
'i' Patterns

The long 'i' sound is spelt '-y' at the end of words.





The 'ee' sound is sometimes spelt 'ey' at the end of a word. To make these words plural, you just add an s.




'sh' Pattern






The Suffix '-es'

When '-es' is added to a word ending in 'y', change the 'y' to an 'i' before adding '-es'.






The Suffix '-ed'
Adding ' -ed' to the end of the word often puts it into the past tense.
play play ed help help ed
When '- ed ' is added to a root word ending in ' y ' (with a consonant before it), change the ' y ' to an ' i ' before adding '- ed '.
cry cried try tried
When adding ' -ed ' to a root word ending in ' e ' (with a consonant before it), drop the ' e ' then add ' -ed '.
like liked bake baked
When adding ' -ed ' to words with one syllable, the last consonant letter of the root word is doubled .
pat patted drop dropped




The Suffix '-ness'
The suffix '- ness ' can be added to a root word to change an adjective into a noun.
sad sadness plain plainness
If the root word ends in a ' y ', change the ' y ' into an ' i ' then add the suffix ' -ness '.
happy happiness silly silliness
The Suffix '-ful'
The suffix ' -ful ' can be added to a root word to change a verb into an adjective.
play play ful care careful
If the root word ends in a 'y', change the 'y' into an 'i',
then add the suffix ' -ful '.





