

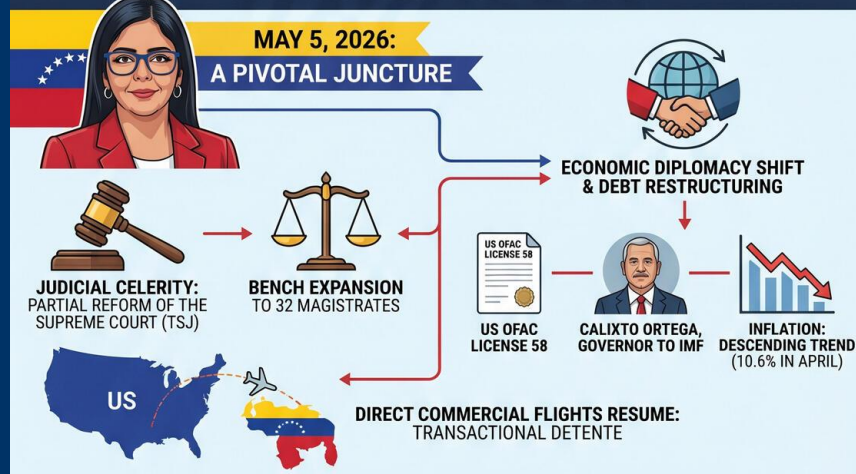

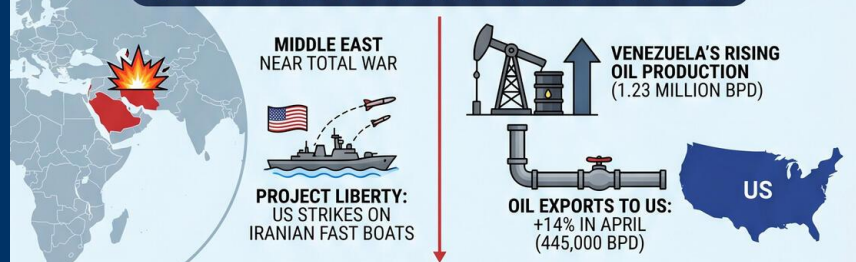

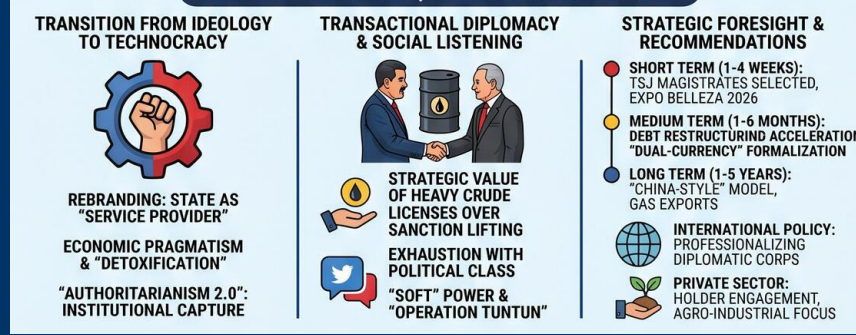

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

May 5, 2026, marks a pivotal juncture for the administration of Acting President Delcy Rodríguez, as the government aggressively pursues a narrative of "re-institutionalization" to decouple from the ideological rigidities of the previous decade. Domestically, the administration is leveraging its first 100 days to push through a [partial reform of the Supreme Court](#) (TSJ), expanding the bench to 32 magistrates under the guise of "judicial celerity." This move occurs alongside a significant shift in economic diplomacy, evidenced by the appointment of Calixto Ortega as Governor to the IMF and the issuance of US OFAC License 58, which authorizes preparatory steps for a massive restructuring of Venezuela's \$170 billion public debt. The narrative of "normalcy" is further bolstered by the resumption of direct commercial flights between the US and

Venezuela, signaling a transactional detente with the Trump administration.

The administration's pivot toward "authoritarian pragmatism" is strategically timed to exploit a deteriorating global security environment. As the [Middle East nears a state of total war](#)—with the US launching "Project Liberty" to break an Iranian blockade of the Strait of Hormuz—Venezuela's rising oil production (1.23 million barrels per day) is being positioned as a critical alternative for Western markets. However, internal friction remains evident; while the government reports a "descending trend" in inflation to 10.6% for April, opposition leaders and independent analysts warn that the "new moment" lacks true democratic depth, citing the continued detention of military figures and the selective application of the Law of Amnesty.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

Expansion of the Supreme Court (TSJ)

- The National Assembly approved the first discussion of a reform to Article 8 of the Organic Law of the TSJ, increasing the [total number of magistrates to 32](#) to allegedly address procedural delays and "judicial overcrowding."
- Critics, including Deputy Luis Florido, argue that the [designation of public powers](#) has remained a closed-door government process rather than a broad national consensus.
- The reform proposes expanding the Constitutional Chamber to seven magistrates and other chambers to five each.

Debt Restructuring and IMF Re-engagement

- The US Treasury issued [General License 58](#), allowing US professionals to provide legal and financial consultancy to the Venezuelan government for potential debt restructuring.
- Calixto Ortega has been [named Venezuela's Governor to the IMF](#), a move intended to unlock roughly \$5 billion in previously frozen Special Drawing Rights (SDRs).
- Acting President Rodríguez has directed that any resources recovered from international unblocking be funneled into [completing pending housing units](#) via the Great Housing Mission Venezuela (GMVV).

Strait of Hormuz and Global Energy Crisis

- US President Donald Trump threatened that [Iran would be "borred from the face of the earth"](#) following missile strikes on US-escorted commercial vessels.
- The US "Project Liberty" has reportedly [sunk seven Iranian fast boats](#) while attempting to secure a maritime passage that handles 20% of global oil and gas.
- Venezuelan oil exports rose 14% in April, with [445,000 barrels per day](#) flowing directly to the United States.

Technology Policy and AI Scrutiny

- The UK government is conducting an [exhaustive analysis of "Mitos,"](#) a high-level reasoning model by Anthropic, due to concerns over its argument capacity influencing human behavior and potential for dual-use in cyberattacks.

- The US Pentagon signed agreements with seven AI leaders, including SpaceX and OpenAI, but [pointedly excluded Anthropic](#) following the company's objections to military use of its "Claude" model.
- Elon Musk's xAI faces allegations that [its Grok model was trained](#) using output from OpenAI's ChatGPT.

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

Economic Security and Stabilization

- The BCV reported that monthly [inflation fell to 10.6% in April](#) from a January peak of 32.6%, though year-on-year figures remain at 611.9%.
- The BCV plans to inject [1.35 billion dollars into the banking system](#) during May to stabilize the exchange rate, which is projected to settle around 611 Bolivars per USD.
- The private sector, represented by Fedecámaras, describes the [increase of the minimum income to \\$240](#) as a "first step" but demands a deeper review of the Organic Law of Labor to manage the burden of retroactive severance pay.

Rule of Law and "Re-institutionalization"

- The administration claims to have processed [over 8,000 amnesties](#) in three months, though opposition figures like Luis Florido maintain that hundreds of political and military prisoners remain in custody.
- Government rhetoric has shifted from "being rich is bad" to a pragmatism that [seeks market understanding](#), while maintaining political control through a "Peace and Coexistence" framework.

- Judicial authorities are **opening "maternal-infant" units** in women's prisons (INOF) as part of a campaign to humanize the penitentiary system.

Biosurveillance and Public Health

- The WHO is monitoring a **mortal Hantavirus outbreak** on an Atlantic cruise ship, with three confirmed deaths and suspected person-to-person transmission.
- The ship, the "Hundius," was **denied entry to Cape Verde**, highlighting the continuing fragility of international health protocols in the maritime sector.

LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

The National Assembly is currently operating at a high tempo, focusing on structural reforms to the judiciary and the formalization of new administrative procedures to align with the "Rodríguez Doctrine" of governance. The legislative agenda is characterized by rapid approvals with minimal prior exposure of bill texts to opposition benches.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **Partial Reform of the Organic Law of the TSJ:** Expands the bench from 20 to 32 magistrates. Approved in **first discussion by a qualified majority**.
- **Order of Merit "Aristóbulo Istúriz":** A new national decoration to honor the legacy of the late educator and politician.
- **Law of the Venezuelan Red Cross:** Approved to **re-establish the organization as an auxiliary organ** of the state under national jurisdiction.

- **Upcoming Legislation:** The Assembly signaled upcoming debates on the Law of the General Inspectorate of Tribunals and the Law of the School of Magistracy to **professionalize judicial staff**.

HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **Judicial Postulations Committee:** Giuseppe Alessandrello reported that **70 people have been interviewed** for upcoming judicial vacancies.
- **Motor Agroalimentario Meeting:** Acting President Rodríguez announced a **31.1% growth in internal consumption** for the first quarter.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The Transition from Ideology to Technocracy

The "Rodríguez Moment" represents a strategic cooling of the Bolivarian Revolution's rhetorical fires. Transcripts suggest a deliberate rebranding of the state as a "service provider" rather than a "vanguard of the proletariat." This is evidenced by the focus on **economic pragmatism and "detoxification"** from ideological polarization. The administration is positioning itself to be judged by its management of the exchange rate and inflation rather than its adherence to socialist dogma. However, this technocratic shift is essentially "Authoritarianism 2.0," where power is consolidated not through street violence, but through the **capture of judicial and regulatory institutions**.

Transactional Diplomacy with the Trump Administration

The relationship between Caracas and the second Trump administration has moved into a transactional phase. Trump's "Project Liberty" in the Middle East increases the [strategic value of Venezuelan heavy crude](#), prompting the US to favor "licenses" over "sanction lifting" to maintain leverage. The issuance of License 58 is a significant signal; it allows Western creditors to begin the long process of [bringing Venezuela back into the global financial fold](#). The appointment of career diplomats like John Barrett as the US Charge d'Affaires and Coromoto Godoy to the UN suggests a move toward formalizing this new status quo.

The "Social Listening" of Discontent

Internal government reports suggest a deep awareness of "conflict nodes" and social media hate speech. There is a documented trend of [exhaustion with the political class](#) on both sides. The administration is responding by using "soft" power—celebrating sports victories and hosting beauty expos—to cultivate a feeling of normalcy while using the ["Operation Tuntun" punitiveness](#) to deter radical remnants. The government's narrative now hinges on "Hope" rather than "Resistance."

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks): Expect the final selection of the 32 TSJ magistrates to be dominated by individuals vetted for their technical proficiency but loyal to the Rodríguez-Cabello axis. Domestic attention will remain on the [Expo Belleza 2026](#) and Mother's Day events as the government pushes "consumption" as proof of recovery. Potential for isolated protests over the [lack of a base salary increase](#) to accompany bonuses.

Medium Term (1-6 Months): Preparation for debt restructuring will accelerate. The government will likely move toward a ["dual-currency" formalization](#) (modeled after the Peruvian sol/dollar parity) as it seeks to stabilize the currency before the next electoral cycle. The resumption of flights will likely lead to a surge in remitted goods and "nostalgia tourism."

Long Term (1-5 Years): Venezuela is transitioning into a "China-style" model where the political center is absolute, but the economy is liberalized for strategic sectors (Oil, Gas, Mining). The [export of gas molecules](#) and the stabilization of oil production above 1.5 million bpd will determine if this model can survive without Maduro at the helm.

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy:

- The shift toward [professionalizing the diplomatic corps](#) (e.g., Godoy, Placencia) suggests that international actors should prioritize technical engagement over ideological condemnation.
- The US should monitor if the TSJ expansion leads to more [efficient commercial dispute resolution](#), a key demand of oil majors like Chevron and Eni.
- Regional stability depends on whether the [Law of Amnesty](#) is eventually applied to the military sector to prevent future coup attempts.

For Private Sector/Investors:

- License 58 opens a window for **holders of defaulted bonds** to engage in preparatory discussions; however, strict compliance on the exclusion of Russian or Chinese entities remains mandatory.
- Investors in the agro-industrial sector should note the **80% state coverage of technical training** and focus on regions like Cojedes and Monagas for "sustainable" ventures.
- Retailers should prepare for a **12% unit-sales bump** following the disbursement of "Bono de Guerra" and other state-integrated income payments.
