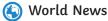

The video claimed that putting lots and lots of sweet potato peelings in your socks can make you a better driver.

Although clearly a joke, supermarkets have reported a huge increase in sweet potatoes sales. The filmmakers are now worried that their video has now actually become fake news ... and that some people now have very smelly socks!

#### **Pull Over Rover**

In March 2020, a 51-year-old man from Washington state, USA, led police on a high-speed chase. It was because he was



teaching his dog to drive. The car hit two other vehicles and got up to speeds of 109mph all while the man's favourite pooch sat on his lap.

When the vehicle was eventually stopped, the driver told state troopers he had been trying to teach his pit bull to drive.

"When we took him into custody... he admitted to our troopers that he was trying to teach his dog to drive," State Trooper Heather Axtman told US media.

The man went to jail, the dog... to an animal shelter.

### How Can We Spot Fake News?

- Think about where the news comes from. Is it from a news source you can trust? What could their biases be?
- Has the story been covered by other trusted news sources?
- Is the story from social media? Sometimes, images and stories can get shared on social media even if they're not true!
- Check the 'facts' in the story using trusted sources.
- Check the date! Old news stories might not be relevant any more.
- If it sounds too shocking to be true, it probably is.
- Is it a joke? Some websites create fake news, or satire to be funny.
- Does the story use quotes? Are the quotes from trusted figures?
- How does the story make you feel? Some fake news stories are designed to make you angry so you are more likely to share them.

### What is Fake News?

- Fake News is exactly what it says news that is fake, not true or made up. It works by shocking people into reading it, just like gossip.
- Fake news is designed to get people's attention; they want as many readers as possible. This is so they can make money through advertising, make a person, argument or cause look better or simply trick people.
