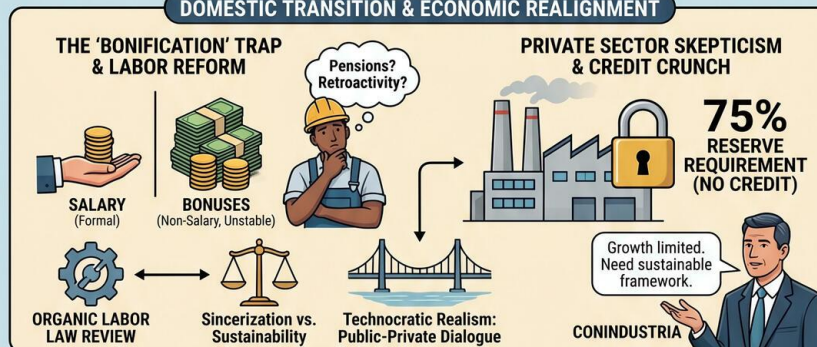

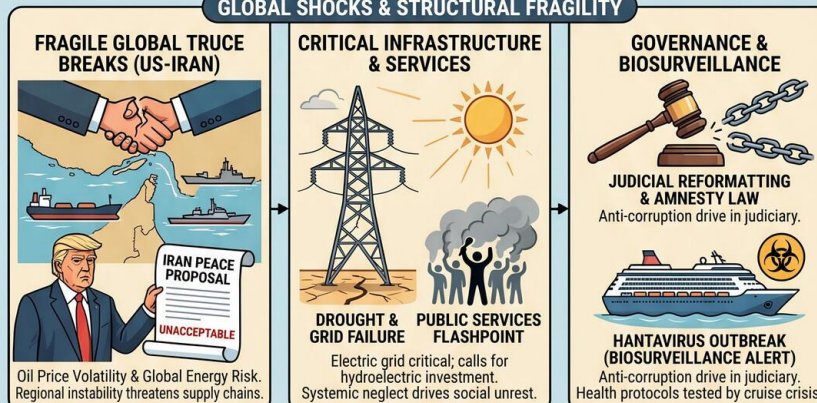

DAY-AT-A-GLANCE

May 11, 2026, marks a pivotal moment in Venezuelan statecraft as the executive branch, led by Acting President Delcy Rodríguez, mounts a high-stakes legal defense at the International Court of Justice (ICJ) in The Hague. Venezuela is seeking to invalidate the 1899 Arbitral Award regarding the Esequibo territory, arguing it was a colonial fraud. This diplomatic offensive is being used domestically to foster national unity, with various political sectors—including traditionally opposition-aligned parties—backing the government's stance on territorial integrity. However, this nationalist fervor coincides with a period of intense institutional self-critique, as Rodríguez calls for a "reformatting" of the judicial system and warns judges against corruption related to the recent Amnesty Law.

In the economic sphere, the administration is attempting to manage a delicate transition

from an informal "bonification" economy to a more formalized salary structure. While the minimum income has been adjusted to \$240 USD, the private sector remains skeptical of the sustainability of these measures given the continued impact of international sanctions and a restrictive monetary policy (75% reserve requirement). Simultaneously, the global landscape is darkening as US President Donald Trump rejected a peace proposal from Iran, labeling it "unacceptable" and raising the specter of renewed hostilities in the Strait of Hormuz. This geopolitical tension, combined with a public health alert involving a Hantavirus outbreak on a cruise ship in the Canary Islands, suggests a volatile immediate future for both regional energy security and global travel.

MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS

• Legal Offensive at The Hague

- Acting President Delcy Rodríguez led a legal delegation to the ICJ to defend Venezuela's rights over the Esequibo, insisting that the [1966 Geneva Agreement](#) is the only valid instrument for resolution.
- Venezuela accused Guyana and the United Kingdom of "inexcusable conduct," alleging they selectively shared or destroyed historical archives to [handicap the Venezuelan defense](#).
- The government argued that the 1899 Arbitral Award is "null and void" due to fraud and imperialist coercion, while Guyana maintains its [validity through the ICJ proceedings](#).

• **US-Iran Peace Negotiations Collapse**

- President Donald Trump officially rejected a peace proposal from Tehran, characterizing the [terms as "totally unacceptable"](#) and maintaining a fragile truce.
- Iran has warned of immediate responses to the deployment of French and British naval vessels near the Strait of Hormuz, which it views as [illegal militarization of a strategic zone](#).
- Regional instability has caused oil prices to rise, as the closure of the Strait of Hormuz [strangles 20% of the world's oil flow](#).

• **Domestic Economic and Labor Realignment**

- The government announced a minimum income adjustment to \$240, though industrial leaders clarify that this is [largely comprised of non-salary bonuses](#).
- Conindustria reported that while the private sector pays an average of \$270, the lack of credit due to the [75% bank reserve requirement](#) stifles industrial growth.
- A debate has emerged regarding the "retroactivity" of social benefits and the need to [reform the Organic Labor Law](#) to make it sustainable for employers while protecting workers from inflation.

• **Biosurveillance: Hantavirus Outbreak**

- A repatriation operation was launched in Tenerife for 94 passengers of the cruise ship *Hondius* following a [confirmed Hantavirus outbreak](#) that resulted in at least three deaths.
- Health experts clarified that the virus is not as transmissible as COVID-19, as it [has not mutated significantly](#) since 1993, but it requires strict isolation protocols.
- The World Health Organization (WHO) and regional Canary Island authorities are managing the crisis as the ship [prepares to return to the Netherlands](#).

KEY GOVERNANCE TOPICS

• **Legal Warfare (Lawfare) & Diplomacy**

- Venezuela is framing its ICJ appearance as a struggle against "imperialist greed" and colonial-era fraud, attempting to use international law to [reverse a century-old territorial loss](#).
- Internal judicial reforms are being coupled with this external legal battle, as the executive calls for a ["reformattig" of the TSJ](#) to eliminate corruption within the judiciary.

• **Economic Security & Resilience**

- The administration is touting a decrease in inflation and a [growth in the non-oil PIB](#), though the economy remains heavily dependent on volatile oil and gold prices.
- State-owned enterprises are being considered for "privatization" or [strategic alliances with the private sector](#) to reactivate idle industrial capacity (currently at 48%).

- **Critical Infrastructure & Energy Security**

- Governors from multiple states reported a [critical situation with the electric grid](#), which the government attributes to drought affecting hydroelectric capacity.
- There are renewed calls to develop hydroelectric projects in Guayana to [save up to 3 million barrels of oil daily](#) currently used in thermoelectric plants.

- **Domestic Stability & Social Order**

- The implementation of the [Amnesty Law](#) is a core component of the "Democratic Coexistence and Peace" program, aimed at reintegrating political actors into the formal system.
- Public services remain a flashpoint, with residents in Aragua protesting [open-air garbage burning](#) and systemic neglect of local sanitation.

- **International Relations & Global Risk**

- The collapse of US-Iran talks poses a direct threat to global energy supply chains, specifically regarding the [free navigation of the Strait of Hormuz](#).
- In Peru, the presidential election remains a "hand-to-hand" battle between [Keiko Fujimori and Roberto Sánchez](#), with significant implications for regional bloc politics.

LEGISLATIVE ROUNDUP

Legislative activity centered on the intersection of labor rights, judicial integrity, and territorial defense. The executive branch has prioritized a "reformatting" of the judiciary alongside the implementation of the Amnesty Law. Significant focus is also placed on the Organic Labor Law, which is being reviewed by a multi-sectoral commission to

address the imbalance between income and long-term social benefits.

BILLS DISCUSSED/DEBATED:

- **Organic Labor Law (Revision):** A multi-sectoral team is debating [modifications to the 534 articles](#) of the law to address the current "bonification" of wages and the high cost of retroactivity for employers.
- **Amnesty Law (Implementation):** Discussion of the law's application, with Acting President Rodríguez [denouncing judges who charge fees](#) to process amnesties.
- **Harmonization of Taxes:** Proposals to [harmonize fiscal and para-fiscal taxes](#) across regions to reduce the burden on formal businesses and incentivize the transition from the informal sector.

HEARINGS & PRESS EVENTS:

- **ICJ Oral Arguments (The Hague):** Acting President Delcy Rodríguez presented [final legal observations](#) regarding the Esequibo controversy, challenging the ICJ's jurisdiction and the validity of the 1899 Award.
- **Venezuela Tech Week / Entrepreneurs Congress:** Gerson Gómez, president of Ridery, opened the [second international congress of entrepreneurs](#) in La Carlota, signaling a new era of public-private cooperation.
- **Conindustria Press Briefing:** Tito López provided data on industrial capacity, noting that [52% of industrial capacity is active](#), but growth is limited by the absence of credit.

DEEP DIVE: TRENDS AND THEMES

The "Bonification" Trap

A significant trend is the institutionalization of the "bonification" of income. While the minimum monthly income has reached \$240, only a fraction of this is considered "salary" for the calculation of social benefits and liquidations. This creates a [dual burden](#): workers lack long-term financial security (pensions and severance), while employers fear a sudden "sincerization" of wages that would trigger massive, unaffordable back-pay liabilities. The government's claim that this is "transitory" until the economy stabilizes is met with skepticism by labor analysts who note that [38 million active workers](#) would theoretically be needed to sustain the current pension system at living-wage levels.

Sovereignty as Political Capital

The Esequibo dispute has become the primary vehicle for political convergence. By taking the fight to The Hague, the administration is [absorbing opposition narratives](#) (such as those from Acción Democrática) regarding territorial defense. This nationalist alignment serves to marginalize more radical opposition factions while providing the "Presidenta encargada" with a statesman-like platform on the global stage. However, the legal strategy is risky; a definitive loss at the ICJ would severely damage the [internal mandate given by the December 2023 referendum](#).

The Return of the Private Sector

There is a clear shift toward "Technocratic Realism." The government is actively inviting private investment to manage [idle state assets](#) and is engaging in "tripartite" dialogues (State, Private Sector, Unions) that were

previously non-existent. The narrative has moved from "resistance" to "construction," with industrial leaders like Tito López acknowledging that [public and private success are now linked](#). This is a pragmatic survival strategy to bypass the limitations of international sanctions by leveraging internal private capital and "licenses" from the US Treasury.

STRATEGIC FORESIGHT

Short Term (1-4 Weeks): Expect heightened nationalist rhetoric following the ICJ hearings. The domestic market will likely see a slight increase in liquidity as the new [minimum income adjustments](#) take effect in the first half of May, which may place pressure on the exchange rate despite Central Bank interventions. The Hantavirus situation will likely stabilize as repatriation is completed, but it will serve as a [precedent for future cruise-based outbreaks](#).

Medium Term (1-6 Months): The US-Iran tension will remain the primary external risk to the Venezuelan economy. If Trump [resumes full-scale hostilities](#), global oil prices will likely spike, providing a windfall for Venezuela but also increasing the cost of imported refined goods and shipping. Domestically, the reform of the Organic Labor Law will reach a critical point, likely resulting in a [compromise that preserves bonification](#) while offering incremental increases in the base salary.

Long Term (1-5 Years): If Venezuela succeeds in its "reformatting" of the judiciary and establishes a stable legal framework for foreign investment (as requested by [major oil companies like ExxonMobil](#)), a significant economic rebound is possible. However, the structural decay of the [electric and water grids](#) remains the ultimate bottleneck.

Without massive infrastructure investment, any industrial recovery will be capped by regional energy deficits.

RECOMMENDATIONS & IMPLICATIONS

For International Policy:

- The ICJ proceedings highlight the critical need for a centralized, transparent database of historical archives; the accusation of ["asymmetric access" to documents](#) could undermine the perceived fairness of international arbitration in post-colonial disputes.
- The collapse of the US-Iran proposal suggests that middle-market mediators (Pakistan, China) are [becoming essential conduits](#) as direct diplomacy fails.
- Regional health organizations must standardize [quarantine protocols for cruise ships](#) to prevent a repeat of the *Hondius* uncertainty, specifically regarding non-airborne viral threats.

For Private Sector/Investors:

- **Opportunity:** The potential [privatization or management contracts](#) for state-owned food and primary sector industries offer a high-reward, high-risk entry point for distressed asset investors.
- **Risk:** Labor liabilities remain a "ticking time bomb." Investors should conduct deep audits of [uncalculated social benefit debts](#) before entering into joint ventures.
- **Regulation:** The [Organic Law of Harmonization of Tributary Powers](#) must be closely watched; it could significantly lower the cost of doing business in provinces if successfully implemented.
