


Am I using a clear voice?

"This is lovely," purred the cat.




Did you read this in a happy (maybe purry) voice?

Hi ho, hi ho, it's off to work we go.




Am I using different voices for different characters?

#### Copy cat!


Copy a friend or someone in your family, mimic the way they talk with expression.

Try some of our fun reading activities to help practise reading in different voices...






# Game on!

Talk like an animal!


Read (and act) like you imagine your favourite animal would.

Read in a Somerset accent.






Star jumps!
