Online Searchers and Surfers: The Weakest Links

National Curriculum

Use search technologies effectively, appreciate how results are selected and ranked, and be discerning in evaluating digital content.

Understand computer networks including the Internet; how they can provide multiple services, such as the World Wide Web; and the opportunities they offer for communication and collaboration.

Lesson Duration

It is estimated that this lesson will take approximately 60 minutes.



Aim

To know how to use and compare different website links to find reliable information online.

Success Criteria

I can select a safe search engine to find information.

I can identify how to trust if a website is safe.

I can compare two websites for reliable information.

I can bookmark a web page.

I can use tabs on a web browser to compare information on web pages.

Prior Learning: In the previous lesson, children will have learnt the difference between a web browser and search engine. They will have had the opportunity to carry out safe searches using a variety of search engines and know how to type in a website address in the URL address bar.

Learning Sequence



Remember It: Using the Lesson Presentation, ask the children to use their Knowledge Organisers to identify what they already know by highlighting this in one colour and then highlighting what they are not sure of, in a different colour.



Search Engines: Using the **Lesson Presentation**, ask the children which search engines they can remember from the last lesson. Have they used any different ones since?





Safe Returns: Using the Lesson Presentation, look at these slides to identify what the children should be looking for when making safe searches. Discuss how it may be useful to look past adverts and sponsored links to find more accurate information. Discuss how it is important to look at the URL, in particular the HTTPS and domain extensions to assess whether the web address is trustworthy.





Padlocks: Using the Lesson Presentation, show the children the illustrations of a secure and unsecure website. Ask the children to explore finding websites that display the padlock in the URL address bar.





Bookmarking: Using the Lesson Presentation, explain that we can use bookmarks to log websites we would like to return to in the future. Demonstrate bookmarking by opening a website and clicking on the star in the URL address





Can the children remember how to identify if the web page you are bookmarking is safe?

	Using Tabs: Using the Lesson Presentation, explain that we use tabs to keep web pages open for us to easily access. Demonstrate by opening tabs on your web browser and moving between these tabs.				
	Reliable Links Activity Sheet: Using the Lesson Presentation, explain to the children that they will now be using different websites to find the same answer to a question.				
	The children will be given questions they must find the answers to. They will record the two websites they have used to find the correct answer, ensuring they are safe websites to use. The children will be given questions they must find the answers to. They must use two websites to cross-reference their results. The children will be given questions they must find the answers to, using three websites to cross-reference their own questions and test a partner or complete this individually.				
	Find it: Using the Lesson Presentation, show the children how to find specific words on a web page to locate the precise information they are after. The children can then work as a class to find facts based on Zebras. There are three searches they need to make using the National Geographic Kids - Zebra Facts link:

Safe Returns

When searching for something online, it is important to know what to look for when your results are returned.

When carrying out research, it is important to look for facts, rather than opinions.

Using information from Wikipedia may not be encouraged for academic purposes as this is a website that can be edited by anyone.



Safe Returns: Adverts and Sponsored Links

When looking at results returned back to you, try to scroll down and check many results instead of clicking the first one that appears. Sometimes clicking the links that say 'Ad' next to them may not be what you are after.

As websites normally gain money from clicks they receive, it is important for many to try and push their web page as close to the top of the search returns as possible. Scammers (criminals who try to trick you online) often try to move their web page to the top of the search returns to try and trick people into clicking on their websites.

Safe Returns: Safe Links

It is always useful to look at the web addresses in your search returns.

Look at the part — at the start of the URL address. If it has an 's' after http, this usually means that it is secure. This is one useful tip when thinking about whether a link is safe to click on.

At the end of a link is something called a domain extension. There are top-level domains (TLD) which you will be familiar with such as: .com, .co.uk, .org, and .gov. Top-level domains such as .org and .gov can often be trusted as they are from recognised source.



Padlocks

It is important to familiarise yourself with the address bar before you click on a link to a website. If there is a padlock, this means the website is secure and can be trusted. This is especially true when using a web page to enter personal information such as bank details when trying to buy something.

Bookmarking

Sometimes you may find a website that you really like and would wish to visit again. Rather than having to type in the web page URL or having to search for the web page each time you access the Internet, you can save this page by clicking on the star in the address bar. This **bookmarks** the page.



Using Tabs

When using a web browser, you may wish to access more than one website at the same time. Rather than having to open and close a web page each time you use it, you can open new tabs with a different web page on each. You can then switch between the tabs.




It's now your turn to open two different tabs on your computing device. Access a different web page on each tab.



Reliable Links Activity Sheet

It is important to always make sure you use more than one source to trust its validity (how factually correct it is).




Always remember: Stop and think! Don't choose the weakest link.



Find It!

When on a web page, you can use the find tool to find specific words on a page. This can save you from reading the whole document if you are only looking for a specific piece of information. You can also use the keys **Ctrl + F** on the keyboard to find specific information on a page.


