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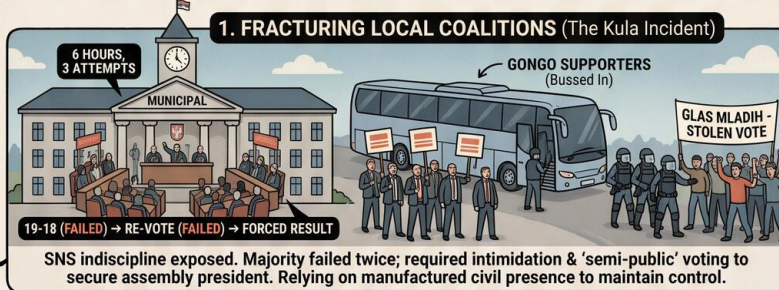

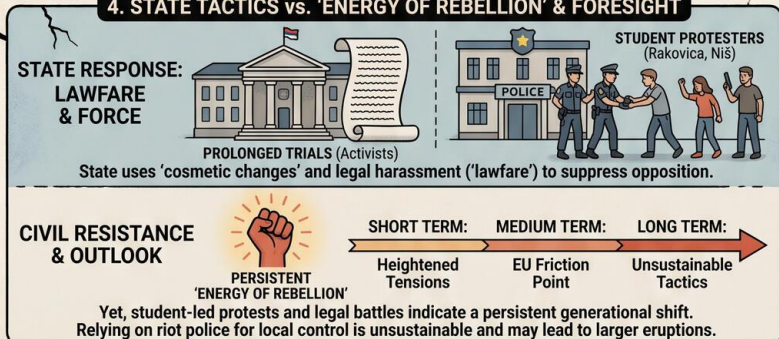

## DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

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The political landscape in Serbia on May 5, 2026, is characterized by a deepening crisis of institutional legitimacy and mounting social friction. At the local level, the ruling Serbian Progressive Party (SNS) faced an embarrassing display of internal indiscipline in Kula, where a simple majority vote for the assembly president required three attempts and six hours to resolve, signaling potential fractures within the party's local power bases. This administrative dysfunction was mirrored by large-scale mobilization of both police and "Gongo" (government-organized non-governmental organization) supporters to counter local protests, highlighting a reliance on manufactured civil presence to maintain control.

Simultaneously, the central government is navigating a precarious judicial reform process under heavy scrutiny from the Venice

Commission and the European Union. The controversial appointment of Uglješa Mrđić to the working group tasked with revising his own eponymous and criticized laws has drawn accusations of "teatar apsurd" (theater of the absurd) and bad-faith compliance with international standards. These developments, combined with explosive allegations that President Vučić promised immunity to Chinese nationals following the 2024 Novi Sad canopy tragedy, suggest a governance model increasingly prioritized toward elite protection and strategic partner insulation over the rule of law. Civil unrest remains a constant undercurrent, with student-led protests in Rakovica and legal battles in Novi Sad indicating that the "energy of rebellion" persists despite state efforts to litigate activists into submission.

## MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

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### The Kula Assembly Crisis and Party Fractures

- The constitution of the Kula Municipal Assembly descended into chaos as the SNS majority failed twice to elect its candidate, Velibor Milojević, despite holding a 19-18 seat advantage. It took a [third vote and six hours](#) to secure a result, amid allegations of a "rebellion" within SNS ranks.
- Opposition councilors from "Glas Mladih" (Voice of Youth) reported [violations of secret balloting](#), claiming SNS leadership forced members to show their ballots to verify loyalty after an initial defection.
- The town was flooded with [hundreds of police in riot gear](#) and supporters bussed in from other regions (Novi Sad, Sombor, and Belgrade) to surround the assembly building and intimidate local activists.

## Judicial Reform and the "Mrđić Laws" Controversy

- The Ministry of Justice faced sharp criticism for appointing SNS MP Uglješa Mrđić to the working group responsible for [revising the very laws](#) he authored, which have been condemned for undermining prosecutorial independence.
- Opposition MPs and legal experts argue the working group is stacked with [representatives of "Gongo" organizations](#) and loyalist prosecutors, excluding genuine civil society and independent professional associations.
- The EU has reportedly signaled that [funding could be withheld](#) if these judicial laws are not brought into line with Venice Commission recommendations by the end of May.

## Allegations of Diplomatic Immunity for Chinese Partners

- New claims surfaced via an inquiry committee suggesting President Vučić promised the Chinese Ambassador that [no Chinese citizens would be held liable](#) for the 2024 Novi Sad railway station canopy collapse that killed 15 people.
- Economic analysts warn that if true, this constitutes "trgovina uticajem" (trading in influence) and a [serious criminal offense](#) that places the executive branch above the national judiciary.

## Rising Student and Civil Activism

- In Rakovica, protesters gathered in front of the police station demanding action after three activists were [assaulted and one briefly kidnapped](#) while distributing stickers.

- A disciplinary proceeding was launched at the Niš Law Faculty against a student who won faculty elections, with his lawyers describing it as a [politically motivated process](#) intended to suppress student rebellion.

## KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

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### Rule of Law & Lawfare

- The government is accused of using "kozmetičke promene" (cosmetic changes) to satisfy international bodies while [legalizing previous malpractices](#), such as "phantom lists" and multiple support signatures for fringe parties.
- The trial of 12 Novi Sad activists for "rušenje ustavnog poretka" (overthrowing the constitutional order) was [postponed yet again](#), highlighting a pattern of prolonged legal harassment against the opposition.

### Economic Security & Statecraft

- Serbia officially began participation in the [SEPA \(Single Euro Payments Area\)](#) payment scheme, a move expected to save the economy 50-60 million euros annually by reducing transaction fees with the EU.
- The Ministry of Finance dismissed potential EU funding cuts as "sitno i nebitno" (minor and irrelevant), suggesting a [cavalier attitude toward economic sanctions](#) linked to democratic backsliding.

### Geopolitical Alignment

- Chinese car manufacturer BYD is reportedly [dominating the global EV market](#) despite US restrictions, a trend that reinforces the Serbian government's strategic pivot toward Chinese industrial partnerships.

- The ongoing integration of Chinese infrastructure projects remains a point of contention, specifically regarding [transparency and liability](#) in public-private partnerships.

## LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

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Legislative activity on May 5 focused on rapid-response adjustments to electoral and judicial frameworks under pressure from European institutions, while concurrently processing initiatives intended to consolidate executive power. The Assembly is preparing for a [critical session on May 18](#) to vote on a set of electoral laws and potentially a vote of no confidence in the government.

### BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **Electoral Law Amendments:** fail to address key issues like voter list audits and media access.
- **Judicial Law Revisions (Mrdić Laws):** Legislation intended to align the High Prosecutorial Council's powers with Venice Commission standards. Implementation is being handled by a [highly controversial working group](#).
- **SEPA Integration:** Regulatory changes enabling [one-day euro transactions](#) between Serbia and the EU.

### HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **Public Hearing in Kragujevac:** Part of a series of hearings on electoral laws. Opposition MPs protested the [extremely short notice](#) (under 24 hours) provided for participation.
- **Kula Municipal Constitutive Session:** A marathon six-hour session that exposed [cracks in the local SNS majority](#).

- **Rakovica Police Station Gathering:** Activists and MPs attempted to [confront police leadership](#) regarding the failure to arrest identified attackers of student protesters.

## DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

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### The Rise of "Gongo" Governance

A prominent theme across the day's reports is the state's sophisticated use of "Gongo" (Government-organized NGO) entities. In Kula, supporters were [bussed in from across the country](#) to provide a counter-narrative to local protesters, while the Ministry of Justice is using similar entities to [populate judicial working groups](#). This trend suggests a strategic move to hollow out civil society by replacing independent voices with state-loyalist facsimiles, thereby providing a veneer of "public consultation" for international consumption.

### Party Discipline and Local Fragility

The Kula incident is highly unusual for the SNS, which typically prides itself on iron-clad vertical discipline. The fact that an [unidentified SNS councilor voted against the party](#)—twice—points to brewing local dissatisfaction or internal power struggles that the central leadership had to suppress through intimidation and "semi-public" voting. This suggests that the party's hegemony may be more fragile at the municipal level than previously estimated.

### Strategic Insulation of Foreign Capital

The allegations regarding Chinese immunity highlight a "state within a state" dynamic where strategic foreign partners are granted [extra-judicial protections](#). This trend poses a significant risk to the "Rule of Law" as defined by the EU and indicates that the Serbian

executive is willing to trade judicial sovereignty for continued investment and political support from the East.

## STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

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- **Short Term (1-4 Weeks):** Expect heightened tensions surrounding the May 18 Assembly session. The SNS will likely use the "Gongo" model to [counter-protest any opposition mobilization](#) against the electoral law changes. The local "victory" in Kula will be messaged as a defeat of "quasi-students" to discourage similar rebellions in other municipalities.
- **Medium Term (1-6 Months):** Judicial reform will remain a friction point with the EU. If the "Mrđić Laws" revisions are deemed insufficient by the Venice Commission, Serbia may face the [first tangible freezes of EU accession funds](#). This could force a more aggressive pivot toward Chinese and Russian financial alternatives.
- **Long Term (1-5 Years):** The persistent student-led "energy of rebellion" noted in Niš and Rakovica suggests a [generational shift in political engagement](#). While the state is currently successful in using "lawfare" to delay and disrupt activism, the continued use of riot police and bussed-in supporters to manage small towns like Kula is unsustainable and may eventually lead to more significant social eruptions.

## RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

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### For International Policy:

- Diplomatic engagement should focus on the [authenticity of working groups](#); accepting "Gongo" representation as genuine civil society participation risks legitimizing the further erosion of Serbian democracy.
- The allegations of [Chinese immunity](#) should be a primary concern for the EU, as it sets a precedent for a dual-tier justice system within a candidate country.
- Monitor the use of [riot police in local governance](#) matters as a leading indicator of state fragility.

### For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Regulatory Compliance:** Investors should be aware of the [benefits of SEPA integration](#), which will significantly streamline cross-border payments and reduce costs for companies operating between Serbia and the EU.
- **Political Risk:** The Kula Assembly crisis indicates that [local political stability](#) is no longer guaranteed, even in SNS strongholds. Project timelines at the municipal level may be impacted by assembly dysfunction.
- **Liability Standards:** The controversy over the Novi Sad canopy suggests that [contractual liability and judicial accountability](#) are highly politicized, particularly in infrastructure projects involving state-to-state agreements.
