- 3. Using information from the article, fill in the missing words to complete the sentence. The 'Babakina anadoni' was **found/spotted/seen** by Allen Murray who is a **volunteer** for the Cornwall Wildlife Trust.
- 4. Find **one** piece of evidence from the article which gives you the impression that sea slugs are not easy to find.
 - Accept any of the following: the article calls them rare/uncommon; there are only a few recorded sightings; they are only 2cm long.
