

LISTING

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

The international community is grappling with the severe economic and security fallout of a full-scale military conflict between a US-Israeli coalition and Iran, now entering its third week. The war has effectively severed the world's most critical energy artery, the Strait of Hormuz, forcing global shipping giants to reroute around Africa and driving crude oil prices above \$110 per barrel. In Washington, the administration is signaling a policy of total victory, demanding nothing less than the [unconditional surrender](#) of the Iranian regime while simultaneously targeting its nuclear infrastructure. However, despite claims of military superiority, the conflict is increasingly characterized by civilian casualties, including a controversial strike on an [Iranian school](#), and a burgeoning refugee crisis that has already displaced millions.

Domestically, Bosnia and Herzegovina is experiencing a convergence of economic

pressure and institutional paralysis. The surge in global energy prices is pushing local fuel costs toward 3 KM per liter, sparking desperate legislative attempts to suspend excise taxes—efforts that remain [stymied by political blockades](#). Simultaneously, the state is on the precipice of being "gray-listed" by Moneyval due to the failure of the House of Peoples to pass critical anti-money laundering and terrorism financing legislation. This governance failure is exacerbated by revelations of systemic corruption within the Indirect Taxation Authority (ITA) and the judiciary, fueling public unrest and a series of mass protests in Sarajevo triggered by a fatal tram accident and broader [institutional negligence](#).

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

Escalation of the US-Israel War with Iran

- US Secretary of Defense Pete Hegseth confirmed the objective is to ensure Iran's [nuclear ambitions](#) are never achieved, refusing to rule out "boots on the ground" while acknowledging that Russia is providing [intelligence to Tehran](#) on US movements.
- President Trump has demanded that international allies, including Japan and the UK, send [warships to the region](#) to ensure the Strait of Hormuz is reopened, characterizing the tjesnac as a global threat.
- The conflict has entered a "generational opportunity" phase according to US officials, who are tracking a [90% decrease](#) in Iranian missile projection capabilities following "Operation Midnight Hammer."

- Internal Iranian resistance is reportedly rising, with strikes hitting [morality police centers](#) in Tehran, though the regime continues to retaliate with strikes on [Gulf neighbors](#) and Israel.

Global Energy and Shipping Crisis

- Maersk and other shipping giants have suspended transit through the [Red Sea and Gulf](#), citing the mobilization of Iranian proxies in Yemen as a threat to international shipping.
- Oil prices have surged by 40% since the start of hostilities, with analysts warning of a [price shock](#) similar to the 1970s if the blockade of the Strait of Hormuz continues.
- Bosnia is particularly vulnerable, as [80% of its fuel](#) is imported via the Port of Ploče, and current reserves are estimated to last only 27 to 30 days of general consumption.

Bosnian Institutional and Judicial Crisis

- The state faces a June deadline to avoid the [Moneyval gray list](#), which would devastate the investment climate and complicate international banking transactions.
- A major corruption hearing revealed that the state loses [700 million KM](#) annually due to organized crime within the ITA, involving the smuggling of high-value goods and protected "tycoons."
- Prominent attorney Vasvija Vidović was sentenced to [six months](#) for obstructing justice, a case seen as a bellwether for the state of the Bosnian legal system.

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Digital Sovereignty and Big Tech Surveillance

- A growing movement in Europe is advocating for "Digital Sovereignty" to reduce reliance on US-based [tech giants](#) like Google and Meta, citing privacy risks and the use of data in US immigration raids.
- Big Tech professionals have petitioned their CEOs to cancel [surveillance contracts](#) with ICE, highlighting how Silicon Valley algorithms drive deportations.
- The use of [AI-driven cameras](#) and facial recognition is expanding globally, from the UK to China, raising concerns about the "digital dragnet" affecting ordinary citizens.

Critical Infrastructure and Energy Security

- Bosnia's lack of a domestic refinery and [devastated storage capacity](#) has left the country with minimal fuel buffers, with most funds from fuel taxes spent on administration rather than reserves.
- The Velež [wind park](#), a 77 million Euro investment, represents a rare bright spot in the country's energy transition, though rural depopulation threatens the long-term viability of the region.

Social Order and Civil Unrest

- Sarajevo citizens have held their tenth protest following a fatal tram accident, decrying a ["corrupt system"](#) that they claim protects negligent officials and police.

- Public sector workers and medical staff in Tuzla have threatened [radical measures](#) and strikes unless their salaries are harmonized with other cantons, citing the rising cost of living.

LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

Legislative activity on March 15 focused on desperate measures to mitigate the regional war's impact on local inflation and efforts to comply with international anti-corruption standards. Both the Bosnian state parliament and regional governments are debating tools for rapid economic intervention, though partisan blockades persist.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED

- **Excise Tax Amendment:** A proposal to allow the Council of Ministers to [suspend or reduce](#) fuel excise taxes for up to six months during crises. The bill is currently blocked by the SNSD in the House of Peoples.
- **Law on Fostering (Federation):** Legislation aimed at [systemic changes](#) to foster care, including higher fees and support for kinship caregivers, passed with 86 votes in the Federal Parliament.
- **Moneyval Compliance Package:** A set of two laws concerning the [seizure of property](#) and financial sanctions for terrorism, currently in the final stages of drafting but facing significant political opposition.
- **Kosovo Law on Foreigners:** New regulations requiring [residency permits](#) for Serbian workers in health and education sectors in Kosovo, viewed as a major step in the Belgrade-Pristina dialogue.

HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS

- **Anti-Corruption Commission Hearing:** Former officials and inspectors provided testimony on [systemic corruption](#) within the ITA, alleging high-level political protection for smuggling rings.
- **Hegseth Press Conference:** The US Secretary of Defense detailed the [military objectives](#) in Iran, citing biblical references and a commitment to unconditional victory.
- **Presidency Rotation Announcement:** Denis Bećirović will take over the [chairmanship of the Presidency](#) on March 16, succeeding Željko Komšić.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The End of "Dumb Wars" and the Rise of "Overwhelming Power"

A significant shift is occurring in US military doctrine. Officials are consciously distancing themselves from the "nation-building" efforts of the Iraq and Afghanistan eras, which Secretary Hegseth labeled ["dumb wars."](#) Instead, the current strategy focuses on "bringing the enemy to their knees" through overwhelming air superiority and the targeting of leadership cadres. This "Operation Midnight Hammer" approach seeks a [generational reset](#) of Iranian power without the long-term occupation typical of previous decades. However, the reliance on Israeli intelligence—specifically the [February 23rd trigger](#) regarding the location of Ali Khamenei—suggests a high degree of dependence on regional partners that may pull the US into a broader regional conflict than initially planned.

The Weaponization of Transparency and AI

Technological advancements are being double-edged in the current geopolitical climate. While AI tools like [Prism X](#) are being developed to counter online radicalization, experts warn these same tools can be used to [automate insurgencies](#) at scale. Simultaneously, the proliferation of "AI-generated" or "80% fake" media content in the Middle East is creating a fog of war that makes real-time de-escalation nearly impossible. This trend is driving a European push for [digital sovereignty](#), as nations realize that control over their data and communication infrastructure is as vital as physical border security.

Bosnia's "System of Connected Vessels" Vulnerability

The Bosnian economic crisis illustrates the danger of a decentralized state in a globalized shock. The "system of connected vessels" meant that when the Federation began forming [fuel reserves](#), they were essentially building a buffer for the entire state, despite the Republika Srpska having [no public terminals](#) of its own. This asymmetrical preparedness, combined with the blockading of tax relief measures by one entity, creates a scenario where political disputes directly translate into [market collapse](#) and public suffering. The "Pandora" corruption case's legacy continues to haunt the ITA, showing that institutional rot is the primary barrier to economic resilience.

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks)

- Fuel prices in Bosnia and the wider region are likely to breach the [3 KM threshold](#), leading to secondary price spikes in food and basic services.

- The closure of the [Strait of Hormuz](#) will lead to severe port congestion in Europe and Asia as ships arrive off-schedule after the long Africa detour.
- Bosnian labor unions will likely proceed with [mass protests](#) on March 31, potentially triggering a broader social movement against government corruption.

Medium Term (1-6 Months)

- If Moneyval laws are not passed by June, Bosnia's [gray-listing](#) will cause a contraction in foreign direct investment and an increase in interest rates as banks de-risk.
- The Iranian regime may face a [legitimacy crisis](#) as internal strikes and protests merge with the external military pressure, potentially leading to fragmented regional control.
- European adoption of [privacy-focused tech](#) (Signal, Mastodon, Ecosia) will accelerate as a political priority against "Big Tech" surveillance.

Long Term (1-5 Years)

- The Middle East conflict may force a permanent [post-oil realignment](#), as Gulf states accelerate tourism and tech investments to survive the volatility of energy markets.
- Bosnia's energy landscape may shift toward [renewables](#) out of necessity, though structural depopulation in rural areas remains a threat to the labor force needed for such transitions.
- US-Russian relations will further degrade as [intelligence sharing](#) with proxies becomes a standard tool of indirect warfare.

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy

- Diplomatic pressure must be maintained on the Bosnian House of Peoples to pass [Moneyval legislation](#) immediately, as a gray-listing would destabilize the Western Balkans' financial link to Europe.
- Regional mediators (Qatar, Oman) should be supported in maintaining [communication channels](#) to prevent a total collapse of the Gulf security architecture.
- The investigation into [civilian casualties](#) (school bombings) in Iran must be transparent to maintain the coalition's moral standing and prevent further radicalization.

For Private Sector/Investors

- Logistics and supply chain managers should factor in [permanent surcharges](#) and 10-14 day delays for all sea freight between Europe and Asia.
- Investors in Bosnia should prepare for increased [compliance costs](#) and potential transactional friction if the state misses the anti-money laundering legislative deadline.
- Companies utilizing AI agents should implement [contained environments](#) to prevent "prompt injection" or unauthorized data extraction as these tools become targets in information warfare.
