the British and Soviets. This narrative serves to delegitimize the Pakistani government in the eyes of the Muslim world

while framing the IEA as the [sole defender of Islamic sovereignty](#) in the region.

Strategic Pivot to the North and West

The transcripts reveal a deliberate and systemic shift away from the "Strategic Depth" doctrine that previously defined Afghan-Pakistani relations. By strengthening trade ties with [Central Asian Republics](#) and Iran, the IEA is attempting to render Pakistani border blockades obsolete as a geopolitical weapon. The emphasis on the TAPI pipeline and Iranian gas contracts suggests a future where Afghanistan is an [energy transit hub](#) rather than a landlocked dependent.

Internal Legitimacy Through "Public Works"

Despite the looming threat of war, the IEA is heavily publicizing its domestic successes, such as tree-planting campaigns in Kabul and Kandahar, where [1.5 million saplings](#) were cultivated. These reports, alongside news of [cash aid for beggars](#) and rehabilitation of drug addicts, are intended to project an image of a stable, functioning, and compassionate government, contrasting with the [social and economic "anarchy"](#) they claim is currently engulfing Pakistan.

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks): Expect continued high-frequency border skirmishes and potential for further [retaliatory air strikes](#). The IEA is likely to further restrict Pakistani transit goods in response to civilian casualties. Domestic "national mobilization" rhetoric will increase as the IEA calls for [unity against "foreign aggression."](#)

Medium Term (1-6 Months): The focus will shift to the [feasibility studies](#) and initial groundbreaking of the Azizi Group's energy projects. If border closures remain in place, the Chabahar Port in Iran will likely see a massive surge in Afghan-bound cargo. China may attempt to facilitate a [tripartite security dialogue](#) to prevent a full-scale war that would jeopardize the "Belt and Road" investments.

Long Term (1-5 Years): If the \$10 billion energy plan succeeds, Afghanistan will transition from a net importer to a potentially [self-sufficient energy producer](#), fundamentally altering its economic leverage in South Asia. The completion of the e-ID registration will allow for a [fully digitized tax and census system](#), drastically increasing the state's central authority and fiscal resilience.

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy:

- The targeting of UN-related fuel infrastructure in Kandahar requires an immediate [neutrality assessment](#) for humanitarian logistics in the region.
- Diplomatic efforts should focus on Beijing as the primary influencer capable of de-escalating the Kabul-Islamabad [kinetic exchange](#).
- Recognition of the IEA's growing administrative control (via 17 million e-IDs) is necessary for any future [migration or security agreements](#).

For Private Sector/Investors:

- The Azizi Group's \$10 billion energy contract signals a massive opening for [subcontractors in renewable energy](#) and thermal power technology.

- Supply chain managers should permanently reroute Afghan-bound goods away from Karachi toward [Iranian and Central Asian ports](#) to avoid systemic border risk.
- Real estate and industrial investors must conduct rigorous due diligence on land titles, as the IEA's [land recovery campaign](#) may invalidate previous ownership claims from the Republic era.
