Colour Poems

What is a colour poem?

A colour poem allows a writer to present different images about a particular colour. These poems use similes to describe colours using your different senses; sight, sound, taste, touch, and smell.

What is the structure of a colour poem?

Each line of a colour poem focuses on a different sense. Each line contains an image that describes the colour. The lines in the poem do not have to rhyme or have a rhythm pattern. Here is an example of the structure of a colour poem:

Title

Line 1: sight

Line 2: sound

Line 3: smell

Line 4: touch

Line 5: taste

Line 6: an emotion

An example of a colour poem:

Pink

Pink looks like a huge pile of soft marshmallows,

Pink sounds like wind chimes in the wind,

Pink smells like a freshly washed baby,

Pink feels like a soft feather running up and down your skin,

Pink tastes like light, fluffy fairy floss you get at a circus,
