## How to Repair a Bicycle Puncture

11 You will need: a pump, a bucket of water, tweezers, a 19 patch kit and an adult to help you.

1. Take the wheel off the bike and take the inner tube out of the tyre (ask an adult to help you with this).
2. Blow the tube up using the pump.
3. Squeeze the tube gently, listening for a hissing sound. This will tell you where the puncture is.
4. If you can't hear the hiss, put the tube in a bucket of water and squeeze gently. Look for the bubbles.
5. When you have found the puncture, use the tweezers to remove whatever made it.
6. Apply a small amount of glue and a patch over the hole.
