Past Perfect Tense

The past perfect tense is used to talk about...

things that were completed at some point in the past.

You might use the past perfect tense if you are talking to your friend about something that has happened at a specific time in the past.



Past Perfect Tense

How to Use the Past Perfect Tense

To use the past perfect tense, use the word 'had' and the **past participle** of the verb, e.g.

Mrs Wrigley had collected in our files.

I had forgotten to do my homework.

She had noticed that my book was missing.

All of these things happened in the past and do not continue to happen now.

Perfect Tenses

Present Perfect Tense

The present perfect tense is used to talk about things that **happened in the past** or **things that began in the past and are still happening now**.

> You might use the present perfect tense if you are talking to your friend about something that happened or began at an unspecified time in the past.

Present Perfect Tense

How to Use the Past Perfect Tense

To use the past perfect tense, use the word '**has**' or '**have**' and the **past participle** of the verb, e.g.

Mrs Wrigley has collected in our files.

I have forgotten to do my homework.

She **has noticed** that my book was missing.

All of these things either happened in the past and do not continue to happen now or started happening in the past and are still continuing now.

Perfect Tenses

Click on each of the following tenses to find out more about when it can be used.



Future Perfect Tense

The future perfect tense is used to talk about things that **will be completed before a set point in the future**.



You might use the future perfect tense if you are talking to your friend about a problem in the future that will be caused by two events happening in the wrong order.

Future Perfect Tense

How to Use the Future Perfect Tense

To use the future perfect tense, use the word 'has' or 'have' and the past participle of the verb, e.g.

Mrs Wrigley will have collected in our files before I get to school.

She **will have noticed** that my book was missing before I'm able to sneak it into the pile.

All of these things will happen in the future and rely on events being completed in a particular order.

Simple Past Tense

Past Perfect Tense

The simple past tense is also used to talk about things that have already happened or existed.



However, you may want to use the past perfect tense instead if you want to go on to talk about what happened as a result of that event.

Think about the difference between these two sentences:

VS

Simple Past Tense:

She **noticed** that I had not eaten breakfast.

Past Perfect Tense:

She **had noticed** that I had not eaten breakfast.

Simple Present Tense

VS

Present Perfect Tense

The simple past tense is also used to talk about things that are currently happening.



As with the past perfect tense, you may want to use the present perfect tense if you want to go on to talk about consequences.

Think about the difference between these two sentences:

Simple Past Tense: He **warned** me about the

dangerous chemical.

Past Perfect Tense:

He **had warned** me about the dangerous chemical.

The past perfect tense is used to talk about things that were **completed at some point in the past**.

To use the past perfect tense, use the word '**had**' and the **past participle** of the verb,

I had watched 12 films last week.

Jen **had read** 10 books in April.

The present perfect tense is used to talk about things that **happened in the past** or **things that began in the past and are still happening now**.

To use the present perfect tense, use the word '**has**' or '**have**' and the **past participle** of the verb,



I have watched 12 films this week.

Jen **has read** 10 books this month.



Future Perfect Tense

The future perfect tense is used to talk about things that **will be completed before a set point in the future**.

To use the future perfect tense, use the words '**will have**' and the **past participle** of the verb,

e.g.

I will have watched 12 films by the time that the summer holidays are over.

 Jen will have read 10 books before the end of April.
