TRANSATLANTIC FRAGMENTATION
AND ECONOMIC INSTABILITY
INTENSIFY AS THE US-IRAN WAR
REACHES TWO-MONTH MARK

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

The global geopolitical landscape is undergoing a profound realignment on April 30, 2026, driven by the two-month-old war between the United States and Iran. The conflict has severely disrupted global energy markets, with oil prices surging to approximately [117 to 126 dollars per barrel](#), a spike that is fueling record inflation and straining the industrial capacity of European allies. Simultaneously, the transatlantic alliance is facing a crisis of confidence as President Donald Trump engages in open diplomatic hostilities with German Chancellor Friedrich Merz, while bypassing traditional allies to hold extensive [negotiations with Vladimir Putin](#) regarding ceasefires in both Ukraine and Iran. This shift is forcing European leaders to reconsider their reliance on the U.S. security umbrella, as nations like Belgium deploy independent assets to secure the Strait of Hormuz.

In the Balkans, Bosnia and Herzegovina is attempting to leverage this energy crisis to finalize the "South Interconnection" gas project, a strategic initiative aimed at achieving [energy independence from Russian gas](#) with U.S. backing. However, this progress is clouded by internal governance failures, including the threat of being placed on the "Manival" gray list and the imminent collapse of the "Nova Željezara" steel plant in Zenica. The convergence of regional industrial decline, elite political maneuvering ahead of October elections, and the rise of new political forces in neighboring Hungary suggests a period of extreme volatility for the region's stability and economic future.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

- **Escalation of the US-Iran Conflict and Global Economic Fallout:**
 - The war has cost the U.S. Treasury an estimated [25 billion dollars to date](#), with projections suggesting the final bill will be significantly higher due to the need to replenish stockpiles.
 - Global oil prices have risen by [45 dollars per barrel](#) since the start of hostilities on February 28, leading to a projected recovery period of 18 to 24 months for the European economy.
 - Belgium has confirmed the deployment of elite [mine-clearing units](#) to the Strait of Hormuz to ensure freedom of navigation, independent of U.S. cost-sharing pressures.

• **Diplomatic Realignment and Transatlantic Discord:**

- President Trump and Russian President Vladimir Putin held a [90-minute phone call](#) to discuss a potential ceasefire for May 9 (Victory Day), while Trump simultaneously insulted German Chancellor Merz for his economic management.
- European leaders are increasingly viewing the U.S. as an unreliable partner, with the "European Political Community" serving as a [platform for collective defense](#) strategies that exclude Washington.

• **The South Interconnection Gas Project Breakthrough:**

- Bosnia and Herzegovina and Croatia have signed a [bilateral agreement](#) to extend gas infrastructure, supported by the U.S. Department of Energy.
- The project aims to replace Russian fossil fuels with [U.S.-sourced LNG](#) arriving via the terminal at Krk, Croatia.

• **Political Seismic Shifts in Hungary:**

- The rise of Peter Magyar and the Tisa party marks the end of [16 years of Viktor Orbán's rule](#), with the EU moving quickly to unblock billions in funding for the new administration.

• **Industrial and Labor Unrest in Zenica:**

- The "Nova Željezara" steel plant is facing [imminent bankruptcy](#), prompting the Federation government to seek 100% ownership to prevent the loss of thousands of jobs and a systemic shock to the national economy.

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Energy Security: The closure of the Strait of Hormuz is the primary threat to European energy stability. While the U.S. maintains that opening the strait is a [European problem](#), nations like Croatia and Bosnia are accelerating the South Interconnection to diversify supply. The project remains complicated by [long-term fiscal risks](#) and potential deficits.

Geopolitical Power Dynamics: President Trump's "America First" rhetoric has reached a zenith, with the President labeling [NATO a "paper tiger"](#) and a burden. This has created a vacuum being filled by increased Russian influence in ceasefire negotiations and European efforts toward [strategic autonomy](#).

Domestic Stability & Social Order: Labor unions in Bosnia and Herzegovina have announced [May 1st protests](#) to fight for worker rights and industrial preservation. Tensions are exacerbated by [rising energy costs](#) and a perception of government neglect.

Corruption & Governance: Bosnia faces a "red alarm" in its judiciary. Transparency International warns that the country is [failing its reform agenda](#), risking the loss of 500 million euros in EU "Growth Plan" funds due to political blockades and a lack of judicial independence.

Technology Policy & Digital Sovereignty: The massive "Pantheon" project, a [50-billion-euro AI data center](#) in Croatia, has sparked controversy over energy consumption and local displacement, highlighting the friction between high-tech investment and [community sovereignty](#).

Economic Security: The Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina has implemented

[price caps on bread](#) to mitigate the impact of inflation, while SIPA and DEA are warning citizens of [digital fraud schemes](#) exploiting government identities.

LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

Legislative activity today focused heavily on crisis management, energy regulation, and anti-corruption measures. In the U.S., congressional debates were dominated by the Pentagon's budget requests for the Iran conflict, while the Bosnian Parliament remains paralyzed on key judicial reforms.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **South Interconnection International Agreement:** A bilateral treaty between Bosnia and Croatia to build gas infrastructure; [awaiting ratification](#) in both parliaments.

- **Law on Limiting Property Disposal (Terrorism Financing):** A single-issue bill [aimed at avoiding the Manival gray list](#); scheduled for a hitna (urgent) session.
- **Pšeničnog Hljeba Price Control:** A Federation-level measure [limiting the price of bread](#) to 2 KM for 500g.

HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **Defense Secretary Hegseth Capitol Hill Testimony:** A confrontational session where Hegseth dismissed "quagmire" labels and attacked Democrats for [undermining troop morale](#) during the Iran war.
- **Transparency International Briefing:** Executive Director Ivana Korajlić warned of the [imminent loss of millions](#) in EU funds due to legislative negligence.
- **Three Seas Initiative Summit (Dubrovnik):** Leaders focused on energy resilience and the [transition from Russian fossil fuels](#) to Western LNG.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The Fracture of the Transatlantic Security Consensus: The transcript reveals a definitive shift where European nations are no longer waiting for U.S. leadership. Industrial De-escalation vs. Nationalization: In Bosnia, the "Nova Željezara" crisis represents a broader trend of failing privatized industry. The government's move toward [100% ownership](#) is a desperate attempt at state capitalism to prevent social collapse, yet it conflicts with EU directives and the [current management's vision](#) of an accelerated bankruptcy. This "tug-of-war" over industrial assets is likely to dominate domestic politics through the October elections.

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks): Expect heightened civil unrest across Bosnia and Herzegovina as [May 1st protests](#) merge with industrial anger in Zenica. Oil prices will remain volatile, potentially testing the [130-dollar-per-barrel mark](#) if Pentagon strike plans for Iran proceed. In Croatia, legal challenges to the [Pantheon data center project](#) will likely intensify as local communities organize protests against land expropriation.

Medium Term (1-6 Months): The Bosnian elections in October will serve as a referendum on the "Trojka" coalition's ability to [deliver energy independence](#) and judicial reform. If Peter Magyar's administration in Hungary successfully integrates [billions in EU funds](#), it could create a "Polish-style" economic surge that shifts the regional power balance away from Orbán-aligned nationalist blocs.

Long Term (1-5 Years): The South Interconnection will fundamentally alter **regional energy flows**, but only if the U.S. maintains its commitment to [security in the Mediterranean](#). Structurally, Europe's move

toward "dual-use" military-civilian infrastructure will accelerate as the [distrust of the U.S. security umbrella](#) becomes a permanent feature of EU policy.

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy:

- Diplomatic efforts should prioritize stabilizing the [Strait of Hormuz](#) through multilateral coalitions that include Gulf partners, as the U.S. presence is increasingly viewed as a catalyst for regional instability.
- The rise of [Peter Magyar](#) provides an opportunity to reintegrate Hungary into the EU mainstream, which could be used as a lever to pressure Bosnian elites to adopt [pro-EU reforms](#).
- Monitor the [Trump-Putin dialogue](#) closely, as any "grand bargain" on Ukraine or Iran could leave European allies with the bill for reconstruction while excluding them from security guarantees.

For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Energy Hedging:** Industries reliant on fossil fuels should brace for [prolonged oil volatility](#), with potential for price shocks exceeding 130 USD/barrel if military strikes on Iranian infrastructure occur.
- **Regulatory Risk:** In Bosnia, the threat of the [Manival gray list](#) could increase compliance costs and hinder international financial transactions for firms operating in the region.

- **Infrastructure Sentiment:** Investors in mega-projects like the [Pantheon data center](#) must account for growing "anti-green/anti-tech" local movements that utilize [land-use litigation](#) to stall billion-dollar investments.
