

Whole Class	The Big Challenge: Introduce the independent task to the children. Discuss how the children are already prepared to do this.	
Whole Class	<b>The Big Plan:</b> Ask the children to plan their dilemma using the planning structure shown on the Lesson Presentation. They can then use the first page of the Challenge to the Crown Activity Sheet to do this. Can the children plan their own dilemma for a myth?	
(**)	The Big Challenge: Ask the children to write their dilemmas using everything they know about myths and story dilemmas. Can the children write a dilemma for a myth independently?	
7	<b>The Big Check:</b> Ask children to check through their writing using the prompts on the Lesson Presentation to help them. ## The Big Challenge
