Inclusive Cinema: Dicapta's Continued

Commitment to Superfest 2024

This year marks the third consecutive year we provide audio descriptions for selected films at Superfest. **Dicapta proudly collaborates with a festival that focuses on stories of people with disabilities and prioritizes access for filmgoers with disabilities.**

Superfest, produced by the [Paul K. Longmore Institute on Disability at San Francisco State](#) and the [San Francisco Disability Cultural Center \(DCC\)](#), is the longest-running disability film festival in the world. For 37 years, it has celebrated cutting-edge cinema that portrays disability through a diverse, complex, unabashed, and engaging lens.

One of the eight films we provided audio descriptions for is **Friendly Signs**. It is the story of Tommy Wickerd, an incarcerated man who grew up using sign language with a deaf older brother and started an American Sign Language (ASL) class in San Quentin. It highlights the importance of making any space welcoming for deaf people. Thanks to Tommy's initiative, [San Quentin held the first-ever ASL graduation](#) this year. He is positively changing lives, not only through sign language advocacy but also by supporting other incarcerated people in developing healthy running habits.

Don't miss Friendly Signs and the other interesting films that will be presented at Superfest 2024. It will take place from **October 17 to 20 and will offer both virtual and in-person screenings**, ensuring accessibility for all. Through AI

Explore our innovative **INTEGRA project**, funded by the Department of Health to improve cultural competencies within IEP teams for Latino English Learners with Disabilities. Led by Dr. Maria Victoria Diaz and Dr. Conchita Hernandez, this initiative uses AI-driven video modeling to tailor educational content for caregivers, teachers, and classmates. Our Mentor's Corner: Ricardo López

Ricardo Lopez is the coordinator for Learning Media resources at Gallaudet University and has been a member of our advisory board for over ten years. He is proficient in three languages: English, Spanish, and ASL. "I am deaf; I was born deaf," is the first thing he told us during his interview. Ricardo was born in Puerto Rico to a hearing family that did not know anything about deafness. "Back in the old days, my family didn't know how to communicate with me or had any deaf family members. So, when I was about four years old, that's when they found out. Obviously, I hadn't developed any sort of language."

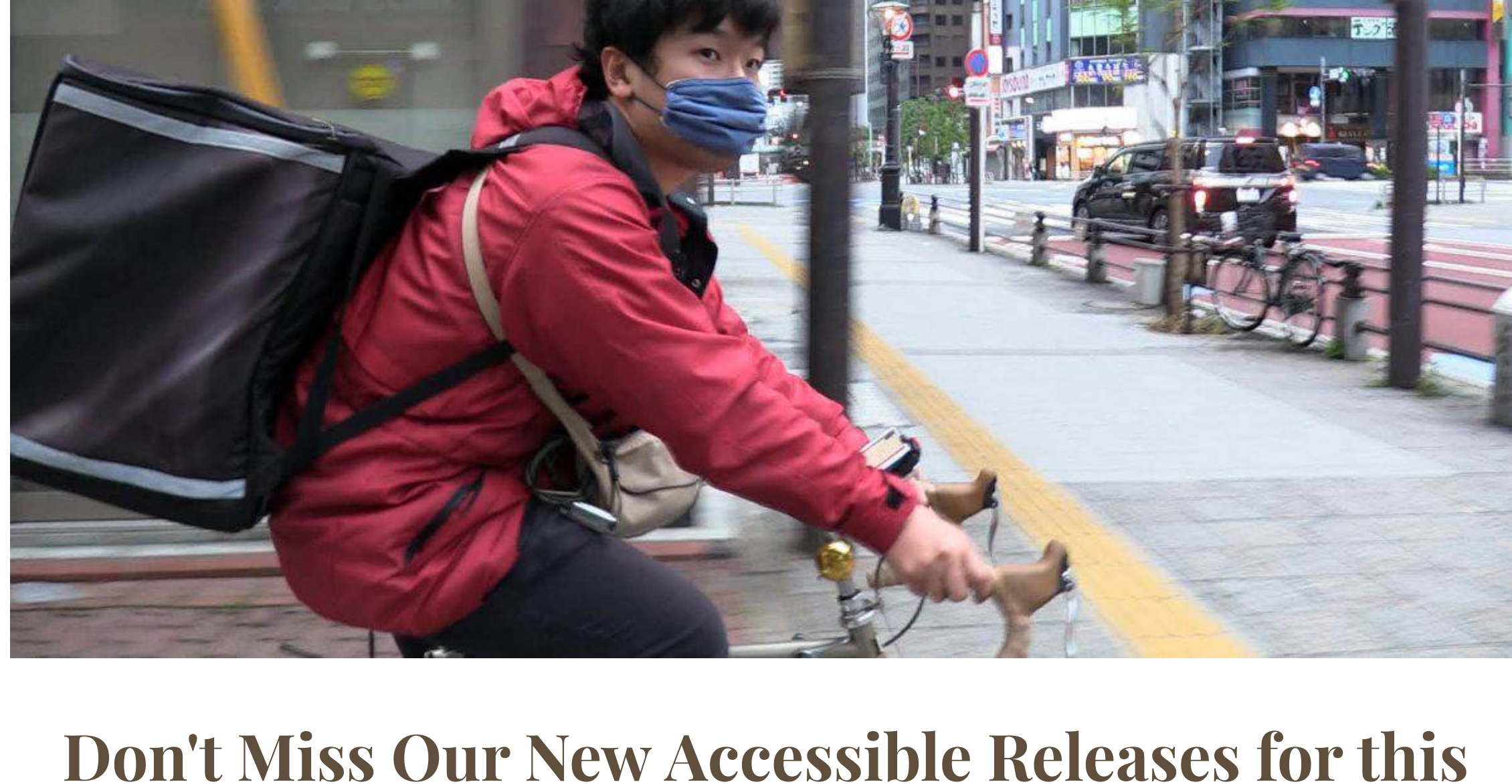

POV presents **In the Rearview**, a volunteer aid van transports diverse civilians fleeing war in Ukraine, sharing their stories while seeking refuge in Poland. Alongside this, **Twice Colonized** follows Inuit lawyer Aaju Peter as she fights for Indigenous rights and justice for her lands while navigating her own healing after the loss of her son. Lastly, **Tokyo Uber Blues** captures filmmaker Taku Aoyagi's experiences as an Uber Eats worker in Tokyo, reflecting on gig work and its impact on young people facing unemployment.

For our youngest viewers, **Plaza Sésamo** offers new episodes with ASL every week on its YouTube channel, engaging children with educational and fun, accessible content. Additionally, Semillitas TV features **Ziggy and the Zootram**, where Ziggy and friends embark on magical adventures at the zoo. Fred Rogers Productions presents **Odd Squad**, where kids use math to solve strange challenges, proving that teamwork can tackle any odd occurrence!

Don't miss the **Superfest Disability Film Festival**, Dicapta collaborates with Superfest to highlight stories of individuals with disabilities, prioritizing accessibility.
