captive + ate =	captivate	(remove the 'e' before adding -ate)		
medical + ate =	medicate	(remove the -al before adding -ate)		
motive + ate =	motivate	(remove the 'e' before adding -ate)		
elastic + ate =	elasticate	(just add -ate)		
alien + ate =	alienate	(just add -ate)		
<pre>pollen + ate = pollinate (change the 'e' to an 'i' before adding -ate)* * 'pollinate' is an exception to the usual rule. Click the word and suffix to reveal the answer.</pre>

final + ise =	finalise	(just add –ise)
equal + ise =	equalise	(just add -ise)
fertile + ise =	fertilise	(remove the 'e' before adding -ise)
vandal + ise =	vandalise	(just add -ise)
terror + ise =	terrorise	(just add -ise)

horror + ify =	horrify	(remove 'or' before adding -ify)
note + ify =	notify	(remove the 'e' before adding -ify)
pure + ify =	purify	(remove the 'e' before adding –ify)
test + ify =	testify	(just add -ify)
intense + ify =	intensify	(remove the 'e' before adding -ify)

Spelling Rules (-en)

When we add suffixes, spelling rules usually apply. Can you remember what you need to do for each of the following examples?



flat + en =	flatten	(double the final 't' (because the word 'flat' has only one syllable) before adding -en)	
bright + en =	brighten	(just add -en)	
length + en =	lengthen	(just add -en)	
short + en =	shorten	(just add -en)	
thick + en =	thicken	(just add -en)	
mistake + en =	mistaken	(remove the 'e' before adding -en)

Harry was lucky that he did not need to be **hospitalased** but he was bruised and in pain for a few days. He **realified** that, in the future, he should always put his safety first.
