Reading Questions: Prompt Sheet

Where is this story set?

• This story is mostly set in and around a forest where lots of animals live. There is also a stream. Morris travels out from the forest to visit a recycling centre.

Is there a dilemma in this story? What is it?

• The dilemma is how to save the forest and all the wildlife that lives in the forest.

How is the dilemma resolved?

• Morris realises that he should stop spreading litter in the forest. The dilemma is resolved by the animals working together to collect the litter and take it to the recycling centre. New seeds are then planted so that more plants grow.

Can you think of a different way that the dilemma could have been resolved?

• Example answer: Human beings could have come to clear up the mess but this would not have been as good. The animals could also have gone to live somewhere else but it would not have been very good to leave a mess behind.

How does the story end?

• The story ends with the forest looking natural and beautiful. Morris realises that it is better to have a green home rather than to have lots of shiny things in his nest.

What is the message of the story?

• Example answer: The message of the story is that everyone should look after the place where they live or they will end up in trouble. Also, it is

• Example answer: I really like the way the story is told in rhyme because it holds the story together and I like the rhythm when I read it aloud.

• Example answer: When the forest is in danger, there are lots of words and phrases that help me to understand what the forest was like, e.g. 'flowers were wilting', and 'His animal friends watched in fear and distress.' It is a good description when the stream is described as having a 'muddy-like' hue as it helps me imagine it.
