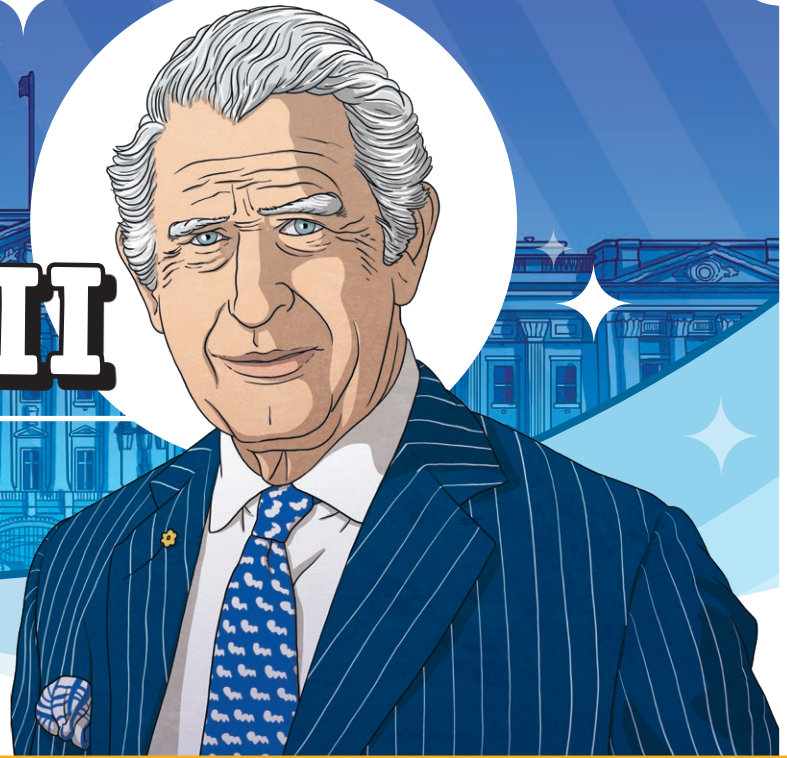


King Charles III



King Charles III ascended to the throne automatically, silently and instantly on Thursday 8th September 2022 at the death of his mother Queen Elizabeth II. His Majesty will serve with his wife Camilla, the Queen Consort, by his side.

Queen Consort

This is a title given to the wife of a reigning King.

Early Life

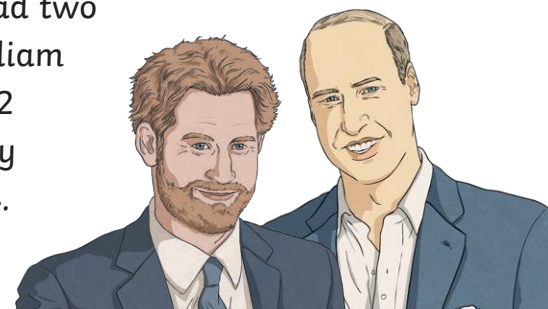
Born on November 14th 1948, at Buckingham Palace, London, King Charles III is the eldest child of Queen Elizabeth II and her husband Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh. His early years of schooling were provided by private tutors, before he attended various schools and eventually joined the distinguished Gordonstoun boarding school in Scotland.

Prince Charles later attended Cambridge University and became the first heir to the British crown to be awarded a degree in 1970.

At his mother's request, the young prince also spent a term at the University College of Wales, Aberystwyth, to facilitate his learning of the Welsh language in preparation for his investiture as Prince of Wales. Later, the then Prince Charles attended the Royal Air Force College - where he reportedly became an excellent pilot - and thereafter the Royal Naval College, Dartmouth.

Heirs and Family Life

On 29th July 1981, the then Prince of Wales married Lady Diana Spencer in St Paul's Cathedral. Lady Diana became Her Royal Highness The Princess of Wales and there was widespread excitement about the newlyweds. Together they had two sons: Prince William was born in 1982 and Prince Harry followed in 1984.



The Prince and Princess of Wales were a hugely popular couple, they undertook numerous overseas tours and official engagements together where they were often met with large, applauding crowds. There were high hopes for them to enjoy a long and happy marriage, however, their plan to separate was announced in 1992.

Later Life

In recent years, The King received much counsel and support from his lifelong friend, Camilla Parker Bowles. Buckingham Palace announced that the couple would marry and the ceremony took place on 9th April 2005 at the Guildhall, Windsor. Following their vows, Mrs Parker Bowles was granted the title Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Cornwall.

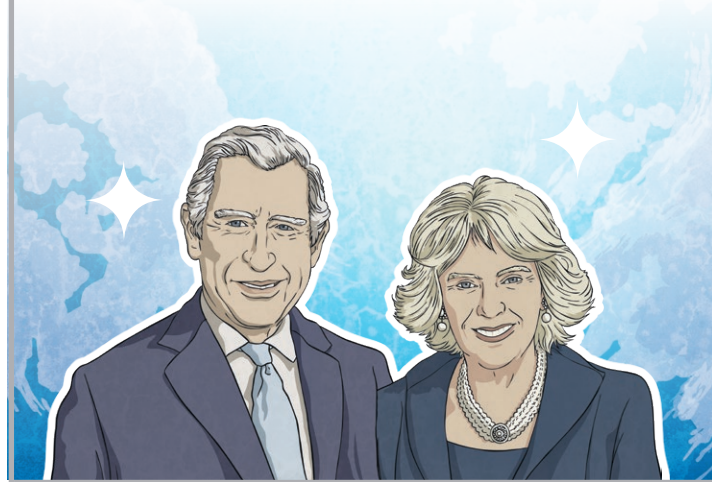

Pupils' own responses, such as: I think King Charles III will be a very different monarch to Queen Elizabeth II because he has had his whole life to shape his own personality whereas she became monarch at such a young age that she hardly had any opportunity to be an adult away from the crown. I also think he might be slightly more visible than Queen Elizabeth II had been in her recent years as she had struggled with mobility issues.

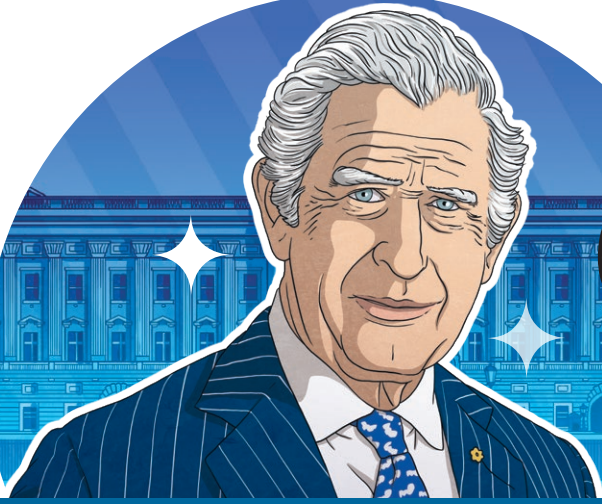
8. Summarise how King Charles III used his influence to support causes which are important to him.

Pupils' own responses, such as: Before he became king Prince Charles used his influence to further the discussion around climate change, biodiversity loss and the importance of protecting the environment. He also put a huge amount of time into supporting young people through qualifications and into work.

Pupils' own responses, such as: The purpose of the Royal family is as a figurehead and team of representatives for the UK. They champion important causes and give their support to vital areas of growth and research such as climate change, mental health and education of young children.

Pupils' own responses, such as: I think King Charles III would have felt a range of emotions. Sadness at the recent loss of his mother, Queen Elizabeth II, gratefulness at the outpouring of well wishes from the country and perhaps some nerves at the monumental role he had taken.

9. Discuss your understanding of the role of the Royal Family.

Pupils' own responses, such as: My understanding of the role of the Royal Family is that they are a team of high-profile representatives that represent the UK and the commonwealth across the world. They are a historic institution with no political power but they provide support and publicity for important issues such as climate change and mental health.

10. Do you think that The King will behave differently now he is the sovereign, compared to when he was the Prince of Wales?

Acceptable points - Yes
