The Advent Wreath

Advent is the time of preparation for Christmas.

Some Christian people believe it is also a time for prayer and a chance to reflect on the times they have made the right choices and the times they could have made better decisions.

Making the Wreath

The Advent wreath is made from evergreen branches which are twisted to form a circle. Then, four candles are put around the wreath and often a fifth candle is placed in the middle. One candle is lit each Sunday before Christmas Day.

In some Christian churches, there are three purple candles, one pink candle and a white one. On the first two Sundays of Advent, purple candles are lit. On the third week, the pink candle is lit on Gaudete Sunday to represent joy. The white candle is lit on Christmas Eve as a symbol of Jesus being born. It is called the Christ Candle.

The First Advent Wreath

Wreaths have been used as Christmas decorations for many years but the first Advent wreath was thought to have been created in 1839 by a German man named Johann Wichern. He was the founder of a children's home.

The children were often asking him when it was Christmas. So, he decided to light a white candle each Sunday and a smaller red candle for each day in between as a means to show the children how many days were left until Christmas Day.

Did You Know...? Candles in an Advent wreath can be red or white.

The Meanings Behind the Advent Wreath

The Advent wreath has different meanings for different people.

- Some believe the wreath is circular because it represents the seasons ending and the beginning of another year. Others believe that the circle represents God's love lasting forever.
- Advent wreaths are made using the leaves of evergreen trees. They represent eternity.
- The candles represent light in the darkness and Jesus being born into the world to bring people hope and love in their lives in times of sadness and sorrow.

The Advent Wreath

Advent is the time of preparation for Christmas.

Many Christian people believe it is also a time for prayer, an ideal time to reflect on past choices and think about making improved ones in the future.

Making the Wreath

The Advent wreath is made from evergreen branches which are twined to form a circle. Evergreen leaves, like holly and pine, are easily available during Advent.

> In many Christian churches, there are three purple candles and one pink candle around the edge with a white candle in the middle. Each candle represents something and one is lit each Sunday during Advent.

The Meaning of the Candles

Week 1

A purple candle is lit. This is known as the Candle of Hope and represents the prophets in the Bible who predicted the birth of Jesus.

Week 2

A purple candle is lit. This is known as the Candle of Preparation or the Bethlehem Candle, remembering when Jesus was born in Bethlehem.

Week 3

A pink candle is lit. This is known as the Candle of Joy or the Shepherd's Candle. It represents the joy of the shepherds when they were told the news of the Saviour's birth.

Week 4

A purple candle is lit. This is known as the Candle of Love or the Angel's Candle and represents the angels telling the shepherds the news of Jesus' birth and his love for ∧ , the world.

Christmas Eve –

The white candle is lit. This is known as the Christ Candle. This reminds Christian people that Jesus was pure.




The History of Advent Wreaths

Wreaths have been used in winter solstice celebrations for hundreds of years. People would get together to celebrate the winter solstice and welcome the longer days of sunlight.

A wheel would be laid down and covered with evergreen branches and candles. This represented a circle of light in the dark days. Prayers would be said to the god of light to turn the wheel of the Earth back towards the Sun to make the days longer. Pagan people called this time of celebration Yule. Later, wreaths were used as religious symbols during Advent.

Symbolism of Advent Wreaths

The Advent wreath has different meanings for different people.



The candles represent light in the darkness of life with the flames offering light during the dark winter months. Christian people believe that lighting the candles represents Jesus coming into the world of darkness and bringing love to everyone in moments of sadness. Christian people use the white candle in the centre to represent Jesus being born and being the Light of the World.

Did You Know ... ?

The first Advent wreath was created in 1839 by Johann Wichern, who lived in Germany. He was the founder of a children's home. The children kept asking when it would be Christmas so he lit a white candle each Sunday and a smaller red candle for each day in-between to show them how many days left until Christmas.

The Advent Wreath

Advent is the time of the Christmas, beginning early in the Christmas Eve. It is a significant time within the Christian calendar for preparation for Christmas. It is also a time for prayer, an opportunity to reflect on previous decisions and think about making improved ones in the future.

Making the Wreath

The Advent wreath is made from evergreen branches which are entwined to form a circle. Evergreen leaves, like holly and pine, are readily available as opposed to using branches from deciduous trees which will have lost their leaves by Advent.

have lost their leaves by Advent. In many Christian churches, there are three purple candles and one pink candle around the edge with a white candle in the middle. Each candle has a special symbolism and

one is lit each Sunday during Advent.

Week 1

A purple candle is lit. This is known as the Candle of Hope or the Prophecy Candle as it is symbolic of the prophets who predicted that a Saviour would be born.

Week 2

A purple candle is lit. This is known as the Candle of Preparation or the Bethlehem Candle, celebrating when Jesus was born in Bethlehem and laid in a manger.

The Meaning of the Candles

Week 3

A pink candle is lit. This is known as the Candle of Joy or the Shepherd's Candle. It is lit on Gaudete Sunday and is symbolic of the joy the shepherds felt when they were told the news of the Saviour's birth.

Week 4

A purple candle is lit. This is known as the Candle of Love or the Angel's Candle. This is symbolic of the angels telling the great news of Jesus' arrival and the fact that Jesus was born because of his love for all people.

Christmas Eve -

The white candle is lit. This is known as the Christ Candle. This reminds Christians people that Jesus was born a baby: pure and innocent.



The History of Advent Wreaths

Wreaths have been used during celebrations for the winter solstice for hundreds of years, particularly by people with pagan beliefs. Pagans would gather to celebrate the winter solstice by welcoming the lengthened days and increased hours of sunlight which were to come in the new year.

To celebrate the event, a wheel would be laid down and covered with evergreen branches and candles. This was symbolic of a circle of light in the dark days. Prayers were offered to the god of light to turn the wheel of the Earth back towards the Sun to make the days longer and warmer.

Pagan people called this time of celebration Yule, which was also a celebration of the birth of the god of the sun.

Following the death of Jesus and the subsequent 'birth' of Christianity, wreaths were used as symbolic decorations for the time approaching Christmas Day.

The first Advent wreath was thought to have been created in 1839 by a man named Johann Wichern. He lived in Hamburg, Germany and was the founder of a children's home.

After the children repeatedly asked when it would be Christmas, he lit a white candle each Sunday and a smaller red candle for each day in-between to count down the days until Christmas.

Symbolism of Advent Wreaths

Advent wreaths are made using the leaves of evergreen plants, which have symbolic meanings. Some believe the wreath is circular because it represents the seasons ending, the beginning of another year and the continuation of life. Others believe that the circle represents God's everlasting love.

Some people believe holly, used in an Advent wreath, represents the crown of thorns Jesus wore when he was crucified on Good Friday. Others believe that pine and holly are symbolic of immortality.

On a practical level, the candles represent light in the darkness as the flames illuminate the dark winter months. On a spiritual level, lighting the candles represents Jesus entering the world of darkness and bringing love to everyone in their times of sorrow and misery.

Christian people use the white candle in the centre to represent Jesus being born pure and being the Light of the World, guiding people from the darkness and to the Lord's love.

Pupils' own responses, such as: Pagan people were using wreaths hundreds of years ago as a means to celebrate the winter solstice and the birth of the sun god as well as welcoming the longer days of sunlight. They laid down a wheel and decorated it with leaves and candles, which was a symbolic object of light in the dark. In a similar way, Advent wreaths are round and made of green leaves and candles.
