

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

The conflict between the United States, Israel, and Iran entered a critical new phase on March 17, 2026, characterized by the systemic "decapitation" of the Iranian security apparatus and a sharpening rift between the Trump administration and its traditional NATO allies. Israeli air strikes in Tehran successfully [targeted and killed](#) two pivotal figures: Ali Larijani, the Secretary of the Supreme National Security Council and a key pragmatic intermediary, and Gholam Reza Soleimani, commander of the Basij internal security force. While the Israeli government framed these assassinations as a "historic opportunity" to incite regime change, analysts warn that the removal of moderating voices like Larijani consolidates power among Iranian hardliners and closes potential diplomatic off-ramps, likely leading to a more reckless and protracted war of attrition.

Simultaneously, the Trump administration is facing severe domestic and international headwinds. Internationally, the United States is [increasingly isolated](#) as NATO partners, including the UK, France, and Germany, have formally declined requests to send warships to help reopen the Strait of Hormuz, citing the lack of prior consultation and the risk of being drawn into a "war of choice." Domestically, the resignation of Joseph Kent, Director of the National Counter Terrorism Center, marks the first high-profile [administrative fracture](#) over the war. Kent, a decorated special forces veteran and Trump loyalist, accused Israel of manipulating Washington into a conflict that poses no imminent threat to U.S. national security, signaling a burgeoning "America First" vs. "Israel First" divide within the President's own MAGA base.

The economic consequences of the blockade at the Strait of Hormuz have shifted from market volatility to systemic disruption. With oil prices hovering near \$100 per barrel and global supply chains for aluminum, helium, and fertilizer [facing collapse](#), the risk of global stagflation is high. In the United States, Republican lawmakers are expressing acute anxiety that "pain at the pump" will [wipe out the benefits](#) of their domestic economic agenda ahead of the November midterm elections. Iran, leveraging its geography as its primary asymmetric asset, continues to selectively target Gulf infrastructure, ensuring that the threshold of economic pain for the West remains the primary determinant of the war's duration.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

Decapitation of Iranian Security and Political Leadership

- Israeli air strikes in Tehran killed [Ali Larijani](#), the most senior political figure targeted since the assassination of the Supreme Leader. Larijani was viewed as a "consensus builder" who navigated the nexus between the IRGC and the clerical establishment.
- Iranian State TV [confirmed the death](#) of Gholam Reza Soleimani, head of the Basij, who was central to internal security and the suppression of domestic unrest.
- Prime Minister Netanyahu asserted that these strikes [shake the foundations](#) of the regime, while the IRGC vowing "severe and decisive" retaliation.

Administrative Fracture and Resignation of Joe Kent

- NCTC Director Joseph Kent [resigned in protest](#), stating Iran posed no imminent threat and accusing the "Israel lobby" of dragging the U.S. into war.
- President Trump [dismissed Kent as "weak"](#) on security, but the resignation highlights internal dissent among MAGA hardliners who prioritize isolationism over regional intervention.

Collapse of Alliance Cohesion over Strait of Hormuz

- The UK, Japan, and the EU have [rejected Trump's demands](#) for naval assistance, with Germany's Chancellor stating the conflict is "not a matter for NATO."

- Trump responded by [scolding allies](#), suggesting that their refusal to help would lead to a "very bad future" for existing security alliances.
- The International Maritime Organization warned that [naval escorts](#) are not a sustainable solution to the 20% global energy flow disruption.

Expansion of the Lebanon Ground Offensive

- Israel has [renewed displacement orders](#) for 14% of Lebanese territory, pushing its ground operation further north toward the Litani River.
- Hezbollah reported [targeting five Israeli tanks](#) in the last 24 hours and maintains the ability to fire roughly 100 rockets daily into Israel.
- The Lebanese Army reported [three soldiers killed](#) by Israeli strikes, despite not being a formal combatant in the Hezbollah-Israel conflict.

Regional Instability and Secondary Theaters

- Iraq has become a [secondary battlefield](#), with repetitive drone attacks on the U.S. Embassy and hotel compounds housing foreign diplomats in Baghdad's Green Zone.
- A massive Pakistani air strike in Kabul [killed at least 400 people](#), targeting what Islamabad claimed were Taliban-supported militant depots, but Kabul identified as a drug rehab center.
- The UAE and Qatar [intercepted multiple Iranian missiles](#), while debris from interceptions caused fires in Doha's industrial area.

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Energy Security & Strait of Hormuz

- Iran has effectively [halted maritime traffic](#) for the West, while allowing selective passage for Chinese, Indian, and Turkish vessels.
- Oil price increases are hitting [energy-dependent Asian economies](#) like South Korea, where the currency has reached its weakest level since 2008.
- The Trump administration is attempting to provide [political risk insurance](#) via the Development Finance Corporation to encourage cargo flow, though shipping companies remain hesitant without ironclad safety guarantees.

AI & Warfare Policy

- Researchers warn of "[AI washing](#)," where militaries use large language models to generate target lists (e.g., Lavender and Gospel systems), potentially bypassing human accountability for civilian casualties.
- The use of prompt-based interfaces allows for [automated killing at scale](#), with oversight being described as "incredibly permissive."

Elite Politics & Leadership Dynamics

- The death of Ali Larijani removes a [pivotal moderating figure](#) capable of coordinating between IRGC and political factions, likely empowering more radical elements under the new Supreme Leader, Mojtaba Khamenei.
- In Israel, Prime Minister Netanyahu faces a [disconnect in polling](#): while 80% of Jewish Israelis support the war, only 38% express general trust in his leadership.

Supply Chain Fragility

- The closure of the Strait of Hormuz has triggered a [fertilizer crisis](#) for U.S. farmers, as 15% of nitrogen and phosphorus used in American agriculture originates in the Gulf.
- Aluminum prices have reached [multi-year highs](#) as Gulf smelting factories lose access to raw material imports and export routes.
- Qatar's suspension of helium production—a byproduct of LNG—is threatening the [semiconductor and aerospace](#) industries.

Humanitarian Crisis & State Capacity

- UNICEF reports that [one classroom per day](#) of children are being killed or wounded in Lebanon, with over 1.2 million people displaced.
- The World Food Program warns that the conflict could push [45 million people](#) into acute hunger by June due to rising food and shipping costs.
- The Palestinian Authority is facing an [existential financial threat](#) as Israel continues to withhold tax revenues for the 10th consecutive month.

LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

Legislative activity centered on mitigating the economic fallout of the war and the struggle for congressional authorization of an expanding conflict. Republican leaders are prioritizing the "Big Beautiful Bill" to lower consumer costs, though its [viability is being undermined](#) by skyrocketing energy prices. In the Philippines, the executive branch has [distributed fuel subsidies](#) to counteract the doubling of diesel prices since the war's onset.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED

- **The Big Beautiful Bill (U.S.):** A cornerstone Republican economic policy intended to reduce costs for average Americans; independent reports now suggest [benefits will be negated](#) by oil shocks.
- **Spanish Government "No to War" Declaration:** A formal policy stance [refusing to join](#) the U.S.-Israeli offensive, citing international law violations.
- **UN Security Council Draft Resolution:** A failed attempt to [end the fighting](#), reinforcing the powerlessness of international bodies in the current conflict architecture.

HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS

- **Trump-Irish PM Press Conference:** The President used this event to [lash out at NATO](#) and dismiss the resignation of Joe Kent, while confirming his belief that the Iranian leadership has been "decimated."
- **Israel Katz Defense Briefing:** The Israeli Defense Minister detailed the [termination of Iranian capabilities](#) and confirmed the deaths of Larijani and Soleimani.
- **Downing Street Bilateral (Starmer/Zelensky):** Discussion of a new [UK-Ukraine drone partnership](#) to monetize Kyiv's experience in countering Iranian-designed hardware.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The Industry of Targeted Assassination

The current conflict is distinguishing itself from historical baselines through the "industrialization" of political and military assassinations. Unlike conventional warfare,

which focuses on degrading infrastructure and formations, the Israeli-U.S. strategy appears to be [regime change via decapitation](#). By moving beyond military commanders to political strategists like Larijani, the allies are attempting to trigger a state collapse. This asymmetric "economic war" targets the political survival of the Trump administration via the American consumer.

The Erosion of the "Special Relationship" and NATO Utility

- **Lebanon Incursion:** The Israeli ground offensive will likely reach the [Litani River](#), triggering a deeper humanitarian crisis and potentially drawing the Lebanese Army into direct combat.
- **Oil Market Pressure:** If the U.S. proceeds with [seizing Kharag Island](#), expect Brent crude to surge well past \$120/barrel as Iran attempts to "burn" the region's energy heart.

Medium Term (1-6 Months)

- **U.S. Midterm Elections:** Persistent high energy costs and the sight of "body bags" returning from a new foreign war are likely to result in [significant Republican seat losses](#), potentially shifting control of Congress to the Democrats.
- **Iranian Leadership Consolidation:** The death of pragmatic figures will lead to a "Republic 2.0" dominated by [ultra-hardline IRGC commanders](#), making any future nuclear negotiations virtually impossible.
- **Supply Chain Realignment:** Continued disruption in the Gulf will force a permanent [shift toward renewable transitions](#) in China and higher reliance on North American energy in Europe.

Long Term (1-5 Years)

- **Nuclear Proliferation:** Surviving the decapitation strategy will likely convince the remaining Iranian leadership that a [nuclear deterrent is the only guarantee](#) of regime survival, leading to an open break from the NPT.
- **Alliance Shift:** The rift over the Iran war may lead to a fundamental [restructuring of NATO](#), with European members creating an independent security architecture less dependent on the U.S.
- **Regional Hegemony:** Israel may achieve its goal of being a "global superpower" in the region, but at the cost of being surrounded by [failed states and insurgent networks](#) born from the collapse of central Iranian authority.

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy

- **Establish Multilateral Mediation:** Policy makers should support [Oman and Qatar](#) as primary conduits for an off-ramp, as direct U.S.-Iran channels have been obliterated by the recent assassinations.
- **Decouple Lebanon from Iran:** Diplomatic efforts should focus on [empowering the Lebanese government](#) and army to disarm Hezbollah, as an Israeli ground occupation is historically proven to be a catalyst for further insurgency.
- **Address "AI Washing":** International bodies must pursue a binding instrument on [autonomous weapons systems](#) to ensure a human chain of command and prevent the normalization of "industry-scale" political killings.

For Private Sector/Investors

- **Supply Chain Diversification:** Companies relying on aluminum and helium must [diversify away from Gulf suppliers](#), as the "selective closure" of the Strait of Hormuz is likely to persist even after major combat ends.
- **Energy Hedging:** Investors should hedge against [sustained oil prices above \\$90](#), as the Trump administration's "four-to-six week" victory timeline is increasingly viewed as disingenuous by military analysts.
- **Insurance and Maritime Risk:** Shipping firms must anticipate that [naval escorts will not reduce risks](#) to zero; crews may refuse transit in the "kill zone" despite government-backed political risk insurance.
