'Tricky' words are those that are not completely decodable using known grapheme-phoneme correspondences. However, they will usually contain one or more GPCs that are known by the time the word is introduced. Try to begin by looking at phonemes within the word that are represented with regular graphemes, then introduce the 'tricky' part of the word.

Frequent repetition and reinforcement will encourage familiarity and enhance the learning of non-decodable words. For further details about how and when this is taught in the Twinkl Phonics scheme, refer to the daily lesson presentations and weekly lesson plans.

Regional pronunciations of words may affect whether they are considered to be tricky words or not, for example, past, last, fast, path and bath are not exceptions in accents where the 'a' is pronounced as in cat. Teachers should use their judgement about whether other words might be substituted in this case.

From Level 3 onwards, there are tricky words for reading and tricky words for spelling. The tricky words for spelling are words that have been taught in the previous level as tricky words for reading.
