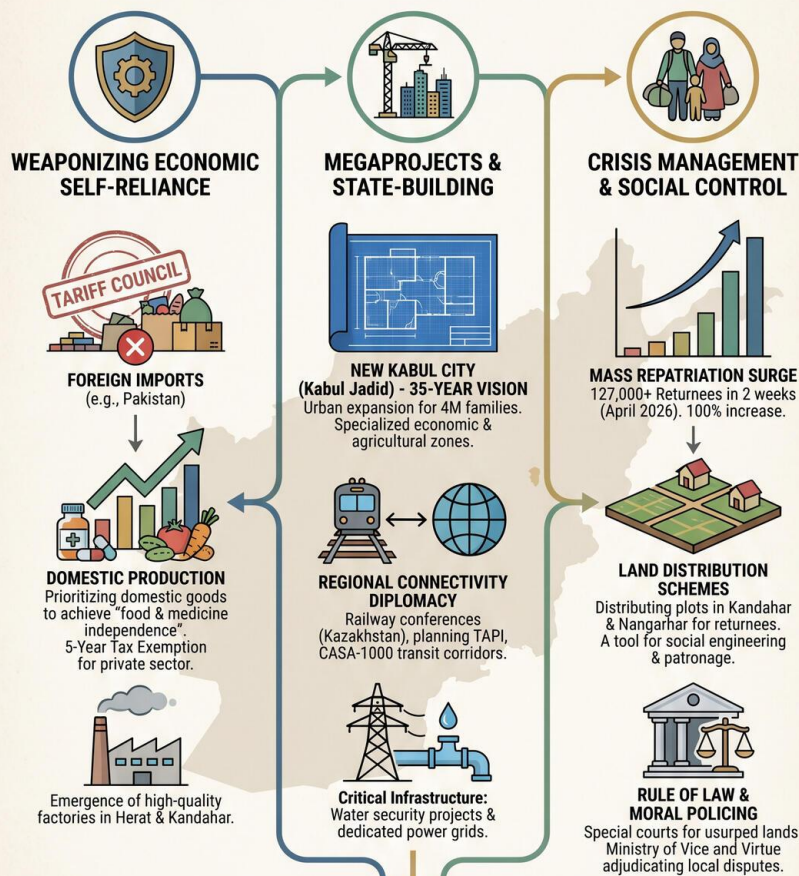

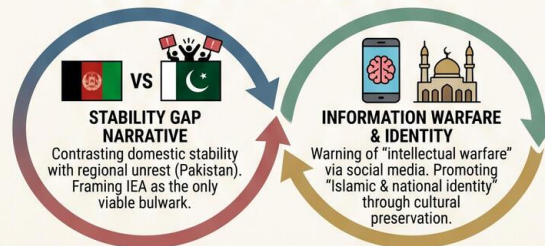

### THE ISLAMIC EMIRATE: CONSOLIDATING POWER AMIDST REGIONAL CRISIS

A Narrative of Economic Protectionism, Megaprojects, and Migration Management

## DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

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The state media narrative on May 2, 2026, centers on a multi-pronged effort by the Islamic Emirate of Afghanistan (IEA) to project an image of transition from a wartime insurgency to a stable, self-sufficient governing body. This is articulated through three primary channels: aggressive economic protectionism, the rollout of long-term infrastructure megaprojects, and the systematic management of a massive influx of returnees from neighboring Pakistan and Iran. The administration is increasingly utilizing "Tariff Councils" to prioritize domestic production over foreign imports, specifically targeting Pakistani pharmaceuticals and agricultural goods as a means to achieve "food and medicine independence." This economic pivot is coupled with a narrative of superior security, explicitly contrasting

Afghanistan's domestic stability with the rising civil unrest and terrorism indices in Pakistan.

Simultaneously, the IEA is signaling its intent for long-term regional integration and urbanization. Participation in international railway conferences in Kazakhstan and the detailed planning of the "New Kabul City" (Kabul Jadid) project—a 35-year urban development initiative—suggest a shift toward permanent state-building. However, this progress is tested by the logistical burden of over 127,000 returnees in the latter half of April alone. The government's response, involving the distribution of thousands of land plots in Kandahar and Nangarhar, functions both as a humanitarian necessity and a tool for social engineering and patronage. The overarching theme is the "sanctification" of the current order, framed as the natural successor to the Mujahideen victories of the past, while positioning the IEA as the only viable bulwark against "intellectual warfare" and regional instability.

## MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

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- **Systematic Shift Toward Economic Protectionism:** The IEA is moving beyond basic trade to a structured policy of import substitution. The "Tariff Council," comprising several ministers, is actively [analyzing import-to-production ratios](#) to determine which foreign goods to penalize through high tariffs or outright bans.
  - The council has identified dozens of items for protection, leading to the [emergence of high-quality pharmaceutical factories](#) in Herat and Kandahar to replace "low-quality" Pakistani imports.
  - A five-year tax exemption policy for the private sector is being touted as a [catalyst for domestic industrialization](#) and a challenge to neighboring competitors.
- **Advancement of the "New Kabul City" Megaproject:** Detailed planning for "Kabul Jadid" highlights a 35-year vision for urban expansion aimed at housing four million families.
  - The project includes specialized [economic, commercial, and agricultural zones](#) designed to relieve the population pressure on the current capital.
  - Immediate infrastructure plans involve securing water from the [Gulbahar and Panjshir sources](#) and establishing dedicated power grids for the new city.

- **Crisis Management of Mass Repatriation:** International monitoring agencies report a surge in Afghan returnees, forcing the IEA to escalate land distribution schemes.
  - More than [127,000 Afghans returned](#) from Pakistan and Iran in the final two weeks of April 2026, a 100% increase over the previous year.
  - In response, the IEA has initiated the [distribution of land plots](#) for 3,050 returnees in the Zhari district of Kandahar and over 1,200 plots in Nangarhar.
- **Regional Infrastructure and Connectivity Diplomacy:** Despite limited formal recognition, the IEA continues to engage in technical regional forums.
  - An Afghan delegation attended the 40th [Organization for Cooperation of Railways](#) (OSJD) conference in Kazakhstan to discuss transit corridors and modernizing rail systems.
  - The IEA has reportedly [prepared the groundwork](#) for major trans-regional projects including TAPI, CASA-1000, and TAP.
- **Historical and Moral Legitimacy Campaigns:** The state is increasingly using cultural preservation and moral policing to solidify its identity.
  - Restoration projects for the [Palace of Bukhara](#) in Kabul and the Khwaja Abdullah Ansari shrine in Herat are being framed as essential to preserving "Islamic and national identity."
  - The Ministry of Vice and Virtue reported [resolving 60 local disputes](#) and 9 cases of "hostility" in a single week, positioning itself as a primary adjudicator of civil law.

## KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

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- **Economic Security and Trade:** The IEA is aggressively pursuing self-sufficiency by leveraging "Tariff Councils" to [protect domestic industries](#) from foreign competition. This includes a strict [quality control regime](#) at borders, recently resulting in the rejection of 680 tons of low-quality fuel and construction materials.
- **Critical Infrastructure:** Water security is a top priority, with over [100 clean water projects](#) completed across 19 provinces. Furthermore, the [Kabul-Kandahar highway reconstruction](#) remains a flagship project for internal trade and transit capacity.
- **National Security & Regional Power Dynamics:** State media highlights a [decline in terrorism indices](#) within Afghanistan while pointing to rising instability in Pakistan. The IEA claims its [unified "Islamic Army"](#) is now better equipped to defend territory than the previous NATO-backed forces.
- **Diplomatic Engagement:** Engagement with Iran remains pragmatic, evidenced by a [23-article trade agreement](#) signed with the Sistan-Baluchestan province to activate border markets and small-scale trade.
- **Information Warfare & Technology Policy:** The IEA is warning of "intellectual warfare" through social media, urging ["healthy and positive" usage](#) to prevent the erosion of Islamic values. Simultaneously, the state is modernizing its tracking capabilities, implementing a [six-digit barcode system](#) for Afghan Post to improve geographic tracking and logistics.
- **Rule of Law:** Special courts are targeting [usurped \(grabbed\) lands](#), with significant rulings in Nangarhar province to return property to state control.

## LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

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Legislative and policy activity focused on economic regulation and land management. The "Tariff Council" appears to be acting as a quasi-legislative body for trade, while executive orders from the supreme leader (Amir al-Mu'minin) continue to dictate the response to the migration crisis. There is also a notable emphasis on codifying "media ethics" under Sharia principles.

- **Land Distribution Decree (Zhari District):** An executive decree governing the [allocation of residential plots](#) for 3,050 returnee families in Kandahar, including provisions for parks and schools.
- **Tariff Council Policy Mandate:** A standing directive to [prioritize domestic goods](#) by calculating domestic supply against total demand and adjusting tariffs on imports accordingly.
- **Hajj Ethical Guidelines:** New [behavioral codes issued](#) by the Ministry of Hajj and Religious Affairs for pilgrims, focusing on "Islamic morality" and behavioral reform.
- **Iran-Afghanistan Border Trade Agreement:** A [23-point memorandum](#) signed between Nimroz provincial officials and Iranian counterparts to formalize border market operations.

## DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

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### Weaponizing Economic Self-Reliance

The IEA has moved past rhetoric regarding "independence" and is now operationalizing it through protectionist trade policies. By framing foreign goods (particularly from Pakistan) as ["low-quality" or "harmful,"](#) the administration creates a moral and patriotic imperative to support local industry. This

trend is particularly visible in the pharmaceutical and construction sectors. The [five-year tax holiday](#) for domestic producers suggests a strategic bet that Afghanistan can build an industrial base capable of withstanding continued international isolation.

### **The "Stability Gap" Narrative**

A consistent theme throughout the broadcasts is the contrast between a "pacified" Afghanistan and a "chaotic" Pakistan. The IEA is using global security indices to [triumphantly claim success](#) in counter-terrorism, arguing that the elimination of "uncoordinated groups" has created a vacuum of peace. This narrative serves two purposes: it justifies the restrictive central control of the IEA and mocks the security failures of regional neighbors who previously criticized the Taliban's ability to govern.

### **State-Building via "New Kabul City"**

The re-emergence of the "New Kabul City" project as a central pillar of governance suggests a desire to create a "Year Zero" urban environment. By focusing on a [35-year development plan](#), the IEA is attempting to demonstrate a horizon of governance that extends far beyond immediate survival. This project also provides a massive opportunity for [job creation and technical skill-building](#), which the state media links to the graduation of young "apprentices" in various provinces.

### **The Secular vs. Islamic Media Conflict**

The IEA is openly grappling with the influence of the internet. By labeling social media a ["hidden weapon" of intellectual warfare](#), the administration is laying the groundwork for tighter digital controls. The push for media to move from being "news providers" to "awareness providers" is a clear signal that the IEA expects [all information channels](#) to

serve as vehicles for state ideology and "intellectual defense."

## **STRATEGIC FORESIGHT**

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- **Short Term (1-4 Weeks):** Expect a continued [surge in border activity](#) as repatriation efforts peak. This may lead to localized humanitarian strain in Kandahar and Nangarhar despite land distribution efforts. There will likely be a [crackdown on fuel retailers](#) who deviate from newly established state price lists.
- **Medium Term (1-6 Months):** Diplomatic friction with Pakistan may increase as [protectionist tariffs](#) begin to impact Pakistani exporters significantly. The IEA will likely seek to formalize more "technical" agreements with Central Asian neighbors (Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan) regarding [railway corridors](#) to bypass traditional trade routes through Pakistan.
- **Long Term (1-5 Years):** The "New Kabul City" project will serve as the [primary gauge](#) of IEA state capacity. If the administration can successfully deliver water and power to these new zones, it will solidify its legitimacy among the urban merchant class. Conversely, failure to manage the [reintegration of millions of returnees](#) could create a new underclass susceptible to civil unrest.

## RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

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### For International Policy:

- **Security De-confliction:** International actors should monitor the IEA's claims of [terrorism reduction](#) critically, as the "stability" may be a result of the suppression of dissent rather than the elimination of militant capabilities.
- **Humanitarian Aid Targeting:** With over [64,000 orphans and widows registered](#), aid should be channeled toward these specific social safety nets while navigating IEA-imposed "moral" frameworks.
- **Transit Corridors:** Regional powers should prepare for a more [assertive Afghan role](#) in railway and energy transit (TAPI/CASA-1000) as the IEA seeks to leverage its geography for economic survival.

### For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Import-Substitution Opportunities:** The IEA's aggressive [tariff protection](#) creates a unique (though high-risk) window for investors in local manufacturing, particularly in pharmaceuticals and processed stones (marble/onyx).
- **Infrastructure Risks:** Megaprojects like [New Kabul City](#) offer massive potential for construction and engineering firms, but rely entirely on the regime's long-term fiscal resilience and political stability.
- **Compliance and Moral Oversight:** Businesses operating within Afghanistan must account for the [increased role of muhtasibeem - vice/virtue\) محتسبین inspectors](#)) in mediating commercial and labor disputes.
