Introductory Activity: Parts of a Sentence Read through the information about subjects, verbs and objects in active sentences on the slide. Children then work in pairs to highlight the subject, verb and object in the first four sentences on their Parts of a Sentence Activity Sheet. Go through these together on the Lesson Presentation ensuring children understand. Then read the information about passive sentences before asking children to highlight the subject, past participle and preposition phrase in the remaining sentences on their sheet. Again, discuss these together to check children understand. Can children correctly identify the different parts of the sentence?
Independent Focused Activity: Active to Passive Children complete the differentiated Active to Passive Activity Sheets. Check that children can change the relevant parts of the sentence to change sentences from active to passive.
Review Activity Re-cap how to recognise a passive sentence. Children then play the Spot the Passive Game in pairs. Look for children who can quickly identify the passive sentences.
