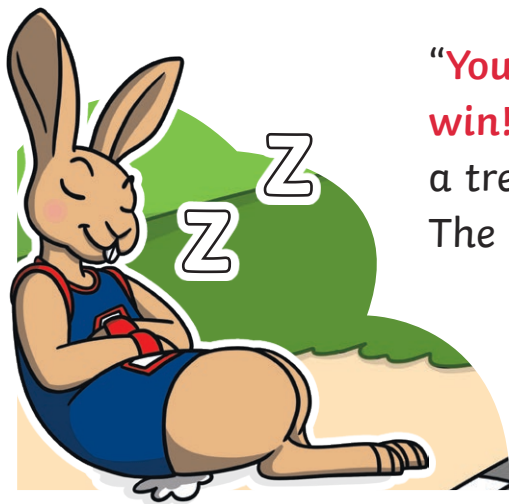


The Tortoise and the Hare

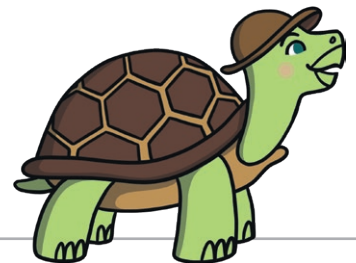


There once was a hare who told everyone how fast he could run. The tortoise thought he was a show-off. He asked the hare for a race. The hare thought it would be easy.

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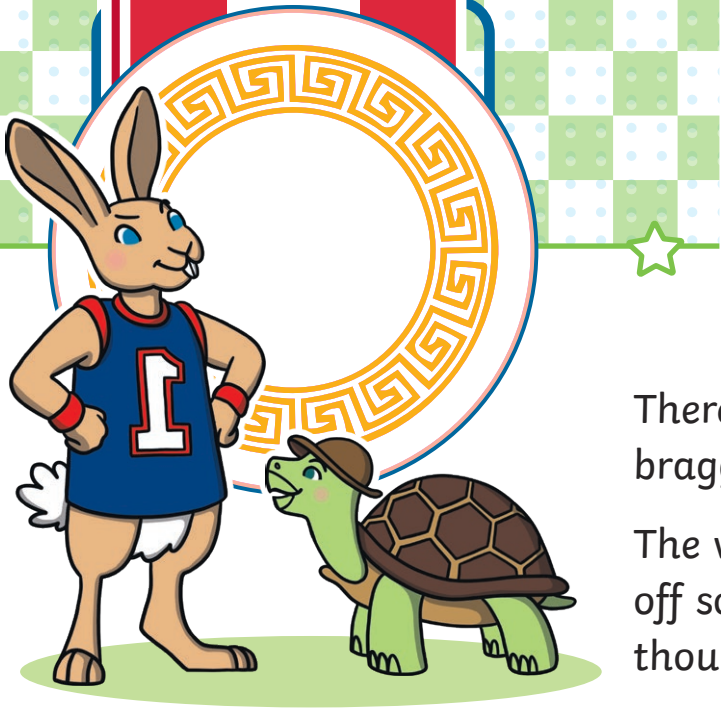

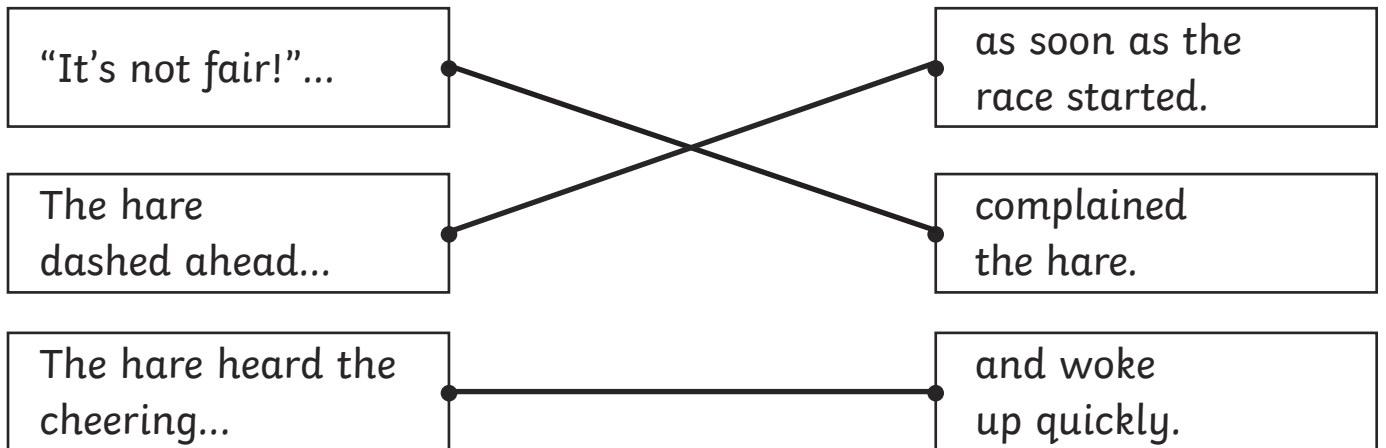

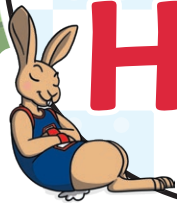

The Tortoise and the Hare

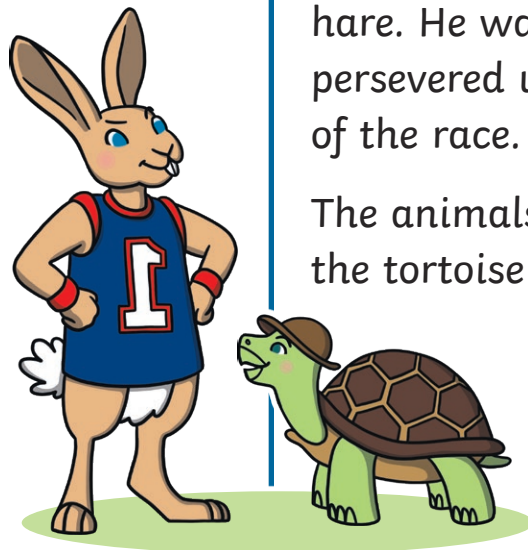

The animals cheered as they saw the tortoise reach the finish line.

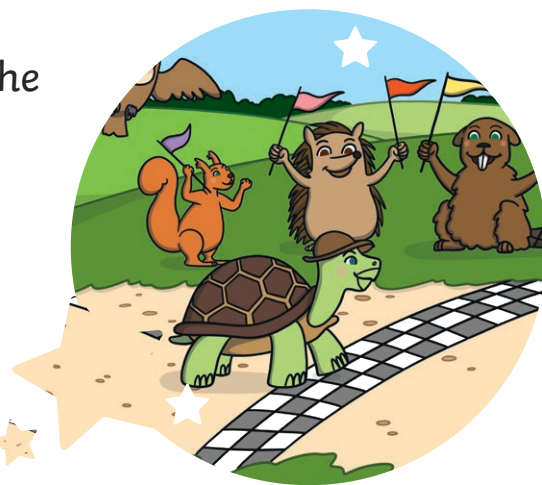
“Tortoise, you are the winner!” they shouted. The hare heard the cheering and woke with a start.
