Intonation Practice



Intonation is the rise and fall of the voice when we are speaking. When we are reading aloud a sentence that has been written down, we use the rise and fall of our voices to stress certain words so that the intended meaning of the sentence is clear.

Read the following sentences aloud and stress the word that is in bold. Notice how the meaning of the sentence changes because you are changing your intonation.

She isn't flying to	She isn't flying to	She isn't flying to
Spain tomorrow.	Spain tomorrow.	Spain tomorrow .
By stressing the word 'she', this sentence implies that someone else is flying to Spain tomorrow.	By stressing the word 'flying', this sentence implies that she is travelling to Spain using another mode of transport.	By stressing the word 'tomorrow', this sentence implies that she is flying to Spain at another point in time.
